Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2024

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The organisation's objectives and aims are to relieve poverty by promoting the efficient use of energy (including energy for heating purposes) among persons who are in necessitous circumstances including (without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing) those in such circumstances who are elderly, or whose housing conditions are unsatisfactory. To advance public education about all aspects of energy conservation and the efficient use of energy. To relieve poverty through the co-ordination, delivery, and support of projects and services which address fuel poverty and its associated conditions and symptoms.

Achievements and performance

- Assisted almost 600 households, with advice, information and bespoke one-to-one support, this work being largely funded by British Gas Energy Trust and Orkney Islands Council's Local Covid Economic Recovery (LACER) fund as part of the Orkney Money Matters project, with Robertson Trust and SSEN funding the further support needed by those with mental health needs.
- Raised £80,000 from Orkney Islands Council (OIC) to fund our work over the 4 years to 31 March 2026.
- Raised £300,699 from British Gas Energy Trust to fund fuel poverty advice together with £28,300 for practical
 measures for two years from 1 April 2024 and a further £7,987 for distribution as electricity vouchers (for year one).
- Raised a further £35,792 from OIC, £50,000 from The National Lottery Community Fund and £41,218 from the Cash-First fund to fund our work over the period to 31 March 2025, together with £7,500 for Cosy Home Packs and £5,000 for installations/small repairs from OIC.
- Raised £47,800 from Advice UK for outreach support for both THAW and Orkney CAB.
- Secured over £106,000 from the Scottish Government's Home Heating Support Fund, £75,000 from LACER, £16,886 from Fuel Bank Foundation and £3,600 from Warm Homes Discount to pay for electricity for clients.
- Secured over £15,000 for energy efficiency upgrades for clients, over £14,000 for energy efficient white goods and over £18,000 in energy efficiency savings.
- Distributed 39 'Cosy Home Packs' as well as 262 individual energy efficiency items for vulnerable households.
- 9. Lobbied both locally and with national agencies for fuel poverty to be a key priority.
- Maintained a wider partnership network of organisations involved in fuel poverty issues.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Over the year ended 31 March 2024, income totalled £428,068, well up from the previous year's total of £171,815, largely due to the new Orkney Money Matters project which ran for the full year, and also due to receipt of additional funding from Orkney Islands Council and increased funding from British Gas Energy Trust. Expenditure over the year totalled £346,343, well up on expenditure in the previous year of £236,932, even though the previous year had included an exceptional cost of £55,773 relating to repayment of European Social Fund Poverty and Social Inclusion grant monies received via Orkney Islands Council for the year to 9 July 2018. The increase was due to a 45% increase in the size of the staff team to support the much higher activity levels and to a three-fold increase in direct support to clients for fuel, white goods, heating and other equipment including Cosy Home Packs.

Reserves policy

The accumulated reserves of £158,258 are sufficient to maintain the charity for its continued operation. These reserves will be carried forward for use by the charity in achieving its stated aims and objectives during the next financial year.

Since 31 March 2024, the charity has raised a further £60,000 from the Cash First Fund for a flexible cash fund to be distributed to the Orkney Community for the year ended 31 March 2025, together with £25,112 from Trussell Trust to finance its work over the period to 31 March 2026.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO).

New members of the Trustee Board are either elected annually at the Annual General Meeting from the membership or appointed at any time by the Board from members, those nominated by body with which the charity has close contact in the course of its activities or on the basis that they have relevant specialist skills or experience. Trustees retire automatically after three years but are eligible for re-election.

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Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2023

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Additions to fixed assets are depreciated over the life of the relevant funding.

Stocks

Stocks comprise goods held for distribution to beneficiaries and are carried at the lower of cost or net realizable value.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
