Approval of April 27, 2021 Police Commission Meeting Minutes

Year to Date Activity Report

Between January 1 and June 30, 2021, West Hennepin Public Safety (WHPS) handled 2,341 incident complaints: 728 in Maple Plain, 1,521 in Independence.

The Criminal Part I and Part II cases for both cities have been highlighted for your review in the attached documents.

April, May, June 2021 Activity Reports

Approval of April, May, and June 2021 Claims

2021 YTD Budget & Cash Asset Report

In reviewing the 2021 Budget vs. Actual reports from January 1 to June 30, 2021, WHPS has received \$966,165 or 50.31% in income and has spent \$964,329 or 50.21%. This is a difference of \$1,836.

Balances of other accounts are listed for your review: Crime Prevention \$29,984; Reserves \$7,311 Capital Outlay \$73,235; Severance \$61,615; Military Leave PERA \$14,772; Federal Forfeiture \$31,352.

West Hennepin Joint Powers Agreement Discussion

WHPS police commissioners will discuss the current Joint Powers Agreement (JPA). Two meetings have been held regarding a review of the current JPA, funding formula and long-term stability for WHPS and both cities. WHPS is seeking direction regarding establishing a new JPA through the police commission or resigning the current JPA by both cities. Abdo, Eick, and Meyers will be present to discuss the 2022 budget and projections for 2023 and 2024.

West Command Mobile Field Force

Now that the dust has settled with the guilty verdict of Derek Chavin and Brooklyn Center has established law and order again, Hennepin Chiefs have reviewed lessons learned from both of these critical incidents. Communication between elected officials and police agencies are critical. If an officer involved shooting goes wrong you will need every resource available from the state, county and local level to maintain peace and order in your community. That stability and protection comes at a hefty price.

Hennepin County Chiefs of Police gathered all the overtime hours associated with West Command Mobile Field Force assisting Brooklyn Center. The total was well over \$400,000 just in overtime funding from local law enforcement agencies in Hennepin County. This did not include the overtime hours associated with Minnesota State Patrol, Hennepin County Sheriff's Office, National Guard or federal resources. WHPS' overtime costs associated with our officers helping Brooklyn Center was \$15,237 along with over \$4,000 in 40MM supplies provided to their CART teams to protect the fence at Brooklyn Center Police Department during the riots. I have had many discussions with multiple chiefs in Hennepin County and none of them are sending an invoice to Brooklyn Center for their mutual aid costs provided to them. The police commission will discuss the current mutual aid agreement and how it relates to WHPS' overtime expenses associated with West Command Mobile Field Force assisting Brooklyn Center.

Highway 12 Updates

On May 18, 2021, MnDOT and Park's Construction started the much-needed safety improvements on Highway 12 at County Road 90. Due to the exceptional weather conditions, construction has moved at full speed to successfully complete the project in a timely manner. Seventy (70) hour work weeks are the norm for the construction crews who are committed to getting the road back open to help our local businesses and our commute along Highway 12 return to normal. This detour is expected to last until mid-September 2021.

Over the past two months WHPS is committed to the safety of all motorists and will continue to work extremely hard to provide speed and distracted driving enforcement. An additional 90 traffic complaints were reported to our agency mainly involving speeding on local streets due to motorists avoiding the official detour.

The County Road 92 safety improvement project is to begin in the fall of 2021. Hennepin County will begin this project to improve the Highway 12 and County Road 92 intersection. A virtual house for the upcoming project will occur in late August for people who live, work and commute on both County Road 92 and Hwy 12. Hennepin County will share more information and details about the open house later this summer. To stay informed go to the following website and sign up to receive e-mail updates www.hennepin.us/county-road-92safety.

The next phase for Highway 12 is the design and development of a newly designed Highway 12 from County Road 90 to Delano. Two years ago, MnDOT provided an additional two million dollars to study the corridor and develop a road design that can be bid out and built when funds are available. KLJ was awarded the engineering project and we have had several meetings with MnDOT discussing the future design of this highway. MnDOT is planning to host a virtual open house in the next few weeks to evaluate purpose and need of improvements along Highway 12 and evaluation criteria. They will show case three or four designs for the public to weigh in on. It is anticipated this open house will occur in late August.

Police Officer Hiring Process

Officer Scott Isaacson is in his final stages of field training and is doing very well. We expect he will be on his own by the end of August if not sooner.

Building Construction Overview

Carpet has been replaced in WHPS' offices and we are in the final stages of finishing the break room and conference room. We anticipate a competition date in mid-August.

Squad Updates

WHPS is still waiting for Action Radio to start the build process for our new Chevy Tahoe. A reminder this squad will replace squad #62 (2016 Chevy Tahoe), which will be switched over to a reserve squad and Squad #65 (2016 Ford Explorer) will be sold at auction.

Our current investigator vehicle is a 2012 Dodge Durango with 175,000 miles on it. This vehicle has served its purpose and repair costs are beginning to add up. Our approved capital plan shows WHPS replacing this vehicle in 2021 at \$37,000. I am requesting approval to find a new or used investigator vehicle at or under the approved amount.

Arbitrator Body Camera Discussion

WHPS moved forward with obtaining one body worn camera from Panasonic Arbitrator for testing. The research and development process with the body worn camera was implemented over the past five weeks. WHPS officers welcome the use of body worn cameras and have been very impressed with the results during the testing phase. The testing of this unit was successful. I am requesting we move forward with the full purchase of 12 body worn cameras from Panasonic Arbitrator. This is a full implementation of body worn cameras for all officers and two additional cameras for reserve officers. Included is a quote for body worn cameras. Total cost for the project is estimated at \$27,000 with additional costs to set up each squad at Action Radio and upgrades to storage in our server room. This project was removed from our capital planning a few years ago so I am recommending we use Crime Prevention funds to purchase the body worn cameras.

Once approved WHPS will follow the state guidelines and mandates set forth in Minnesota State Statute 13.385 Portable Recording Systems. Since we already have portable recording systems with our weapon mounted cameras, I do not anticipate any issues following policy and state law to implement our body worn cameras.

Military Deployment Update

Officer Ben Raskin has returned to the United State from his National Guard Deployment in Cuba. At this time, he has not been released from his orders and was sent to another military base in Kansas. It is unknown when he will return to work at WHPS. Additional information will be provided as it is learned.

Use of Force Law Changes for Minnesota Police Officers

As mentioned at our last police commission meeting, there are still major concerns among police chiefs and all Minnesota Law Enforcement agencies about the changes to the use-of-deadly-force statute that became effective March 1, 2021. The concerns are based upon the ability to train all officers regarding the new law and interpretation of the new statute is unconstitutional.

The MN Chiefs of Police Association and the MN Sheriffs' Association have respectfully requested that legislators change the effective date of the new law from March 1, 2021, to Sept. 1, 2021. That request was denied by our legislature and did not pass in session. The current deadly force laws have not changed despite our requests.

Currently the Minnesota Chiefs of Police Association, MN Sheriffs' Association, Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association, and Law Enforcement Labor Services have filed a lawsuit against the State of Minnesota as they believe the new use of deadly force law is unconstitutional. This is a very interesting case. The press release from all these organization is attached.

West Hennepin continues to operate under this new statute and will continue training our officers to meet the guidance set forth by our legislatures.

Night to Unite Events

WHPS has been working with Maple Plain and Independence residents to locate block party captains to organize Night to Unite festivities in their neighborhoods. This year Night to Unite events are scheduled for Tuesday, August 3, 2021, from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. The block parties have been confirmed and a detailed list will be provided at the Police Commission meeting. That same list will be emailed to all council members and city staff. As a reminder, WHPS Officers, Reserves, staff, Maple Plain Fire and Loretto Fire attend all block parties to provide crime prevention messages and socialize with our citizens. Officer Cody Thompson has been heading up these events.

2022 Budget

Included in the packets is the 2022 Budget Proposal from Abdo, Eick, and Meyer. As you review the budget you will see an increase of 7.3% overall for West Hennepin Public Safety Department with an 11% increase to the City of Independence and the City of Maple Plain. Steve McDonald from Abdo, Eick, and Meyer will be presenting the 2022 budget along with projections in 2023 and 2024.

MEETING MINUTES

1. Call to Order.

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the West Hennepin Public Safety Board of Commissioners was called to order at 8 a.m. by Chairperson Marvin Johnson.

2. 2020 Audit Review by Abdo, Eick & Meyers

Director Kroells introduced Berg who performed West Hennepin Public Safety's (WHPS) 2020 financial audit. Berg went over the audit with the Police Commissioners, stating the end result was a clean audit and it went very well. The legal compliance also went well. One internal control finding was WHPS relying on the auditor to prepare its financial statements. The total fund balance increased \$8,610 in 2020. Reserves in Kind noted in the audit means hours donated by Reserve Officers in 2020. The Crime Prevention account is down due to fewer forfeited vehicles in 2020 and the purchase of Mobile Field Force (MFF) equipment.

Motion by Maas-Kusske, seconded by Betts, to accept the 2020 audit presented by Berg. All voted aye. Motion carried.

McDonald spoke next about item #3. Joint Powers Agreement Budget Discussion.

3. Joint Powers Agreement Budget Discussion

Director Kroells met with McDonald after the last Police Commission meeting. They discussed the process for a projected three-year budget and how to implement such a change in WHPS' budget process. McDonald proposed that his firm can put together a three-year budget for WHPS for a \$5,000 fee. He suggested Director Kroells establish some polices and discuss a three-year set formula for both cities. McDonald could put one-year budget together with a two-year forecast. Both could be budgeted for more

easily. He preferred a five-to-ten-year Capital Improvement Plan based on a 3-year average.

The Police Commissioners felt comfortable with a three-year JPA but further discussion is needed before going with Abdo, Eick & Meyers' proposal.

4. Approval of the January 26 and February 9, 2021, Commission Minutes There were no questions of, comments or suggestions to the January 26 or February 9, 2021, meeting minutes.

Motion by Maas-Kusske, seconded by DeLong, to approve the January 26, 2021, meeting minutes. All voted aye. Motion carried.

Motion by Betts, seconded by DeLong, to approve the February 9, 2021, special meeting minutes. All voted aye. Motion carried.

5. Review of January, February and March 2021 Activity Reports From January 1 through March 31, 2021, West Hennepin Public Safety (WHPS) has handled 1,007 incident complaints: 346 in Maple Plain, 661 in Independence.

Everyone had previously read the reports and did not request Director Kroells to highlight any particular cases.

Director Kroells reported that activity is still down due to COVID restrictions and MFF. DeLong inquired about the school bus stop arm violations in the activity reports. Director Kroells said cameras have been added to school buses so it has been easier for the bus company to report the violations. A stop arm violation is a misdemeanor. The large digital sign on Highway 12 just east of County Line Road displays a message 30 minutes before and after the Highway 12 stop location where the violations have been occurring. The message tells drivers to stop for school buses. It is believed that the delineators are confusing drivers, making them think they do not have to stop.

Director Kroells also touched on the five recent pursuits WHPS officers were involved in.

Motion by Betts, seconded by Maas-Kusske, to approve the January, February and March 2021 Activity Reports. All voted aye. Motion carried.

6. Review of Final December 2020 and the January, February and March 2021 Claims

Johnson asked what a check to All Seasons Sports and a check to A&E Pharmacy were for. Director Kroells said the check to All Seasons Sports was for embroidery on an officer's uniform. The check to A&E Pharmacy was to replace tires on their company vehicle that drove over spokes that had been deployed in one of WHPS' pursuits.

There were no further questions regarding the claims. Motion by Maas-Kusske, seconded by DeLong, to approve the final December 2020 and January, February and March, 2021 claims, subject to audit. All voted aye. Motion carried.

7. Review of 2021 YTD Budget and Cash Asset Report

In reviewing the 2021 Budget vs. Actual reports from January 1 to March 31, 2021, WHPS has received \$511,884 or 26.66% in income and has spent \$479,398 or 24.96%. This is a difference of \$32,486.

Balances of other accounts are listed for your review: Crime Prevention \$30,884; Reserves \$7,421; Capital Outlay \$104,932; Severance \$61,615; Military Leave PERA \$10,794; Federal Forfeiture \$20,369.

There were no questions of the financial reports. Motion by Betts, seconded by Maas-Kusske, to accept the 2021 Budget vs. Actual reports. All voted aye. Motion carried.

8. Review of Accrued Vacation/Vacation/Comp/Sick Time

The accrued vacation, compensation and sick time reports were reviewed. Director Kroells said that some accrued vacation hours are high because WHPS has been short-staffed and officers haven't been able to schedule time off. He expects a lot of scheduled time off this summer.

Motion by DeLong, seconded by Betts, to approve the March 2021 YTD Accrued Vacation/Comp and Sick Time reports. All voted aye. Motion carried.

9. Items of Interest-Community Events

Old Business

11. West Command Mobile Field Force

Due to the Minneapolis riots in May 2020 and recent riots and civil unrest with the Derek Chauvin trial and Daunte Wright shooting, the Hennepin County Chiefs of Police Association developed the West Command Mobile Field Force (WCMFF), a mutual aid agreement between all law enforcement agencies within Hennepin County, except Minneapolis. Each participating agency committed staff, participated in multiple trainings and equipped their officers with MFF equipment – riot gear, helmets, gas masks, chemical munitions and 40MM less lethal equipment. Six platoons of 20-25 officers each were formed. Agencies in Platoon Six are Minnetonka, Wayzata, South Lake, Minnetrista, WHPS, Orono and Deephaven. WHPS had three officers assigned to Platoon Six.

Director Kroells clarified that Operation Safety Net is a separate entity from, but works with, the WCMFF. It was created by Minneapolis Police Department, Hennepin County Sheriff's Office, MN State Patrol, MN National Guard, MN Department of Public Safety and other east metro law enforcement agencies to protect Minneapolis and St. Paul from expected civil unrest and riots, depending on the outcome of the Derek Chauvin criminal trial. Just as the trial was coming to an end Daunte Wright was shot and killed in Brooklyn Center on April 11, 2021. Civil unrest began at Brooklyn Park PD that night and the emergency call went out for WCMFF to deploy to Brooklyn Center Police Department. WCMFF was there for five days. WHPS officers who were there said days one and two were intense, they had the third day off, and the fourth day was better.

On the day Derek Chauvin's verdict was announced all six WCMFF platoons were staged and ready at two different locations in preparation for civil unrest and riots. However, because of the verdict, there was no civil unrest or riots so none of the platoons left their staging areas.

It is unsure at this time about overtime and equipment reimbursement from FEMA and Operation Safety Net but all police departments are tracking their officers' time.

Director Kroells suggested that the city councils should host a tabletop to discuss how civil unrest would be handled in Maple Plain and Independence. Temporary fencing is a huge deal in an event like this. The cities should have an agreement with a fencing company and have a fencing plan in place in an emergency situation.

12. Highway 12 Update

A virtual Highway 12 Safety Coalition meeting was held on March 4, 2021. A copy of the detour plan was included in the packets and will be sent out to local newspapers to help traffic navigate around Maple Plain and Independence. Construction for the installation of the round-about at Highway 12 and County Road 90 and the widening of Highway 12 and installation of concrete centerline barriers between County Road 6 and Baker Park Road is set to start in mid to late May. An overview of the construction was included in the packets. The contractor has 120 days to complete the two projects.

Construction at Highway 12 and County Road 92 will start later in the fall and by next spring it will be in full swing. This project is currently at 90% design. Hennepin County is working on land acquisition. Bids are expected this summer.

13. Hiring Update

A job offer was made to Scott Isaacson after he passed his background, psychological and physical exams. He is currently a Minnesota State Trooper. He is scheduled to start at WHPS on May 3, 2021, at Step 3 pay.

14. New Phone System

City of Independence and WHPS have switched to a new internet-based phone system called Ring Central. The main reason for the switch was for better internet service. The system is working well. During the switch over there was no disruption of phone service.

15. Building Construction Review

While construction has been going on there has been no disruption of city or police services. Getting windows has caused a huge delay. WHPS continues to not have a lobby for the public to come to but it should reopen sometime in July. The next phase will be to install new carpet in WHPS' office and remodel the break room and EOC facilities.

16. New Squad Arrived

The new squad, a 2021 Chevy Tahoe, has arrived and is parked in the garage, waiting to be taken to Action Radio to be built. Once in service, it will replace squad 62, a 2016 Chevy Tahoe. Squad 62 will then be assigned as the Reserve squad. The current Reserve squad, 65, a 2016 Ford Explorer, will be taken out of service and sold at auction. Director Kroells is looking at possibly ordering a Ford pickup truck for the next squad. Whatever kind of vehicle WHPS decides to order, Director Kroells wants to put the order in soon.

17. Body Worn Camera Review

Squad 72 is at Action Radio getting set up for a body worn camera. The camera itself should arrive at WHPS next week. The Crime Prevention Fund or Federal Forfeiture Fund will be used to purchase 13 cameras later this year after trying out this first one. Body camera videos are required by state statute to be kept 90 days minimum.

18. Towards Zero Deaths Grant

The Towards Zero Deaths grant funding was completed by Sgt. Rick Denneson that would specifically provide for extra patrol enforcement on Highway 12 during the construction period February through September 2021. At the very last minute, the TZD coordinator requested to add Dayton Police Department to WHPS grant. An additional \$14,000 was granted, far less than the \$48,000 that had been requested. The grant money will be used to provide extra patrol to the area during the 2021 Highway 12 construction season.

New Business

19. Use of Force Law Changes for MN Police Officers

Changes to the Use of Force statute that became effective March 1, 2021, had many police chiefs and sheriffs throughout Minnesota concerned about the ability to train all their officers in the new law and interpretation of the new statute. It was approved by legislation last year but was not relayed very well. The Attorney General's office asked for an interpretation and one was not given until January 29, 2021. Director Kroells called an emergency tabletop meeting with WHPS' officers to discuss the Use of Force law changes.

Betts felt that officers effecting traffic stops for expired tabs puts the officers at risk.

Director Kroells said the law is very clear on suicidal persons only harming themselves. WHPS officers have been advised that when they respond to a suicidal call, as long as the person is not a harm to others or actively harming themself, they should de-escalate and not engage. WHPS officers attend firearms training four times per year, tasers once per year and have simulation training coming up.

20. Joint Powers Agreements with BCA

It is time to update WHPS' current JPA with the Minnesota BCA, allowing users access to run criminal histories and do some data sharing. The JPA is renewed every five years. Motion by Johnson, seconded by Maas-Kusske, to accept and sign the required Resolution, JPA and Court Data Services Subscriber Amendment to CJDN Subscriber Agreement. All voted aye. Motion carried. Police Commission Chairman Johnson and Secretary DeLong signed the appropriate signature pages.

21. Next Police Commission Meeting July 27, 2021.

The next Police Commission meeting is scheduled for July 27, 2021, at 8 a.m.

22. Adjourn

Motion by Betts, seconded by DeLong, to adjourn. All voted aye. Motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 8:43 a.m.

SUBJECT: April 2021 ACTIVITY REPORT

The purpose of this report is to give the reader a quick overview of the activities of the Public Safety Department each month. It also compares monthly and year-to-date information to the reader.

The report is broken down into five categories, as defined by the Criminal Justice Reporting System.

CRIMINAL-- Criminal is broken down into Part I and Part II crimes.

Part I includes crimes against persons versus crimes against property; criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery assault, aggravated assault, burglary -breaking or entering, larceny-theft, larceny analysis, motor vehicle theft and arson.

Part II includes other assaults, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property, buying, receiving, possession; vandalism, weapons, carrying, possessing, etc.; prostitution and commercialized vice, sex offenses; drug abuse violations, gambling, offenses against the family and children, driving under the influence, liquor laws, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, all other offenses, suspicion, curfew and loitering laws - persons under 18; and runaways - persons under 18.

- TRAFFIC-- Includes violations of the road and driving laws.
- PART III-- Lost and Found: Includes lost and found persons, animals, and property, and stalled and abandoned vehicles.
- PART IV-- Casualties: Includes all motor vehicle accidents, boating, and snowmobile; public home occupational accidents, fires, suicides, sudden deaths, burning permits, and burning violations.
- PART V-- Miscellaneous Public: Includes open doors, gun permit applications, suspicious activities, animal complaints, motorist assists, alarm calls, parking complaints, house checks, driving complaints, civil matters, family disputes, department assists.

The balance of the report shows the total number of incidents handled, miles driven and how the Public Safety Department received calls. If anyone should desire more detailed statistical data, please contact my office.



WEST HENNEPIN PUBLIC SAFETY April 2021 Activity Report

Year to Date Activity Report

At the end of April 30, 2021 West Hennepin Public Safety (WHPS) handled year-to-date a total 1,378 incident complaints: For the month of April 203 occurred in the City of Independence and 111 in the City of Maple Plain.

Recent Highlighted Cases:

CRIMINAL-- Criminal is broken down into Part I and Part II crimes.

Part I includes crimes against persons versus crimes against property; criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery assault, aggravated assault, burglary -breaking or entering, larceny-theft, larceny analysis, motor vehicle theft and arson.

Part II includes other assaults, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property, buying, receiving, possession; vandalism, weapons, carrying, possessing, etc.; prostitution and commercialized vice, sex offenses; drug abuse violations, gambling, offenses against the family and children, driving under the influence, liquor laws, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, all other offenses, suspicion, curfew and loitering laws - persons under 18; and runaways - persons under 18.

- TRAFFIC-- Includes violations of the road and driving laws.
- PART III-- Lost and Found: Includes lost and found persons, animals, and property, and stalled and abandoned vehicles.
- PART IV-- Casualties: Includes all motor vehicle accidents, boating, and snowmobile; public home occupational accidents, fires, suicides, sudden deaths, burning permits, and burning violations.
- PART V-- Miscellaneous Public: Includes open doors, gun permit applications, suspicious activities, animal complaints, motorist assists, alarm calls, parking complaints, house checks, driving complaints, civil matters, family disputes, department assists.

The balance of the report shows the total number of incidents handled, miles driven and how the Public Safety Department received calls. If anyone should desire more detailed statistical data, please contact my office.



Dog Bite

CRIMINAL-- Criminal is broken down into Part I and Part II crimes.

Part I includes crimes against persons versus crimes against property; criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery assault, aggravated assault, burglary -breaking or entering, larceny-theft, larceny analysis, motor vehicle theft and arson.

Part II includes other assaults, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property, buying, receiving, possession; vandalism, weapons, carrying, possessing, etc.; prostitution and commercialized vice, sex offenses; drug abuse violations, gambling, offenses against the family and children, driving under the influence, liquor laws, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, all other offenses, suspicion, curfew and loitering laws - persons under 18; and runaways persons under 18.

- TRAFFIC--Includes violations of the road and driving laws.
- PART III--Lost and Found: Includes lost and found persons, animals, and property, and stalled and abandoned vehicles.
- Casualties: Includes all motor vehicle accidents, boating, and snowmobile; public PART IV-home occupational accidents, fires, suicides, sudden deaths, burning permits, and burning violations.
- Miscellaneous Public: Includes open doors, gun permit applications, suspicious PART V-activities, animal complaints, motorist assists, alarm calls, parking complaints, house checks, driving complaints, civil matters, family disputes, department assists.

The balance of the report shows the total number of incidents handled, miles driven and how the Public Safety Department received calls. If anyone should desire more detailed statistical data, please contact my office.



Minnesota law enforcement organizations believe new use of deadly force law is unconstitutional

(St. Paul, Minn.) – Today Minnesota's largest law enforcement organizations filed a state lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of the 2020 law change regarding a peace officer's rights to use deadly force.

The court filing can be found here.

In the summer of 2020, the Minnesota State Legislature amended the statutes that describe the acceptable uses of force for police officers, including Minnesota Statute §§ 609.06 and 609.066. Minnesota Statute § 609.066 establishes an affirmative defense for a criminal charge related to the use of force by a police officer, establishing the parameters for the right to use deadly force in protection of the officer or others. This lawsuit speaks to all citizens' 5th Amendment right against self-incrimination, among other concerns.

The Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association (MPPOA), the Minnesota Sheriffs' Association (MSA), the Minnesota Chiefs of Police Association (MCPA), and Law Enforcement Labor Services (LELS) are collectively challenging the new language to ensure peace officers have a sound law that they can rely on for guidance in deadly force situations and the public has a strong statute that will hold officers accountable when warranted.

"Minnesota's police organizations are committed to upholding the law and serving the communities they are sworn to protect," said Minnesota Sheriffs' Association Executive Director Bill Hutton. "In order to do so, however, all Minnesotans, including community members and police officers, require clarity in the law."

The lack of the new law's clarity has already resulted in refusal by some police chiefs and sheriffs in neighboring states to provide assistance to other local law enforcement agencies in Minnesota. Some law enforcement agencies in North Dakota, for example, have removed their officers from interstate task forces.

Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association Executive Director Brian Peters said, "The process that led to last year's law change was rushed under unprecedented circumstances. This law should have been fixed, but since the legislative session has now concluded, it is necessary to turn to the legal system."

The law enforcement organizations had pushed the 2021 Minnesota State Legislature for a delay in implementation of the new statute, but those efforts failed. A delay would have given police chiefs and sheriffs additional time to train the more than 10,000 sworn peace officers in Minnesota.

"This law is not only unconstitutional - but impractical in terms of training resources and a rushed timeline," said Law Enforcement Labor Services Executive Director Jim Mortenson. "When it comes to laws regarding the use of deadly force, it is imperative that we get it right."

According to Minnesota Chiefs of Police Association Executive Director Jeff Potts, "The use of deadly force is one of the most critical aspects of a police officer's duties. Minnesota's police chiefs are committed to training officers to the highest standards possible. The law must be constitutional in order to ensure a transparent process and a just outcome for everyone involved in these types of cases."

The Minnesota Chiefs of Police Association (MCPA), the Minnesota Sheriffs' Association (MSA), and the Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association (MPPOA) represent the state's 300+ police chiefs, 87 county sheriffs, and approximately 10,400 rank-and-file officers, respectively. Law Enforcement Labor Services (LELS) is Minnesota's largest public safety labor union (6,400+ members) specializing in representing law enforcement, fire, dispatch, corrections, and public safety support staff.
