Dear Friends and Family,

I have family news to share with you. My wife, Katie, has accepted the call to be the Director of Congregational Transformation in the Nebraska Synod of the ELCA. Katie will be moving to Nebraska to begin this new call in November. This position is a five-year, synod office staff position, where Katie will help small, scrappy congregations across all of Nebraska discern how God is calling them to be in mission in this new day and age. I am very excited for Katie and her new opportunity as she is very gifted for the kind of work she is heading into. And with this news, I also am sharing that I am not moving to Nebraska. I am remaining here in Monmouth. What does this mean? Well, for starts it means we will have two family homes. And there will be times when Katie is able to do remote work for Nebraska from Monmouth. And there will be occasions, typically midweek, when I am able to travel to be with her in Nebraska. It will mean Katie and I will be navigating new calendars, new commitments, new ways of communicating, and new ways of staying connected. It also means nothing is changing here at First Lutheran. Let me assure you, I remain committed as your pastor to be here for your pastoral needs, to provide worship, and faith education; to walk with you on your faith journey remains my call. And so you know, throughout this time you can always ask me how Katie is doing, have I seen her recently, how is she liking Nebraska, when will she be home next? I know this is going to be rather interesting time for us as a family; having two homes in two states is not going to be easy. But Katie and I are confident that God is leading us through this opportunity; and we remain committed to each other, and remain committed to each call God has given us—here in Monmouth, and there in Nebraska.

BYOB&B: Thinking Faithfully Out Loud

We are hosting a new Bible study that is being co-sponsored with the Methodist and Presbyterian churches in town. This study is designed to help us understand the hows and the whys of our theological thinking.

Why do we use words like "Grace" "Forgiveness" "Reconciliation"? What do we mean when we say "Jesus Saves"?

There are many influences on our thinking theologically. And this study will help us learn all about these influences. It will be a no-judgement study, but a space for fair conversation. So join us on Tuesday mornings here in our own fellowship hall, beginning October 7th at 10 AM and Bring Your Own Bible and Beverage and share in growing in faith together.

[Abraham] said to [the rich man], "If [your brothers] do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead." — Luke 16:31

Luke 16 is a parable from Jesus that has a rich man and a poor man named Lazarus who die on the same day. In the after-life realm, Lazarus is being comforted and the rich man is being tormented. As the rich man is being tormented, he can see Lazarus receiving comfort, so the rich man tries to receive just a little bit of cool water from Lazarus. But he is denied by Abraham as there is a large chasm between them; and the rich man is told that both he and Lazarus are getting after-life treatment based on the way they lived. The parable ends with the final gut-punch that the rich man's brothers won't change their ways even if a dead man rises to tell them to, especially if they won't listen to Moses and the prophets.

This parable is a fairy tale style lesson, much like what Mother Goose or the Brother's Grimm told. This isn't about telling us what will happen in the afterlife, it is about helping us see how we live matters today. In this life, we are equated with the rich man, a man who in the story doesn't even have a name. We are the one who at our doorsteps, sometimes literally, sometimes figuratively, have poor people, like the man named Lazarus, laying there waiting for any form of help or compassion or mercy. Jesus' parable outlines a big reversal of fortune that awaits us. We who do not see the needs of others will not have comfort; while those who are unseen in this life, will receive all the comfort they need. It is a story that also sounds very similar to Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol where Ebenezer Scrooge meets 4 ghosts and by the end of the story realizes he needs to change his life, and he does. And that is what Jesus is trying to get us to hear ... that we need to change our life today, that those who we are choosing to not see need us to see them, need us to have compassion and mercy for them, and to help them receive the equity and dignity they need today.

It is very popular in our current cultural climate to want to be the rich man who gets to ignore the needy, to deny others dignity or worth because of skin color, gender identity, sexual orientation, or a vast number of other human imagined distinctions. We have government officials and think tank talking heads championing discrimination, taking away social safety nets, ending funding for compassion work, straining relief work, and stifling welcome. Jesus says, you have all the scriptures in the world to tell you this is wrong. The parable even gives us a chance to reflect how we might react if someone rises from the dead to tell us the right way to live. And to be clear, Jesus rose from the dead to show us the error of our ways when we ignore and mistreat others; we now have Moses, the prophets, and the Risen Jesus telling us to see those who are unseen, to treat others with compassion and mercy, to be a community of welcome and love. Peace, Pastor Jamie
