In-Person Worship Habits

Thank you. We are doing a great job reducing the risks of the pandemic as we continue following these habits:

12 I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to **Blessings** present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship.

Romans 12:1

Back in March, we were forced to stop in-person worship. Resuming on July 5th, our in-person worship has looked very different. From March to the present, we have begun an on-line worshipping community that connects with people in ways we would never have imagined before the pandemic took over the world. Through it all, we have adapted. Through it all, we have grumbled. Sometimes we have adapted more easily, sometimes we have grumbled louder. And sometimes we have just thrown up our hands in resignation that we don't know what is going on, but we press forward because it is all we can do.

St. Paul reminds us that worship is not a set pattern of liturgy, a book of favorite hymns, a chancel that is set up in a certain way. Worship is our presenting ourselves to God as a living sacrifice. We are a living sacrifice when we recognize God is the creator of each of the 7 Billion humans that share earth with us, along with the uncountable number of creatures that also call this planet home. We are a living sacrifice when we offer praise to God for joys even in the midst of suffering. We are a living sacrifice when we reach out to serve those whose suffering outweigh their joys. We are a living sacrifice when we breathe in the Holy Spirit who calms our anxieties, and breathe out the love God has for our neighbors.

Yes, the one hour on Sundays when we traditionally gather and worship God together is very different, and we will continue to adapt and we will continue to grumble about those differences because it is normal to experience that wide range of emotions. But St. Paul assures us, we are still worshipping God, and it is a 24 hours a day, 7 days a week experience not just one hour on one day. It is a blessing to join with you in worship on Sunday, and Monday, and Tuesday
