We have all found ourselves in a season of busyness whether it be home, school, work, or church activities. Covid has changed the face of everything in our lives. Many may say they have experienced positive change, but others find it is considerably worse. It is during these times we unintentionally step away from the very place we need to be. We tend to lose sight of our priorities.

The Bible tells us of two sisters who were busy getting ready for Jesus to come to their house. When He arrived, one sister, Mary, turned all of her attention to Him. She sat at His feet and hung on every word He had to say. The other sister, Martha, was worried about details. She probably was hurriedly making sure her home was pristine, a good meal had been prepared, and that everything was perfect for this special guest! All the while, Mary just sat at Jesus' feet. This angered Martha and she asked Jesus to make her sister help her. She didn't think that it was fair that she do all the work while Mary just sat. Jesus gently corrected Martha and reminded her that although her intentions were good, her priorities were not. She had put the emphasis on the details and not the person. He reminded her that the personal attention that she gave her guests would always be more important than the details surrounding their visit.

Mary and Martha both loved Jesus, and they both sought to serve Him. On this day, they did both serve Him, but in different ways. Martha did not stop to recognize, that in all her busyness and preparations, she actually was neglecting her guest. Mary was actually serving in the better way by spending time with Jesus, giving Him all of her attention.

There are important lessons for us to learn from this story:

- Just as in any close relationship, spending time alone with someone allows us to really get to know them. We are to be with God this way also. We must sit at His feet and hang on His every word. We might even have to drop some things in order to do this. Nothing is more important than us spending time getting to know Him like He knows us. When we spend time with Him, we get to know Him in a different way.
- If we don't spend time with Him, there might be consequences for us. For Martha, her distractions led to worry and anxiety over not accomplishing certain tasks. We will find that our connection to Him will be weak, we will be distracted, our priorities will be out of place, and our needs will not be met. Most importantly, we will not be able to hear Him
- We must take time *daily* to spend time with God; it is essential. It will help us to focus on what is most important and help us discern what is *good* and *BEST!*

We all need to do a self-check. Are we so busy doing things of life that we aren't spending proper time with Him? We can't let anything take us away from sitting at His feet and hearing what He has to tell us, spending time in His word, and being aware of the things He is doing in our lives. We need to set priorities and make sure that, in our busyness, we aren't getting caught up in the details and no longer giving Him our devotion. Jesus is always present in our lives, and He deserves our full attention!
