Dear Friends and Family,

More snow, more frigid temperatures, more yearning for the days we yearned for cooler weather. It's a weird cycle we go through. In hot seasons, we yearn for cooler weather. In cold seasons, we yearn for hotter weather. And it is very much like the season of Advent. The season of Advent is a season of preparation for the coming of Jesus, and our seasonal music is filled with sentimental emotions for the snow, for getting together for warm beverages and snowball fights, all while waiting for a man who lives at the North Pole, the coldest and snowiest possible spot, to joyfully bring toys to good children. And yet, we want this season to be over quickly, to be done with the end of year rituals, the joy of new snow, to start a new year with resolutions we will forget quickly, and to move on to the rest of our life.

Advent does not only represent this living contradiction, it also represents the space of waiting for a promise from God to be fulfilled, all while that very same promise has already begun to be fulfilled right here and now. Yes, we sing hymns heralding the birth of Jesus, hymns that sing of shepherds and angels and wise men celebrating the birth of Jesus, and of sentimental emotions that warm our hearts because Jesus was indeed born. We sing all these songs as we await another coming of Jesus, the return when God's Kingdom will be fully realized. And yet, with the very birth of Jesus all those 2000 + years ago, God's Kingdom has already entered the world in a new way, one that we are already experiencing in the very now moment. Yet much like waiting for the warmer season to come in a few months, we sit pining for what will come later, not knowing when that later moment actually will be.

So perhaps Advent is a needed season of contradictions, a needed time to just sit in the middle of what we are experiencing and what we are waiting for. So be okay with all the sentimental emotions you are experiencing ... and be very okay with the pinning for what will come. It is all normal and all very okay.

This role would also be responsible for recruiting others to volunteer in these roles. This role would need to coordinate with Pastor Jamie when worship assistants are scheduled for listing in the bulletin and newsletters.

These three tasks seem like a lot for a workshop, but we should be able to accomplish these tasks within a hour. Please let Pastor Jamie or Pam Van Kirk know if you are interested in attending this Liturgical Arts Workshop.

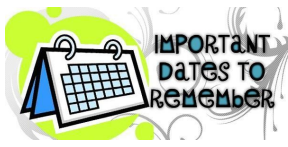

29 “Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word, 30 for my eyes have seen your salvation, 31 which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, 32 a light for revelation to the gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.” — Luke 2:29-32, Simeon speaking upon seeing the baby Jesus

The story of Jesus coming to the Jerusalem Temple as an infant is found in Luke’s gospel. We are told they are fulfilling the ritual of presenting Jesus to the Lord. There in the crowded spaces of the Temple, Mary and Joseph have an encounter with Simeon who prophesizes about Jesus. Then they meet Anna, who also tells the crowds all about the baby Jesus. So, for Luke, the angels have proclaimed Jesus to the shepherds who rushed to see him. The outcast, those who were excluded from Jewish worship life, are now included. Then immediately afterward, in the Temple, prophets proclaim Jesus to all who are there, the insiders, those who have the privilege of standing in holy spaces, even if they don’t understand what it means to stand in holy spaces. So, the world—represented by the outsiders (shepherds) and insiders (the prophets and Temple crowd) is hearing about this baby and who he is. And for Simeon, Jesus is a light for revelation to the gentiles and a light for glory to God’s people, Israel.

As we wait for Jesus’ return, there continue to be outsiders and insiders in our world today. We may not use these words exactly, but we do have more repulsive expressions for people we do not want to include, expressions like calling someone “garbage”, solely on the basis of their ethnicity or nation of origin. In our Biblical narrative about Jesus’ birth, the ancients would have considered shepherds to be garbage, they would have considered gentiles garbage. Yet at Jesus’ birth, the angels went to the shepherds. The prophet Simeon declares Jesus as light for revelation to gentiles. God ends the divisions we humans put on each other. In Jesus, the lines of separation that lead us to call another human “garbage” is ended. In fact, Simeon would go on to say that the light of Jesus will expose the inner thoughts of people, revealing where we have gone astray in thinking lines of division are okay.

This Advent season is a season of being restored to the light of Jesus. It is a time to let the light of Jesus cleanse us from the ways we divide people into categories. As we light the candles on our Advent wreath and let that light burn brighter each week, may we be restored to God’s joy of one large human family where all belong, where none are excluded, where all have value and worth and dignity. And may we rejoice together in this huge diverse and equal and inclusive family from now until Jesus returns. Peace, Pastor Jamie
