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The Book of Job: Blessed Be the Name of the Lord!

I find it difficult to be thinking ahead to Lent today. Seems like we just followed the star to Bethlehem and already I'm planning services about Jesus' suffering and death. Perhaps that is the necessary center of the Christian faith because Christ's suffering and death on the cross are always present - even in Christ's birth.

The ministry team and I have been planning our Lenten services for this year. We have decided on the theme: "The Book of Job: Blessed Be the Name of the Lord!" I've never used this theme before and I have never preached a series on the book of Job. However, while challenging, I know we will be blessed by it because one of the Bible's greatest wisdom books is the book of Job. Therefore, this Lent we will explore this magnificent composition that is numbered among the greatest literature of all time. We will dig deeply into Job's central message and supporting truths.

We all suffer-personally and privately. We also suffer in more public ways. A husband loses a job. A child gets divorced. A parent dies. And now, thanks to the media, we are able to see and experience more and more of the world's catastrophes and suffering. We need the book of Job, now, more than ever.

Martin Luther asserted that "Job is magnificent and sublime as no book of Scripture." Others have called Job "the Shakespeare of the Bible." The early Christian scholar Jerome perhaps put it best when he called the book of Job an "eel," since the more one tries to contain it, the slipperier it becomes! The purpose of our Lenten emphasis is to learn how to apply Job to our lives so that the book becomes less like an eel and more like a loving companion through life's dark valleys. Preaching plans are as follows:

Lent 2 Learning to Lament (Job 3:1-26)

Lent 3 It Is Enough (Job 14:1-14)

Lent 5 God Speaks in the Storm (Job 38:1-11)

Maundy Thursday On Earth Is Not His Equal! (Job 41:20-34)

Good Friday Tenebrae (Service of Darkness)

The Resurrection of Our Lord I Know That My Redeemer Lives! (Job 19:23-26)

Job's most famous statement appears in 19:25, "I know that my Redeemer lives." Christ is alive. He has conquered death and the grave. His word is sufficient. His grace is enough. His love brings comfort and healing. And this Lent these gifts come to us through the book of Job.

Please join us for the beginning of this Lenten journey on Ash Wednesday, February 14th, at either noon or 7:00 p.m. Yes, I know this is Valentine's Day but there is no better way to celebrate our love for each other than hearing about God's love for us. With the exception of Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday all Lenten services are held at both noon and 7:00 p.m.



What is the purpose of the MITES box that is sitting in the Narthex?

The money that is collected in the MITES box helps support mission work all over the world through the LWML. Each congregation is asked to collect "spare change" (or spare checks) from its members. That money is sent to the FL/GA District LWML and 10% of that money is sent to the national LWML. If every member gave .50 a year we would be contributing about \$150 a year. That's about what BLC contributes...actually a little less. If we change that to .50 a month/person, we could increase our contribution to \$1800 just by throwing in 2 quarters every month!!

As everyone knows, it never snows in Florida and the desert is always hot. We have spent most of December and January in the "high desert". We bring you greetings from St. John's, Bullhead City, AZ; Ascension, Apple Valley, CA. The desert has its own unique beauty, especially if you like earth tones. It also keeps you on your toes with regard to maybe having to disconnect your water hose at night. We are currently parked in southern California, just 50 miles east of Santa Barbara, which has been ravaged by fire, then mud. The sound guy at our next church hasn't been to work since early December. His commute on US 101 North has been blocked since the fires started. Everything seems normal in this nice campground, but 'just over there' - not so much.

Living on the road we think about being prepared for many different scenarios. At any moment we could be in a situation that puts us 'just over there'. But being prepared really means being open to what happens next. You can't foresee every possibility. Stuff happens. Much you can prepare for. Some you just don't see coming. And we always have ideas - preconceptions - about that next place. When we get there, we have to empty out most of those notions and replace them with what we actually see. Even that is not the whole story. We're only there for a week. Case in point: our fourth trip to Apple Valley revealed some trails, and points of interest we had not known, but which now seem obvious. Out with the old...

When Jesus called his first disciples, they were not at all prepared for the adventure waiting for them 'just over there', but they were open (is that the right word?) to leaving their jobs, their families, and their stuff for Jesus' sake. They brought along a load of mental baggage, which Jesus patiently removed, piece by piece. Even Pentecost didn't clear all the clutter. (See Acts 10: "What? Even Gentiles can be in the Kingdom?!?") I want to be prepared for Jesus to make me useful. And sure, you have to be open. But when Jesus arrives with a moving van and your house is already full...what happens then? Take heart. His moving van always arrives with a companion dumpster.

How Can We Get To God?

I was listening to a song by a Christian artist the other day, and he sang a line that caught my attention. The phrase was, "Have I tried to scale Your walls in vain?" Listening to the song, it was clear that this singer yearned to be united with His Maker, with nothing separating the two of them. The question of whether or not, or to what extent, that desire can be realized is a worthy question, but it wasn't the question that first came to mind. The question I asked myself first was, "Do we need to scale God's walls? Does He want us to scale His walls?" It got me thinking about the various ways that mankind has tried to close the distance between ourselves and our Maker over the centuries. Theologians typically divide these efforts into three categories.

- 1. **Morality.** This attempt to reach God involves the will. It's all about seeking to "do the right thing." Entire religions are built around this, with duties to be performed and checked off a list as the believer makes their way to God. It even creeps into our Christianity sometimes when we equate being a Christian with certain behaviors or political parties. Of course, as Lutherans we are pretty solid in our understanding that morality is not the way to reach God. And thank goodness, because who among us could ever say that he has done enough?!?
- 2. **Mysticism.** This one is trickier. It's focused on the emotions, bent on establishing some kind of visceral, gut-level, connection with God. It tends to use a lot of "personal relationship" language and is focused not on doing the right things so much, but rather, feeling the right things. If you have ever left church saying, "God was really at work today I could feel it," (as I admit I have done,) you know how sneaky mysticism can be. It can be oh-so tempting to evaluate God and His work based on how we feel about things. Unfortunately, as Scripture states, "the heart is deceitful above all things." So our feelings are not exactly reliable, and thus, neither is mysticism.
- 3. **Mind.** This one is probably the trickiest, most misleading way of the bunch. It has to do with the intellect; with learning, reason, and logic. The path of the mind tells us we can get to God by thinking the right thoughts. The reason this is so tricky is because we do, of course, want to think and believe only true things about God. However, we are not saved by our works including our mental works. Just thinking the right stuff cannot save us. After all, who among us is able to claim that we always think and believe correctly, with no straying thoughts whatsoever?

These three attempts to reach God - morality, mysticism, mind - have a couple things in common. First, the motion; they all move from us, upward, to God. Striving to "get at Him." Second, they all fail. But that's ok. Because we don't need to "get at God." He has gotten at us. We don't need to scale God's walls. He has entered our world. That's what Christmas was about. That's what Epiphany was about. That's what Lent is about. God entering our world, putting Himself among us. For us. In Christ, God bridged the gap. In Christ, He closed the distance.

God is not holed up in a castle, waiting for us to use our will, feelings, or intellect to connect with Him. In Christ, God has come to us. And He continues to come to us. This truth is particularly worth pondering this Lenten season. Our efforts to scale God's walls will always fail. The only way we get connected with God is if He comes to us. This Lent, I would strongly urge you to make regular attendance at our Lenten services a habit. It is there - in Christ's Word proclaimed and His Body and Blood distributed - that God comes to you. No climbing gear needed.
