


We're honored to welcome Debut Studio back to MTF2025 with their gripping Russian-language drama, To Kill a Man.





About the Play:



About the Playwright:

Alice Erya Gerstenberg was an American playwright, actress, and activist known for her bold feminist writing and pioneering work in Chicago's Little Theatre

Movement.

Gerstenberg played a crucial role in the foundation and success of several theater companies as well as the Little Theater Movement in Chicago. In 1921, she founded the Junior League Children's Theater in Chicago; in 1922 she founded the *Playwrights Theater*; and she supported an amateur theater company that was eventually named for her at its foundation in 1955.

Gerstenberg was one of a handful of women invited to speak at the National Drama Council and National Theatre Conference. In 1936 she was an invited speaker at three AETA conferences and she won the Chicago Foundation for Literature Award in 1938.

Gerstenberg had many opportunities to move to New York, but instead chose to remain in Chicago.

Quartet for Four Actors was *Schaeffer's first full-length instrumental play* — a bold blend of absurdism,
improvisation, and theatrical innovation that broke all
conventions.

Did you know?

The original production premiered on February 24, 1979, and has since become a cultural icon in Poland, performed by nearly every major Polish theater.

Schaeffer's groundbreaking work continues to inspire new generations of artists around the globe — and now, it's coming to our stage!



This play has been staged multiple times. It was first performed in 2019 at the AACT Fest, where it won several awards, including **Best Sound & Light Design**. Later, it was invited to perform at **RhinoFest 2023** — Chicago's longest-running fringe festival — and was most recently showcased at the **Echoes Theater Festival 2025,NJ**.







About the Play:

Originating in the 7th century and penned by **Bodhayana**,
Bhagavadajjukam is the earliest surviving example of a
Sanskrit satirical play (prahasana) — one of the ten classical
forms outlined in the ancient treatise Natyashastra.

Set in a world of philosophers, misfits, and moral dilemmas, the story weaves through existential questions and social commentary, revealing the absurdities of life and the dualities of dharma with wit and wisdom. The play narrates the story of interchange of souls of a saint and the harlot

Infused with the elegance of Bharatnatyam, the play doesn't just showcase a story — it becomes an experience. Classical dance, layered language, and modern relevance merge into a breathtaking tribute to Indian heritage.

Why this play matters now:

In a world that's rapidly evolving, Bhagavadajjukam reminds us of the timelessness of introspection, laughter, and critical thinking. It proves that ancient art still speaks — and speaks loudly — to today's audiences. Despite its ancient setting, the play's themes and characters remain relatable and thought-provoking for modern audiences.

NOTE

This production offers a unique glimpse into the rich tradition of Indian classical theatre as described in the Natyashastra, while also creating a meaningful connection with today's audience. Elements of Bharatanatyam, the classical Indian dance form, are woven throughout the play to enhance its narrative and aesthetic expression.

According to the Natyashastra, stage worship (Rang Pooja) is an integral ritual performed before any theatrical presentation. In keeping with this tradition, the play begins with each character entering the stage one by one through Bharatanatyam movements, as the sacred space is purified with holy water and rituals — symbolizing respect for the art form and sanctity of performance.
