We wait, and we hate waiting. Just look at Groundhog's Day, a moment when we lift up a small woodland creature, hoping it tells us Spring is coming sooner, because we can't wait to be done with winter weather. We wait for our spouses to get ready so we can go out for a drive, we wait for our kids to get ready so we can take them home after their activities. We wait for the pandemic to end, we wait for our turn to receive the vaccine, we wait for the day we no longer need to wear masks every time we are out in public.

Our faith journey is a journey of waiting as well. The season of Advent has us waiting for the return of Jesus, an event we anticipate by reminding us of his birth. The season of Lent has us waiting for the resurrection, a resurrection Easter tells us we will one day all be a part of. The season after Pentecost has us waiting the longest, for the age of the church began with the inrush of the Spirit and there is no date marked on the calendar for its end ... we simply don't know how long we are waiting.

The Old Testament prophet Isaiah offers us hope in our waiting. As we wait for the Lord, our strength shall be renewed. We shall run and not be weary. That is good news. Because most of our waiting is quite exhausting. Often as we wait, our impatience wears us down and our excitement for what is to come wanes. But in faith, the opposite happens. The more we wait, the more energy we receive, the more vigor we have for what is to come. The more joy we have in all the activities that lead up to the grand event we are waiting for.

Waiting for the Lord means worship offers us strength for each day. Waiting for the Lord means we run towards the ministry needs of our community and world. Waiting for the Lord means we do not grow weary of providing for the ministry needs of our community and world.

So, if someone asks why you watch your worship online and not just take the weekend off from church—you get to respond by saying, the Lord is renewing my strength. If someone asks why you help out with a church meal even when you don't know how many people are going to be helped, you get to say, because of the joy of running to help others doesn't depend on how many are helped, it happens because the Lord is at work within us.

We might be tired of waiting for many earthly things, but when we set our minds on heavenly goals, we discover the joy of waiting and the renewed strength and energy that comes with it.
