We ask that all Tacoma Lodge Members consider being an Officer of



## **Blast from the PAST** Blast from the Past – Ghost Towns



Two of Washington's ghost towns are Franklin and Liberty. If you read last month's CALL, the Blast from the Past was about the town of Franklin. This month the town of **Liberty** is explored. Liberty had the oldest mine in Washington. And it was a gold mine! The only living ghost town in Washington, Liberty is located in the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest, in the Swauk Mining District, originally called Williams Creek in 1850 and later renamed to Meaghersville for Thomas Meagher. Meagher is credited with finding the old gold-bearing channel of Williams Creek, although some say a small amount of gold was discovered by brothers Newton and Benton Goodwin. They moved on and when passing through the area again, struck it rich. As word spread, miners came after leaving other gold rushes.

In 1892 a post office was established. The residents wanted to name the town **Swauk**, after the creek. But the US Postal Service denied the name due to a similarly-named post office. The miners finally decided on the name **Liberty** (dates of name changes are not included as depending on what you read, the dates are not consistent).



Several companies had extensive mining operations into the 1960s. Some miners chose to remain as another mother lode could be found. There is said to be some gold to be found around Liberty and some mining activity continues. In 1974 the

town was added to the National Register of Historic Places. In touring the town one can see many historic buildings and displays of mining equipment. Some historic buildings are used by residents. In 2020, the population of Liberty was 12,003. This is a large increase from the population 10 years earlier when it was 7,591.

As a result, Matthew has a seizure disorder, cognitive deficits, and will always think like an 8-year-old, no matter how old he is. In spite of the hand he's been dealt, Matthew is very compassionate and has great enthusiasm to live his best life.

When interviewed about his experience with his Elks Therapist, Matthew said this: "Well, I was a little nervous at first, because I didn't know what to expect. The more you came to my house and I got to know you, I got to learn new things. So, it may be hard at first, but it gets easier. Yeah, getting to know you was great! We played lots of games together like puzzles, KNEX building games, Rubik's Cubes, the grocery store game and the allowance game. Turns out I'm a really good checkers player and I can even beat my dad, now! I also have 25 Gold Medals with Special Olympics! Working with you made a big change in my life and while it may not always be easy, if you get to know each other, you can learn new things."

Here is what Matthew's mom wants you to know: "The Washington Elks Therapy Program brings HOPE to families due to the DEDICATION and COMMITMENT of Elks Members over the past 67 years!"

To the Elks Therapists: I want them to know that they make a HUGE difference. I want them to know that without them people like me are lost. What they give our kids is something as parents we can't give and that breaks our hearts. You, and your people, do what we can't and for that we are eternally grateful!





### **Our History**

The moving spirit for the Elks was an Englishman named Charles Algernon Sidney Vivian. Born October 22, 1842, this son of a clergyman was a successful comic singer and dancer in the music halls of London. In November 1867, Vivian arrived in New York City to try his fortune.

Other actors and entertainers soon gravitated toward his magnetic personality. With everything closed on Sunday because of New York City Blue Laws, a group of theatrical people began meeting for their own amusement under Vivian's leadership. A loose organization was formed to make sure the larder was well-stocked for these gatherings. They called themselves the Jolly Corks, a name derived from a trick introduced by Vivian in which the uninitiated purchased a round of refreshments.

When one of their members died shortly before Christmas in 1867, leaving his wife and children destitute, the Jolly Corks decided that in addition to good fellowship, they needed a more enduring organization to serve those in need.

On February 16, 1868, they established the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and elected Vivian to head it. Its social activities and benefit performances increased the popularity of the new Order. Membership grew rapidly. Elks traveling to other cities spread the word of the Brotherhood of Elks. Soon there were requests for Elks Lodges in cities other than New York. In response to these appeals, the Elks asked the New York State legislature for a charter authorizing the establishment of a Grand Lodge with the power to establish local Lodges anywhere in the United States. When the Grand Lodge Charter was issued, the founders then received the first local charter as New York Lodge No. 1 on March 10, 1871.
