Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We start the new year will holy communion. I thought I'd start this 2026 newsletter with a reminder of what we believe happens at the communion table:

Do United Methodists believe the bread and wine become the body and blood of Christ?

In the Great Thanksgiving, we ask the Holy Spirit to be poured on us and on the gifts of bread and wine we offer. We ask for the Spirit's outpouring to make the bread and wine be for us the body and blood of Christ so we, who receive them, may be for the world the body of Christ redeemed by his blood. We believe that things are changed in a spiritual manner. We believe God answers this prayer "Yes" and the Spirit does all these things. Christ is really present here, and the emphasis is that Christ's presence really changes **us**.

What do United Methodists mean when they refer to Holy Communion as a means of grace?

"Means of grace" are channels by which God has promised to offer us an encounter with God's grace. Anglican Christians (including John Wesley, one of our founders) spoke of "ordinary means of grace" and "instituted means of grace." Ordinary means of grace include the public worship of God, opportunities to hear and study the scriptures, family and private prayer, and fasting. Two means of grace were instituted by Christ himself: baptism and Holy Communion. In baptism, we are given entrance into a new life grounded in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In Holy Communion, that new life is sustained or, when we may have gone astray, re-awakened.

Why do many United Methodists use grape juice instead of wine?

Predecessor bodies of The United Methodist Church were deeply involved in the Temperance Movement. Grape juice was originally invented by Thomas Welch, a Methodist, so Methodists and others would not need to use wine for communion. Today, United Methodists still commend, but do not require, abstinence, and may continue to use grape juice in communion out of pastoral concern for people who

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may have problems with alcohol.

Does the bread at Holy Communion need to be unleavened?

Either leavened (in witness to the resurrection) or unleavened (in witness to the cleansing power of the Holy Spirit) may be used.

If I cannot eat wheat, may I still receive communion?

Yes. United Methodist congregations are expected to provide alternatives for persons with celiac disease and other allergies. Even if they do not, the ancient Christian doctrine of concomitance means that a physical ability to receive in either kind (bread or cup, or even both!) does not alter the benefits of the sacrament when you present yourself to receive it.

How may I receive?

The key word is that you receive rather than take the elements. They are given to you by servers. When you receive the bread, you may want to hold your hands out, with your left hand cupping and supporting your right hand. The server will say something to you about the bread as it is given to you. Before you eat it or hold it to proceed to the cup, you may say "Amen" or "Thanks be to God" When the cup is offered to you, the server will say some words to you about the cup. You may respond "Amen" or "Thanks be to God" and then either dip the bread into the cup (but not your fingers!) or drink from the cup. Most United Methodists tend to dip into the cup rather than drink from it.

Who May Receive?

All those seeking Christ, and all baptized children. You do NOT need to be United Methodist to receive communion in a United Methodist Church.

Our Neighbors' Place Overflow Shelter Help Needed – January 26

The Our Neighbors' Place overflow shelter is up and running for the season. Our Neighbors' Place (ONP) is administered by EUMA but staffing for the overflow shelter is supplemented by volunteers. The ONP overflow shelter will be housed in a single location for the season, 450 East 16th Street (between Parade and Wallace). Lakewood's help is needed.

Volunteers

Methodist churches in the Erie area have been asked to assist with providing volunteers for the overflow shelter from January 21-27. EUMA will have staff present during these evenings, but 8-10 volunteers are needed each night from 6:30 - 11:00 p.m. Volunteers may not need to stay the entire time, but people are needed to help check in guests, serve food and coffee, distribute clothing, and monitor showers.

Lakewood United Methodist Church has committed to providing volunteers for the overflow shelter during the evening of Monday, January 26. There will be a sign-up sheet available in the Narthex at Lakewood soon, if you are interested in signing up to help.

Meals

A bagged lunch is provided for guests each evening at the overflow shelter. The volunteers for that evening are asked to provide 60 bagged lunches. Help will be needed with this endeavor.

Clothing

Lakewood will also be collecting clothing items for distribution at the overflow shelter. Items for donation include new underwear (boxer briefs for the men), socks (moisture wicking please), emergency thermal blankets (must be able to handle below 30 degree temp), sweatpants, t-shirts, and sweatshirts. If you are interested in donating any of these items, a collection box will soon be placed in the church for donations.
