## Remembering River City HOG Co-Founder Bill Simmons



Sadly, we lost one the founders of River City HOG on April 28, 2025. Due to health issues, Bill Simmons stopped riding in 2015, but he and his wife Phyllis rode extensively throughout their lifetimes and are fondly remembered as super kind and devoted to service to others. Bill was a HADI Shriner, Mason, and Kentucky Colonel. Through his leadership experience and love for motorcycling, Larry Moran asked Bill and Sam Barter, Jr. to establish a local HOG Chapter. Thankfully they accepted the challenge, and a charter was issued to River City HOG 1210 on March 22, 1988.

I joined River City HOG at the age of 32 in August, 1989, and was riding a 1986 1100 Sportster. Bill, Phyllis, and the other 40 members of the chapter were very welcoming and helped improve my riding skills. The camaraderie within River City HOG was notable with many organized group rides, meetings, and events to keep riders engaged and grow the chapter. Bill was the "Dale Earnhardt" of the chapter...highly experienced, dressed in black leather, wearing a three-quarter black helmet, and riding a black Electra Glide Classic. Growth of the chapter wasn't just about numbers; it was about building a vibrant community, a shared passion that transcended age. We hosted legendary events, forged lasting friendships, and, most importantly, kept the spirit of the chapter alive.


