The Spring Bible Study will be Wednesday mornings in the month of May at 10 AM Dear Friends and Family,

Last week I was able to attend the Queer Intersectionality and the Public Church Symposium: Queer Joy as Resistance conference at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. It was an amazing symposium. I met several wonderful church leaders and reconnected with a few long-time friends. The symposium had at its heart how church welcomes and creates space for God's queerly beloved children, who so often in our society (and even in many church spaces) are excluded or are marginalized or victimized by those who want to dominate others thoughts, identities, and moralities. I have come to experience First Lutheran, our beloved congregation here in Monmouth, as a very progressive and open congregation, which this symposium affirmed. Yet even as progressive and open as we are, there are a few areas we still need to pay attention to, if we are going to truly be welcoming for all of God's children. The biggest shift will come in terms of using more expansive language to describe God and our community. But, the hope is that in making this shift, it will be so subtle that long time Lutherans won't even notice a change, while those looking in from the outside will suddenly feel they are included in ways never experienced before. Friends, in the end, this symposium highlighted the need for community and relationship building. That is what people who are LGBTQIA+ desire the most. And that is what we offer. We offer community and relationship building. It is why we come here, it is why we welcome each other and greet one another each week in worship. It is why we wonder why someone is absent this week. It is a gift that we get to offer to all who seek it, and especially those who seek it when it is so denied by the rest of society. May we always find ourselves creating the community all the outcast want to join.

Spring Bible Study

It is time to engage the Bible once more. And we are going to take a look this Spring at the book of Revelation. We will gather on the four Wednesdays of May at 10 AM in Pastor's study for this quick study.

The book of Revelation is often mired in mystery and has been used and abused for a variety of ill-gotten means. So what is the history of this book so shrouded in mystery? What does it offer to us? What are the myths surrounding it?

Join us beginning Wednesday, May 7th at 10 AM for the start of this wonderful Bible study.

And ... pay attention to the readings throughout the season of Easter. We will be reading from Revelation and sharing some insights about what Easter joy is found in this text throughout all of the season of Easter.

Easter Season April 20 to June 1

Hope and Encouragement during a time of great suffering, this could be the tag line for Revelation, the final book of the scriptures. Written in the very late 1st century CE, or possibly the very early 2nd century CE, Revelation offers just that—hope and encouragement in a time of great suffering. The earliest Christians were quickly becoming outcasts from the Jewish religion they were still very much a part of. And at the same time, they were becoming outcasts from a political realm that didn't like upstart religions, let alone a religion that denounced the Caesar as Lord and called anyone else Lord.

So writing messages of hope and encouragement could be a dangerous thing in that era. This is why the author took great care to use images that Christians would have known, but which would have been baffling to the Roman authorities.

Today, we still live in a time of great suffering. And we still need to be able to hear a message of hope and encouragement. Even if the original meaning of these images are a bit ancient, we can sift through them and discover that ultimate message and receive hope and encouragement.

Then I looked, and I heard the voice of many angels surrounding the throne and the living creatures and the elders; they numbered myriads of myriads and thousands and thousands, singing with a full voice, "Worthy is the Lamb that was slaughtered to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honor and glory and blessing!"

Revelation 5:11-12

Have you ever wondered how loud it will be when we are in God's full presence? The author of Revelation describes myriads and myriads and thousands and thousands singing. I've got to imagine it is going to be quite deafening being in God's full presence. Sound has a way of blocking out a lot of what goes on in our minds. This is why we crank up a favorite song while driving; or why we have to fall asleep with some white noise. Our brains begin to quiet as the noise surrounds us, everything we are thinking about just settles and goes away, and there is just the music, just the white noise of a fan or a gentle rain calming us down.

The author of Revelation offers us this idea that being in God's full presence will have that sort of effect—where our brains will finally be able to stop and our worries, our anxieties, our stresses, all the things we hold onto, the grudges, the hurts, the things we said we wish we could take back, the painful things said to us, the darkest hatreds and scorns against another — everything that clogs our minds now will have to stop. We won't be able to think about any of it. We won't be able to focus on any of that painful stuff. The sound of myriads and myriads, of thousands and thousands singing God's praise will simply center us on the only thing that matters. That is what the author of Revelation imagines it will be like in God's full presence.

We get a taste of this when we gather as a community and sing our hymns and songs of praise. For a few moments, the music echoes in our minds, for a few moments we are centered, for a few moments we set aside all the things that distract us and weigh us down and take us away from experiencing God's full presence here in our daily lives. Sure the author is describing what it will be like when we are all gathered in God's full presence when this life is over; but the author is using this imagery to encourage us to gather here and now, to remind us here and now, that as we sing God's praise today, gathered even as a few, we indeed are in God's full presence here and now. May the hymns we sing in worship be a centering moment, a time when your brain stops with all that distracts us from what truly matters, and bring you into the full presence of God.
