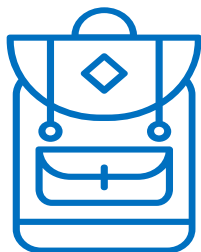


First Stop: Shanghai



Shanghai, Hu for short, also known as Shen, is a multi-cultural metropolis with both modern and traditional Chinese features. The city has a status equivalent to a province, and reports directly to the central government. Serving as the largest base of Chinese industrial technology, one of the most important seaports and China's largest commercial and financial center, Shanghai draws the attention of the whole world.

Second Stop: Huzhou



Huzhou is an important regional center city in the Yangtze River Delta of China, with a history and culture of more than 2,000 years. It is not only known as the Silk City, the Land of Fish and Rice, and the Land of Culture, but its affiliated Anji County is also known as the "Best Tourism Village of the United Nations World Tourism Organization".

Third Stop: Hong Kong



Hong Kong is the third-largest financial center in the world, following London and New York. It houses numerous financial institutions and its stock market has a total market value ranking among the top in the world. As a place where Chinese and Western cultures blend, Hong Kong is a hub of diverse cultures. It hosts numerous cultural and artistic events of international standards, as well as traditional Chinese festivals and customs.

Fourth Stop: Shenzhen



Shenzhen is located in the Lingnan region and has a profound Lingnan cultural heritage. Historical sites such as Nantou Ancient City and Guanlan Ancient Ruins carry the historical memories of Shenzhen and the traditional charm of Lingnan culture. The ancient buildings are based on the Guangdong style, integrating the styles of the Ming, Qing, and Republic of China periods, including those of Hakka, Chaoshan, and Southeast Asian regions.

Fifth Stop: Macau



The buildings in Macao blend the traditional Lingnan style of China with European elements. The Gothic-style Jiaotong Theatre in South Europe style and the Chinese-Western combined Zheng Family Mansion, among others, together form Macao's unique urban landscape. Strolling along the streets of Macao, one can feel the rich historical and cultural atmosphere.

China

- ❖ **Make sure your phone will work.**
 - Many western social media platforms such as Twitter, Gmail, and others might not work. Visitors might want to consider buying a VPN or internet. Most importantly, travelers need to check with their phone service provider to make sure their phone will work in China.
 - It can be difficult to get a Chinese sim card, but visitors will not need it because they will not be in China for long.
- ❖ **Subscribe to a VPN Service**
 - Twitter, Gmail, YouTube, Facebook, Instagram—all of them are blocked in China because of their potential to spread dissent. Visitors can get around that obstacle by using a Virtual Private Network (VPN). It's an app that routes the traffic through an international server instead, for a fee. However, it is not 100% that it will work.
 - Visitors must download a VPN app before they leave home; in China, it won't be available.
- ❖ **Download WeChat**
 - Chinese people don't use WhatsApp to chat with each other—it's banned, too. They use WeChat, the Swiss Army knife of apps that has some 900 million monthly users, mostly in Asia. WeChat is a wonder: It hails taxis, orders food delivery, enables texting and money transfers between friends, and, most importantly, serves as a payment center. If travelers can associate a credit card with a WeChat account, visitors be able to pay for things with a PIN plus a scan by the clerk at the register. This isn't just a nifty gimmick. In China, people use mobile payment more than 50 times as often as consumers in the United States.
- ❖ **Check out Alipay**
 - Right now, getting it to work if travelers don't have a Chinese bank card is a trial beleaguered by roadblocks, but improvements are being made all the time, so hopefully a door will open for foreigners soon. With Alipay and WeChat Wallet, travelers can pay nearly everywhere in China, including in taxis.
- ❖ **Portable Charger**
 - It is important to have a portable charger because there might be times when travelers cannot charge their phone through an outlet. Travelers' phones will be important to always be working.
- ❖ **Toilet Tissue/ Hand Sanitizer**
 - When travelers are in China, the place may not have toilet tissue and soap to clean a person's hands. It is imperative to bring these two necessities to China, especially if a person is bringing kids.
- ❖ **Banking**
 - There are eight from the U.S. that operate about 80 branches and representative offices in China such as: Citibank, Bank of America Merrill Lynch, BNY Mellon, East West Bank, JPMorgan Chase Bank, Morgan Stanley Bank International, and SPD Silicon Valley Bank.
 - Check with a US bank to ask which China Bank does not charge fees for money withdrawals. Travelers can also place an order with a bank or foreign currency company to exchange US to Chinese yuan (CN¥, ¥). It is best to arrive in China with Chinese yuan. Chinese. Chinese banks will also allow visitors to exchange currency; however, visitors will need to go on their free time.

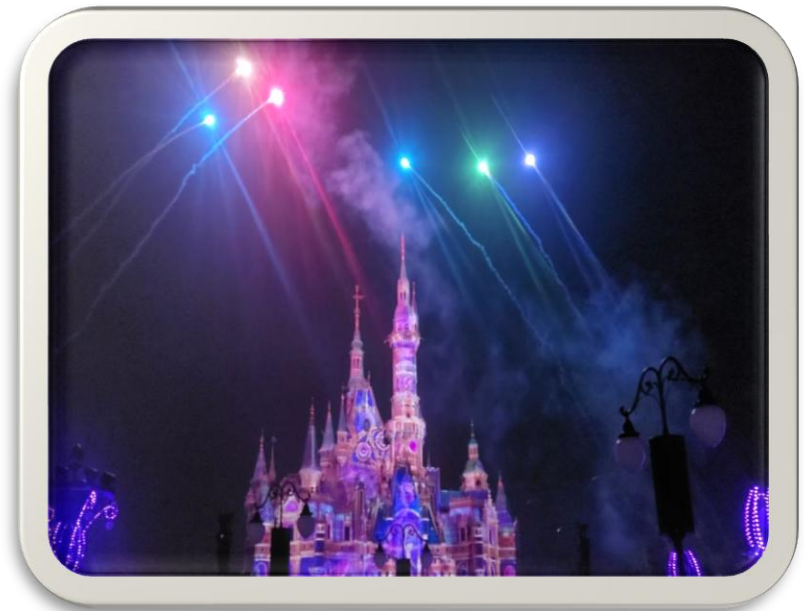

In addition, "Tron Lightcycle Power Run" in Tomorrowland is the fastest roller coaster in Disney parks worldwide. It adopts maglev technology and a futuristic design, becoming one of the most technologically advanced landmark attractions.

More than just a tower, it's a symbol of Shanghai's blend of tradition and modernity. A quick stop here lets you grasp the city's energy in one glance.
- ❖ **Shanghai Tower** isn't just about height—it's a vertical journey through culture, innovation, and the soul of Shanghai. Ride the ultra-fast elevator (18m/s!) to the 118th-floor observatory, where you'll grasp the city's story at a glance: the historic Bund's colonial architecture on one side, Pudong's futuristic skyline on the other. It's a living contrast of Shanghai's past and present. Head to the 52nd floor, and you'll find Duoyun Bookstore—a literary haven floating above the clouds. Here, you can flip through Chinese classics or modern novels while sipping tea, with floor-to-ceiling windows framing the city like a living canvas. It's where intellect meets awe. Don't miss the 126th floor's art space, home to a massive wind damper. More than an engineering marvel, it's often lit up in dynamic

- ❖ **YU Garden** isn't just a garden—it's 400 years of Shanghai's soul, packed into a masterpiece of classical Chinese design. Wander in, and you're in a living Jiangnan ink painting: pavilions hug the water, rockeries twist with hidden paths, and every turn reveals a new view framed by lattice windows. The star? *Jade Exquisite*, a porous Taihu stone that "breathes" water in rain—400 years old, still wowing. Step outside to the bazaar: steam from xiaolongbao mingles with the clink of crafts. At festivals, red lanterns blaze, dragons dance, and suddenly you're in the heart of China's festive spirit. No skyscrapers here—just Shanghai's roots, blooming beautifully.

It is located in multiple areas, such as Tianshan Tea Market in Changning District (with a wide variety of tea and tea sets, and free tasting and kung fu tea ceremony experiences are available), Dagnan International Tea Market in Jing'an District (collecting various famous teas and high-quality tea sets, with both trading and cultural exchange functions), Diweit International Tea Culture Square (with convenient transportation and often hosting tea art performances and other activities), as well as Hengda Tea Market in Pudong District and Hongqiao Tea Market in Minhang District. These tea markets not only allow you to select various types of tea (such as green tea, black tea, and Pu'er tea) and exquisite tea sets, but also enable you to deeply experience the charm of traditional Chinese tea culture through tasting, participation in cultural activities, making them must-visit places for tea lovers and tourists who want to learn about Eastern tea-drinking culture.
- ❖ **Silk Shopping Center** in Shanghai are ideal places to explore the charm of oriental silk. For instance, the Shanghai Silk Commercial Building located on Nanjing Road Pedestrian Street, as a time-honored store, offers a wide range of products including genuine silk scarves, pajamas, and custom-made clothing, with reliable quality; the Zhongsi Building on Huaihai Road gathers numerous brands, featuring

Shenzhen is thoroughly modern, with wide avenues and modern skyscrapers. Fantastic architecture is everywhere, interspersed by wonderful parks and thematic scenic spots. Not only that. Several ancient towns and villages dot the city, giving it a traditional Chinese atmosphere. Finally, since fantastic Hong Kong is just across the border, you can literally walk there. To us, the following are the 10 most interesting facts about Shenzhen city.

Macau (澳门) is a Special Administrative Region (SAR) of the People's Republic of China. Located on the southeast coast of China, it borders Guangdong Province of Chinese mainland to the north. Macau is a place where you can feel the rich Portuguese heritage fused with Chinese culture in street signs, architecture, food, and more. Its economy revolves around tourism. Macau has capitalized on its long history as a gambling center, drawing many thousands of visitors from China and Hong Kong. Foreign casino companies have invested heavily since Hong Kong tycoon Stanley Ho's decades-long monopoly on the gaming industry ended in 2002. New "mega-casinos", which include major hotel developments, have replaced traditional gambling dens.

- ❖ **Future Robotics Center** – the Future Robotics Center: A future world with robots as the theme, showcasing China's latest robot technology. It integrates children's entertainment, interactive experience, exhibitions and learning, passing down local knowledge and addressing social issues.
- ❖ **Nanxun Ancient Town** – Dujiangyan City has two World Heritage Sites, one is Dujiangyan Irrigation System, which has a history over two thousand years; the other one is Mount Qingcheng, which is a famous Taoism Mountain in China.
- ❖ **Witness the birth of a piece of tea** – Jiezi Ancient Town in Chongzhou City is located at the foot of Fengqi Mountain, linking the back mountain of Mount Qingcheng and with



Hongkong (香港) a vibrant and charming city nestled on China's southern coast, east of the Pearl River Estuary. Comprising Hong Kong Island, Kowloon, the New Territories, and 262 surrounding islands, it's a captivating blend of Eastern heritage and Western influences.

Because this is a mountain oxygen bar close to Shanghai, many famous Chinese and foreign figures-built villas here in the late Qing Dynasty, accumulating architectural styles from dozens of countries including Britain, France, and the United States. These villa complexes integrate architectural beauty with natural beauty and are also known as the "Villa Museum of All Nations."

- ❖ **The Star Avenue** is Hong Kong's Avenue of Stars, along Tsim Sha Tsui waterfront, celebrates local cinema. It features over 100 celebrities' handprints, statues of Bruce Lee and Anita Mui, and is perfect for "Symphony of Lights"—a must for film fans.

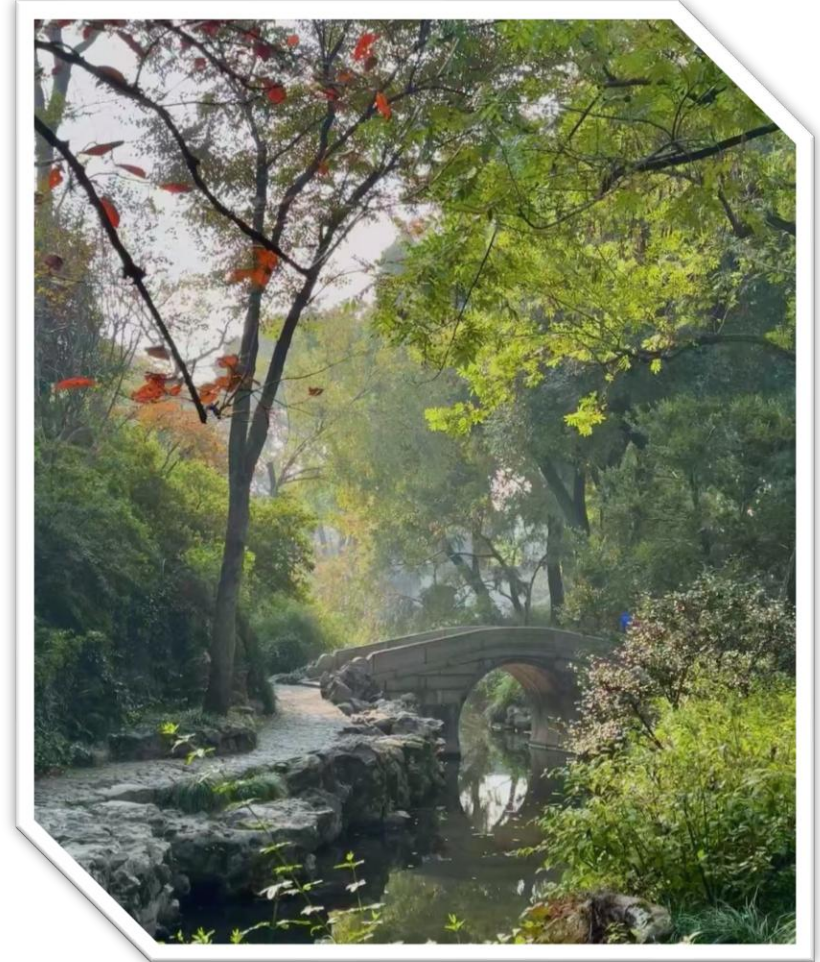

- ❖ **The Star Ferry Terminal** is a cruise and crossing the entire bay. What's particularly meaningful is that this route has a history of over a hundred years. After arriving in Central, you can take the Central Ferris Wheel.

- ❖ **Ruins of St. Paul** in 1594 was the first Western-style university in East Asia established in 1602, The affiliated Saint Paul Church began construction. It was designed by an Italian priest and involved Chinese and Japanese artisans. It was completed around 1640 and was once the most magnificent church in Asia.
- ❖ **Historical Changes** in 1762, the college was closed. The church underwent three fires but was rebuilt; in 1835, due to a fire caused by firewood, the church and the college were almost destroyed, leaving only the front wall, part of the foundation, and stone steps. Since then, the site has been used as a cemetery for clergy.
- ❖ **Status and Value** from 1990 to 1996 was restored. In 2005, it was included in the World Cultural Heritage along with the "Macau Historic District". Its Baroque architectural style combines Chinese and Japanese elements (such as stone lions, Chinese characters, and chrysanthemum carvings), and is hailed as "a three-dimensional Bible", serving as a witness to the entry of Western civilization into China and a symbol of the integration of Eastern and Western cultures in Macau.



- ❖ **Guo Ye Street** is also known as Rua do Cunha, affectionately known as "Food Street" among locals and travelers alike. Tucked away in the vibrant Taipa Village, this narrow, pedestrian-friendly lane is a sensory explosion that tells the story of Macau's unique cultural blend through its delicious offerings. Strolling down Rua do Cunha, you'll be greeted by a colorful array of storefronts, where the aromas of freshly baked pastries, savory snacks, and sweet treats fill the air. It's a place where East meets West in the most delightful way, reflecting Macau's history as a former Portuguese colony with deep Chinese roots.
- ❖ **The Venetian Resort Area** was opened on August 28, 2007, it covers an area of 10.5 million square feet and is the largest single-building hotel in Asia and the second largest building in the world.
- ❖ **Architectural Features:** The exterior is in a grand Venetian style, creating a rich Italian atmosphere around the hotel's artificial lake. The interior features Venetian-style arch bridges, canals, and stone-paved roads. The indoor artificial sky can simulate light changes, making it feel as if one is on a real Venetian Street.
- ❖ **Special Experiences:** Tourists can take a gondola to tour the indoor canal and enjoy the scenery along the way. The gondoliers will also sing. The St. Mark's Square often hosts piano recitals, mime performances, and other performances. In addition, the resort regularly holds cultural activities such as the Venice Mask Festival and Italian opera performances.

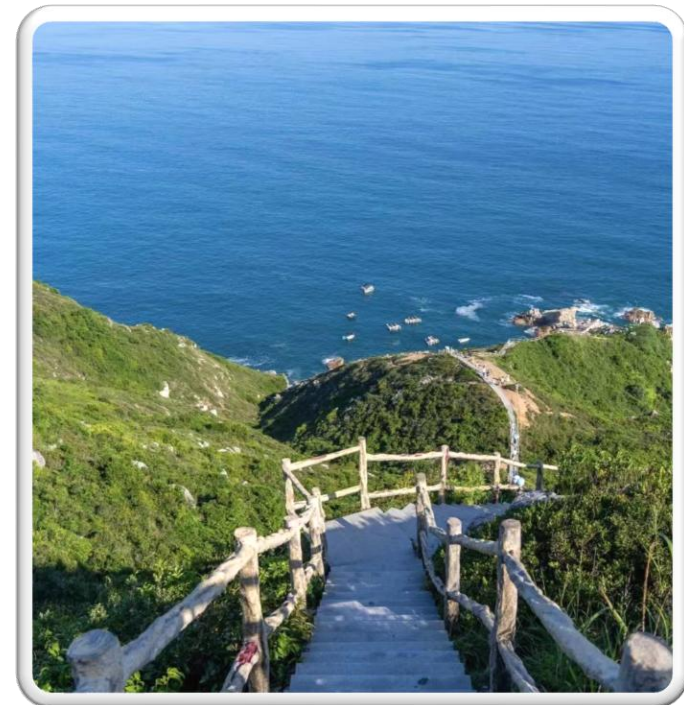
