Washington Elks Therapy Program for Children

Since 1954, the Washington Elks Therapy Program for Children has provided home-based occupational or physical therapy to children with developmental delays or physical disabilities. Services are provided at no cost to the family served.

From a single therapist covering Washington State over 50 years ago, the program has evolved into an integral, vital, and much appreciated part of the statewide healthcare community. The success of any program is reflected in its longevity and its value to the community and the individuals it serves. Through providing critical one-on-one pediatric therapy for children most in need, the Washington Elks continue their long tradition of service to our community.

It's All About Our Kids

Any child in Washington State with an Occupational or Physical Therapy prescription for treatment and whose family lives within reach of our therapy team is eligible, however only the most critically in need can be accepted into the therapeutic program. While the children we serve range in age from birth to 21, preference is given to infants and young children, those who are medically fragile or who would otherwise go without services due to the family's lack of resources, and to children who without therapy will experience deterioration in their status. Eligibility for services does not require affiliation, membership, or association with the Elks, any of its members or lodges.

State of the Program

The present caseload for the Washington Elk therapists averages 25 children per unit. Each unit consists of a licensed therapist, transportation and equipment. Their time is fully utilized taking care of "Our Kids" and there are more kids who need our services.

The Therapy Program is healthy. From the initial stages over 50 years ago, when one therapist was responsible for covering the entire state, it has been a long successful climb, to a point where the program is an integral, much needed, and much appreciated part of the community. Administrative costs for the Program remain very low, thus 88% of each contribution goes directly to its purpose—therapy for children.

The success of any program is reflected in its longevity. The fact that it is meeting a specific need, and meeting it well.

And don't forget the individuals—"Our Kids" and their families. Without the Washington Elks Therapy Program for Children, Inc., many children would have had much different lives.

Parent Participation

Parent/Guardian participation during therapy is critical to each child's success. We believe that the parent/guardian is the expert on the child and that our role is to teach families how to carry through therapeutic activities into daily life, with an emphasis on home programs and parent participation. One hour per week of therapy is only the beginning of a 24 hour, 7 day a week therapeutic process. We know that each family is unique and that the best therapy program comes from caring relationships and valuing each child's special needs and abilities. This is best accomplished when the whole family takes an active role in treatment planning.

The Program's existence and success depends on the contributions from Tall Elks, Tall Ladies, Coin Boxes, Memorials, Honor Gifts, and Bequests. Only with the support of Washington Elks and other Friends of the Program can they continue to make a difference in the lives of these young people.





"OUR KIDS"



Look out world, here comes Charlie!

Charlie recently had his 18th birthday and is eagerly anticipating graduation this June. He has plans to attend college in the fall and is interested in computer technology. Charlie has been one of the faces of "Our Kids" for many years. You may have seen him featured in promotional videos and brochures. He has received in-home therapy for most of his life at varied frequencies. He was born with Cerebral Palsy. Cerebral Palsy is caused by abnormal development of the brain or damage to the developing brain that affects a child's ability to control their muscles. Over the years, Charlie's goals and focus of therapies have changed with his varied needs. Early on, working on his motor and developmental skills was critical. Now, Charlie is looking to the future. Adaptations and independence have become his priority. We are working on independent wireless control of his home, such as opening and locking his front door from a cell phone, to improving his mobility with a travel wheelchair so he can hang out with friends easily. Many of the goals and adaptations Charlie needs require unique and unconventional problem-solving. Having a long-term relationship with his therapist who has been in his home and able to truly see his daily needs makes achieving these goals realistic. **Thanks to the Washington Elks Therapy Program for Children, Charlie has a much brighter and more independent future ahead of him.**

Blast from the PAST

Ever heard of Granville Haller? Remembered almost nowhere now, he had a big impact in Washington state. Haller was born in York, Pennsylvania in 1819. He entered the Army as a second lieutenant and was a career soldier who served in the Seminole Indian War in 1841-1842 and the Mexican War in 1845-1847. In 1852 Haller was a major when he and his wife arrived at Fort Vancouver. They were assigned to Fort Dalles, then a parched and windy post on the Oregon side of the Columbia. In 1856 Haller was ordered to go west and build Port Townsend. Then in 1861 the Civil War began. Haller had bad luck haunt him throughout his career (Too long of a story to capture here.) and was dismissed from the Army without explanation. He hadn't even been able to defend himself.

Haller returned to Washington territory and purchased a store in Coupeville on Whidbey Island and built a home. He allowed farmers credit and charged high rates of interest. When farmers defaulted, Haller acquired land in 11 counties. He now had the money and clout to appeal his Army dismissal. In 1879, Haller was exonerated and reinstated and promoted to colonel at age 59. He left Whidbey Island to serve, and his wife moved to Seattle. When he reached the age of 63, the mandatory age of retirement, he settled in Seattle. Haller continued his real-estate career. He built a three-story mansion on First Hill and called it Castlemount (razed in the 1940s). In the 1950s, the Haller Building in downtown Seattle was demolished for commercial space. The West Seattle's Haller School was donated by one of Haller's sons. It became a school annex and then an American Legion Hall. Still standing in Port Townsend is a Haller Fountain. Also there is a Haller Road on Whidbey and Haller streets in Coupeville and Arlington.

Now you are probably wondering why I wrote about a person hardly remembered. It's because I love old buildings and the old Haller house in Coupeville is no exception. It went thru many families over the years and never modernized for 150 years with the exception of a toilet! Empty since 2004, the walls with never repaired holes and ceilings show original lumber, lath and plaster. It has been said to be a derelict with a million dollar view of Penn Cove.

All that is changing now. In 2018 the property was purchased by Historic Whidbey and is currently under rehabilitation. Even the gardens are being restored. If you visit Coupeville, the house sits on a corner on Front St. You may find it referred to as the Haller-Brunn house as Haller built his house connected to the single story Brunn house. The house anchors a waterfront street in Coupeville with historic buildings filled with small business enterprises. Places to explore and places to eat and drink. Even a historic building where you can purchase ice cream cones.




