Featured Members - Kathy Ressler




Kathy Ressler has been a resident of North Aurora for 19 years. Originally from New York City she is a graduate of the U of Del with a degree in Engineering and lived in

Tri-Cities' Coal Problem & What We Can Do About It - November 15th

Geneva and Batavia are members of NIMPA, along with Rochelle, about 40 miles directly west of the Tri-Cities. Geneva residents, through NIMPA, buy approximately 70% of their electricity from the coalburning Prairie State. Geneva also supplies its residents with electricity from a methane plant at Settlers Hill Landfill and by contract from a company called NextEra.

Through Batavia's contract with NIMPA until 2056, Batavia residents buy over 100% of their electricity from the coal-burning Prairie State. Batavia is contractually bound to purchase 55 megawatts of electricity each year from Prairie State but only uses about 30–35 megawatts each year. The unused electricity is sold on the wholesale market, and Batavia residents pay an extra fee to make up the difference between the retail purchase price and the wholesale sales price.

The Illinois Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA) requires Prairie State to either reduce its carbon dioxide emissions by 100% or close by 2045. In response to CEJA's requirements, NIMPA and the other agencies are planning to make a decision that will keep Prairie State running—and burning coal—indefinitely. This decision will be made for Geneva and Batavia without public hearings and without input from residents and their elected officials.
