Serve the Lord with gladness. Psalm 100 (KJV)

To be free is a wonderful thing. Most of us want more freedom. One of the things that spoils life is that you have to do things at certain times of the day. You have to go to work. You have to go to this meeting or that class. You're a teacher in a school or a worker in a store, shop or office. If you didn't have to fit yourself into the boss' way of doing things, your life would be easy. We have all these constraints and restraints and "must do's" in life. If only we could be free to go where we wish and do what we want. Now that would be freedom.

Independence! Why is it that once you've got it, you aren't satisfied until you have more and more . . . and then some more. We forever want to be free from something. God's purpose is that we be free *for* something. And therein lies a secret. Jesus, on the cross, broke through the chains that bind us. The secret is not in getting away from it all. The secret is in converting all the stifling duties of our existence into grand avenues for service and accomplishment.

We say Jesus went to the cross voluntarily. Well, the cards were stacked against him. False witnesses put the pressure on. Wicked authorities, knowing him to be innocent, delivered him up to be crucified. Roman soldiers made it inevitable. There were constraints everywhere. But Jesus took all the tyranny and rose above it. He laid hold of what he was forced to do and used it to fulfill the purpose of his Father for this world. He dedicated his misery and drudgery to the Lord.

What I am suggesting, very practically, is that Jesus and the cross show us a way out of the stuck and cornered feelings which the responsibilities of life have laid upon you. You simply lay hold of them to use them

to do God's will on earth as it is done in heaven. That way you are able to live your life under God's grace in any and every circumstance and you are now free to do what you choose under grace.

I want to encourage you, brothers and sisters in Christ, to dedicate to God each boring task and dreaded responsibility you face today. Do everything you have to do for him. Change "have to" to "want to." Even in *this* Jesus will set you free. This will change how you live and give you freedom you never knew existed.



Luther on Calling A Pastor

Last night I sat in on a Call Committee meeting, as they prepared to present Bethlehem with the next phase in the church's call process: the gathering of nominations for consideration. Anytime I am in attendance at church meeting I am always interested to see how God provides for His Church through the means of His people - their skills, talents, and even opinions. I pray that as you go forward in this calling process, you, too, will be impressed with the mystery of how God accomplishes things through the most ordinary people - us.

Anyway, I had sat in on the meeting last night, and then this morning in my devotional reading, I ran across this quotation from Martin Luther that speaks to this very topic. Coincidence? Probably not. Here it is.

"The ministry will endure and is not to be replaced by any other. But the incumbents of this ministry do not remain; they die. This necessitates an ever-new supply of preachers, which call for the employment of certain means. The ministry, that is, the Word of God, Baptism, and Holy Communion, came directly from Christ; but later Christ departed from this earth. Now a new way of sending was instituted, which works through man but is not of man. We were sent according to this method; according to it, we elect and send others, and we install them in their ministry to preach and to administer the sacraments. This type of sending is also of God and commanded by God. Even though God resorts to our aid and to human agency, it is He Himself who sends laborers into His vineyard.

Therefore everyone [who preaches] must realize that he has been sent. That is, he must know that he has been called; he dare not venture to sneak into the office furtively and without authorization. It must be done in the open. The sending is done through man, for example, when a city, a prince, or a congregation calls someone into office. But at the same time this person is sent by God."

There's a lot that could be unpacked from Luther's words here. I will limit myself to two observations. First, one of the final points Dr. Luther makes is that men must not be "sneaking" into the office of the public ministry. Everything should be above board. The man should fit the qualifications listed in Scripture, he should be properly trained and prepared, and the entire call process must be "done in the open." There is no room for subterfuge when it comes to carrying out the tasks Christ has given his Church. On the one hand, this protects the people from bad, "self-made" pastors who shouldn't be realistic options in the first place. On the other hand, it protects the pastor from the scourge of uncertainty. Because everything is done in the open, with no "secret agendas" at work, when a pastor *is* called to a particular congregation, there is no room in his mind for confusion or divided allegiances. Once he accepts a call to a congregation, those who have called him become his spiritual concern. There is no doubt that he is the one who has been called to that place, because the entire process has been "done in the open."

The second observation is just what we opened with. God works through means. He works through bread and wine. He works *through* the words of absolution spoken in the Divine Service. He works, yes, *through you*, as well. God be with you as you seek to serve as His means - to provide for His Church!

Martin Luther grew up in a wealthy family. I say this because his parents could afford college, and back then most people couldn't afford college. After almost being struck by lightning Luther decided to be a monk. Martin's dad was upset because he didn't go to college for that, he and his family wanted him to become a lawyer. Once Martin became a monk he studied the Bible, and started to translate it so the people could read it as well. He did not agree with the current teachings of the Church, so he wrote against the indulgences, called the Ninety-Five theses and nailed the list on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. The pope was not happy with Martin and eventually Martin went to jail. Martin had people upset with him but he still preached what was in his heart. Martin eventually married Katharina, von Bora. she became a nun at the age of 16, but fell in love with Martin after agreeing with his writings, They had six children. Martin travelled a lot. His work started a new church that kept him wry busy, and his stayed with him. Martin prayed his last prayer at 3:00 A.M. on February 18. 1546. A lot of people followed Luther's body back to the castle church where he nailed the ninety-five theses to the door. They buried his body in the floor before the pulpit where he preached. Word spread out quickly, and people believed in Luther's teaching, and the Reformation grew. Lutheran religion is still going on 500 years later, because Luther never wavered from the truth.
