## Blessings

"Simon, son of John, do you love me?"

Jesus, in John 21:15, 16, and 17

Expressing love is one of those touchy-feely things that is not very easy. Maybe it is our northern-European heritage. Maybe it is circumstances from our individual families. Maybe it is a piety thing. Maybe it is just me. I know I have a hard time saying the words, "I love you." beyond my own wife and children. I don't go around telling my siblings "I love you" very often, or close friends, or special mentors, for that matter.

So I struggle with this resurrection scene in John's Gospel. Jesus asks Peter, "Do you love me?" And sure, I have to remind myself the word "love" has many different meanings. Here 'love' is a deep adoration, respect, care, and friendship that is unbreakable. But even with that understanding of the word, "love", I find it hard to use that word even with someone very important to me. Peter very openly responds to his teacher, friend, the Lord who was just raised from the dead, "Yes, I love you." Three times Peter has to repeat his affection and admiration for Jesus. These three times being a match for the three times Simon Peter denied Jesus. This teaches me that I should be as comfortable saying, "I love you, Jesus" as Peter is. I should be able to express my affection and admiration for the Lord and Savior, who guides my life, heals my soul, grants me peace and strength, and a spirit of wisdom and fear of the Lord.

But when I am not comfortable doing this, when I cannot because of my own piety issues, heritage issues, or family issues or whatever it is, say these words, how else can I express my love for Jesus? There are many ways to express affection and admiration. In fact, Jesus responds to Peter this way, "Feed my lambs, tend my sheep, feed my sheep." Jesus is thankful Peter is able to express his love verbally, but Jesus is just as equally interested that Peter can express his love through his actions. The blessing we have as we struggle to express our love for Jesus is that there are many ways to express our affection and admiration for the Lord and Savior. We get to express our love as we sing hymns, as we donate to St. Jude's hospital, as we serve at the local food pantry or volunteer at the hospital or pet shelter, or drop a few coins in the mug of a homeless person on the side of the road.

The blessing is, when we say the words "I love you, Jesus", Jesus says to us, "I know, I love you too, now put that love in action." And when we cannot verbalize, "I love you, Jesus," Jesus still says to us, "I know you love me, I love you too, now put that love in action." And they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love. Yes, they'll know we are Christians by our love.
