## 02a Exterior-Cottonwood

This unique and charming eatery is a recent addition to the town, built in 2018 - fittingly - here on Cottonwood Drive. [IMG\_2102]

The vintage pickup out front is not only a great promo and a photo spot - but there's a surprise once we get up to the patio. [IMG\_2106]

Upon its opening, Cottonwood Station became a gathering spot for locals as well as hikers, climbers, and mountain bikers in Red Rock Canyon. The restaurant was recently purchased from the original owners by avid mountain biker and restaurateur Brian Fisher. ...We're happy to see the inside still has that rustic feel, and they kept the handwritten menu boards - so artistic and fun.

#### 03a Mercantile-Park Area

OK, let's start our tour. Two gas pumps...one restaurant...a private park...and this. [DJI\_0671]

The mercantile was built in 1942, and originally sold household goods to miner families. The building is pretty much unchanged, from the outside. Plus, it doubles as the sheriff's office! [first part of DJI 0672, pics PIMG 2114-2116]

#### **04 TRAVEL TO BONNIE SPRINGS**

#### 04a Driving Footage-BSR/04b Last Visit 2019

All right, onward, into Red Rock Canyon. [pic IMG\_2140 or 2141]

But first, a little detour to relive some fond memories - who's ever been to Bonnie Springs Ranch? [very end of DJI\_0680 (try not to show turning right), pic IMG\_5665, then driveway footage DJI\_0673]

Bonnie Springs Ranch was a great old west attraction, owned and named after a showgirl and skater we all called Miss Bonnie. She bought it in the 1950s, and it featured a train, a western town, a motel, a restaurant, a petting zoo, and even live entertainment. We loved the place, and were gutted when her heirs sold it to developers. It closed in March 2019. [whole video from 2019 is in 04b folder; also many great pics]

All the Bonnie Springs structures are gone. The latest info on the new project is that it's to be called the Reserve at Red Rock Canyon. There will be 16 homesites, on about 14 acres of the property. Construction began in 2022. [very end of DJI\_0674, DJI\_0681 exit]

#### **05 TRAVEL TO RED ROCK OVERLOOK**

#### 05a Driving Footage-RRC

The great thing about being here on a hot Tuesday afternoon is that we pretty much have this road to ourselves. So, let's continue north and talk about Red Rock Canyon. The national conservation area spans more than 197,000 acres. This area is one of the easternmost parts of the Mojave Desert, known for its sandstone peaks, large red rock formations, and sheer rock walls - walls that tower up to 3000 feet, and are perfect for climbing. There are 26 numbered hikes and trails...a visitor center, and a one-way 13-mile scenic drive. It's truly a gem for those of us who live here, a way to get back to nature after too much Las Vegas, if you know what I mean! [Map of trails-scenic drive; 2 pics of Scenic Drive sign]

## 05b Red Rock Overlook
