Jesus said, "Therefore, go and ..."

Matthew 28:18a

Most of you read that half verse I just shared and in your heads you automatically filled in the rest ... go and make disciples, baptizing them ... teaching them ... and remember I am with you to the end of the age. These words from Jesus are the Great Commission, and for most of us, these words have been ingrained in our very conscious from as early as we can remember knowing any scripture.

Today, I want to focus on just the one word of this commission. Jesus said, "Go." It is a fascinating word. And for our entire lives, hearing Jesus say "Go" came with other automatic sentence fillers. "Go to church." "Go to Sunday School." "Go to Confirmation." In each of these cases, the word "Go" was followed by a specific location. "Go" to the building located at 116 South B Street. For me growing up, it was "Go" to the building located at 1111 N. Elmhurst Road, yes, I still remember the address of my home congregation. That's how this word "Go" is chiseled into our very faith-being. "Go" is attached to a place. But now, we cannot go to 116 South B Street. My mother cannot go to 1111 N. Elmhurst Road, the location of the church I grew up in and which she still attends. The pandemic has upended everything it means when we hear Jesus say "Go."

And we are frustrated. We are saddened. We grieve. We seek someone to blame, usually some politician of the opposite political party we are associated with. But what if this pandemic, that is complete with frustration, sadness, and grief, and blame, is also complete with a new way of thinking. Jesus is the Lord of Resurrection, and even in a pandemic time, we need newness of life. Maybe Jesus has been telling us to "Go" for so long that we have forgotten what it means to actually "Go." The word "Go" is an action verb. When we arrive somewhere and stop moving, we have ceased being in action. We have stopped "Go"-ing when we stop, park our cars, and sit in beloved pews. Maybe, just maybe, this on-"Go"-ing pandemic is forcing us to re-examine how we "Go" and where we are "Go"-ing. And when we remember to keep "Go"-ing, we find our resurrected life as we follow Jesus' command to "Go." In Peace, Pastor Jamie
