Jesus said, "And you will know the trust, and the truth will set you free."

John 8:32

We live in an age of anti-intellectualism. Conspiracy theories about a flat earth are just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to mistrusting experts on topics ranging from person health to public policy to science and even media. It has become easier to dismiss all experts, rather than discerning who is worthy of listening to and who is not. It has become easier to blame the media for all sorts of mis-information rather than discerning the accuracy and the bias in which the information is shared and received. In the midst of this strange new world we live in, we hear Jesus' words, "The truth shall set you free."

Back in early 1500's Martin Luther' lived in a world not much different from our own. Though, in the absence of mass media and social media, it was the church itself that was a source of misinformation. Years of withholding scripture from every person and decades of condemning people and using power to extort people all through supposed good religious intents had been exposed by Luther and his realization that scripture tells us a far more important truth: God does not condemn, but saves because of Jesus Christ.

Today, the Reformation continues whenever truth exposes misinformation. And we have the ability to discern truth. By our faith, truth begins with the Good News that Jesus Christ has forgiven us and has opened the door to everlasting life to us. But truth does not end there. Truth continues as it directs our life to accept science and medical experts. Truth is found in studying history and understanding why politics happen the way it does. Truth always leads to freedom.

What a stark contrast to a day and age when many in charge want to keep us unknowing and mistrusting experts. Those lies only lead to darkness and bondage. May we be agents of truth. May we be encouragers for others to find truth. May we never be afraid of the truth that will set us free.
