More than Conquerors

*“What, then, shall we say in response to this? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all -- how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? **Romans 8:31-32***

St. Paul had gotten the word that a little mixed group of Jew and Gentile Christians in Rome was beginning to wonder what good there was in Christianity and why they were going through all sorts of hellish things because of their faith. The whole thing was making him lose sleep at night. What, he asked himself, are you going to say? What, after all, can you say? It doesn't seem right. Why do the righteous suffer and why do the wicked always seem to get the reward? Finally Paul picked up the pencil, licked the end of it, decided to be a little more formal (after all, the words had to go down the centuries and stand the test of time), and wrote, “What, then, shall we say in response to this?” And then it came, the perfect answer, the only answer: “If God is for us, who can be against us?” Notice no fancy, philosophical insight, no logical arranging of the facts to suit his purpose. Just the simple fact . . . God is for us.

Well, that would do it, if it were true. It is! I can prove it: “He did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all.” That does it. Of course, he is for us. The gift of his

own Son, his life and death, is all the proof you need. I mean, if he gave up his Son for us all, to die for us, you can count on the rest. “How will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things?”

Now, don't get me wrong. I don't always wake up in the morning feeling like a conqueror. I don't always go to bed feeling like I've lived like a conqueror throughout the day. But this I know, God is with me in my sleeping and in my waking and, therefore, nothing can be against me and separate me from God's love. That promise was for Paul, for the church in Rome, for me and for you.

Paul could only have come up with that promise by inspiration, the perfect answer, the satisfying response to every human need or circumstance: “If God is for us, who can be against us.”

It is a wonderful gift to present Law and Gospel, grounded in Christ's death and resurrection with a warm, engaging style, and you do it well. A special word of appreciation also to Sabra, whose contribution from the side was significant and marked by the humility of servanthood.

May God continue to guide and bless your intentionally itinerant ministry!

Thank you for the amazing warm welcome you have shown me in my first month here. I have loved meeting you all and look forward to learning from each of you. Thank you to the amazing crew who helped me unpack and who prepared the house for my arrival. Thank you to the Holy Smokers for an amazing welcoming meal. Thank you to all for the incredible gifts you have given to fill my pantry. And lastly, thank you for all your kind words and support through this first month. You have all been so amazing. Thank you!

Amidst my Thank You note writing, I began to wonder. If I wrote a Thank You note to God, what would it say? My typical Thank You notes are only 3-5 lines, how long would my Thank You note to God end up being? Do I have enough paper? Right now, things are going well for me, so I have a long list of things to thank God for. How much shorter has the list been when things weren't going as well?

There is a song called "Even If" released last year by

a Christian group named MercyMe. The song talks about knowing that God is capable of removing any struggle and any suffering. But even if He doesn't, He is still God. Even if things don't go the way we hope they will, he is still where our hope belongs. He still gave his Son to die for us and raised him to life to redeem us from sin and death. During the liturgy, we have a prayer after Communion that is called the Prayer of Thanksgiving. When I was younger, I was really confused at this point because I thought that Thanksgiving was just the holiday in November. The Prayer of Thanksgiving may not have anything to do with Turkey, but it does have to do with saying "Thank You" to God for the incredible gift that the meal at his altar is. We thank him for the Lord's Supper and for strengthening us in body and soul.

St. Paul writes in Romans 8:38-39, " For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present or the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord" That is something to always exclaim "Thank you" to God for.

This is a wonderful fellowship and outreach opportunity. All the ladies and teen girls of Bethlehem are invited, as well as their guests. Ask your family and friends to come. The event is sponsored by the Lutheran Women's Missionary League of Bethlehem. There is no cost. Advance registration is required.

Volunteers are needed to make the event successful. Approximately ten women will host tables, decorating them with their own china, linens, flatware and glasses. Guests will register in advance to sit at these tables. Hosts will be able to reserve seats for their guests and friends.

Volunteers are also needed to bring food, assist with decorations, take registrations, and other duties. Signup sheets will be available soon. Consider how you might get involved. Watch the weekly church bulletins for updates.

"Advent by Candlelight" has been popular at churches in other parts of the country. Now, it will be at Bethlehem for the first time!

Title: Luther: The Graphic Novel

The reformer, Martin Luther, was an important man who began a widespread change in the Christian church. It all began in Eisleben Germany in 1483 when Martin Luther was born. The very next day his father took him to get baptized. He was named after Saint Martin of Tours. Back then, for children, it was common to be named for the saint day one was born on. Martin was a child with many anxieties. He was fearful of not being able to earn God's forgiveness because of his sins.

In 1505 Martin Luther became a monk of the Augustinian Order of Hermits. He dedicated himself to study, pray and worship many times each day. As a monk he said he would not marry and he would give up his personal possessions. In a very short time he was asked to become a priest. He went as a representative to Rome seeking answers, but only had more questions. In 1512 he completed a doctor of theology degree. The turning point for Martin Luther was when he studied Romans 1:16-17. He preached to end indulgences.

On October 31, 1517 Martin Luther hoped to end the practice of indulgences by nailing the 95 theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. Luther copied and sent out copies of the 95 theses to churches throughout Germany. After his disobedience to the Catholic Church, he was declared a heretic. A heretic is a person who no longer believes or teaches as the church does.

In October of 1518 Martin Luther went before Cardinal Cajetan three times. Each time he was asked to recant the 95 theses. But he refused and defended himself. But Emperor Charles V was frustrated and angry. Martin Luther's friends arranged for him to be kidnapped in order to try and save his life. He hid at Wartburg Castle and took a new name of Knight George. He stayed there in hiding, and during that time the churches went into chaos and were divided. When he came back Martin Luther restored order to the church. After 1526 he wrote the Small Catechism to help all people understand the Christian faith.

Katharina von Bora was born in 1505 and became a nun. She and other nuns sent a secret message to Martin Luther. She loved another man but he left and did not return. Her heart was broken but she fell in love with Martin Luther and married him on June 25, 1525. They had six children. He was a stick father but loved them very much. Through his travels he wrote long letters to his family. During his travels he became ill.

You can donate your time and/or experience in serving Jesus and the Church. We need a list of volunteers and from there we hope to have enough to make call lists to allow for service needed by each volunteer to be limited to maybe once or twice a year. We have a large congregation so this should be easily accomplished.

We have had quite a turnover within the congregation over the time of my membership, 7 or 8 years. Either with life lost, relocations, both in and out. I am sure some may not realize the great opportunities we have to serve our Lord. All the women are members of LWML as a member of the Lutheran Church. The Child in the Pew

When little children come to church, adults sometimes wonder why! Actually, bringing children into the sanctuary is something like letting them eat at the dinner table. Even though their manners are far from elegant, it's done in the hope that, given time, they'll begin to feel a part of the family.

Children giggle, they poke, and they swing their legs simply because they're children. But they also sing, pray and give with us. So this page is written to suggest that we adults should accept - even value - the children's restlessness during worship, trusting that they are also learning:

- . that it's important to come to this place each Sunday,
- . that they belong to this special company of people,
- . that the sights and sounds and feels of the sanctuary are good, though not always understandable,
- . that something is expected of them in this place, and that they may respond in song, in prayer and in offering.

Bringing a child to church can be a real exercise in aggravation. But then again, so are many other facets of parenting, and the rewards are well worth the effort-. While we do not want our children to be disruptive or hamper the church's worship, we must remember that baptized children are members of the church. Children should be among the worshiping people. They may not participate in just the same way adults do, but they are growing in understanding and teaming to take their places in the church family.

Young children in worship may have bad moments, but it is their birthright as Christians to worship. Our satisfaction comes in later years when we see them stand in the midst of the church with a faith of their own.



Safe and Secure Online P@sswords

Create Strong, Complex Passwords

Combine lower case, upper case, numbers, and special characters such as # \$!

Use substitute letters or characters in common words to help make the password more complex, while easier to remember like E=3 a=@

Examples:

S = \$ I = ! o = 0 B = 8

Try a "Passphrase"

String several words together in a phrase that's easy for you and the kids to remember such as "ilovebunnyr@bbits!" instead of the single password "rabbits." Passphrases are significantly stronger than an individual (pass)word.

Change your passwords often!

Do not reuse the same password for different sites and devices.

Talk to kids about privacy and explain why we have passwords—to keep private information private and to keep the bad guys out.

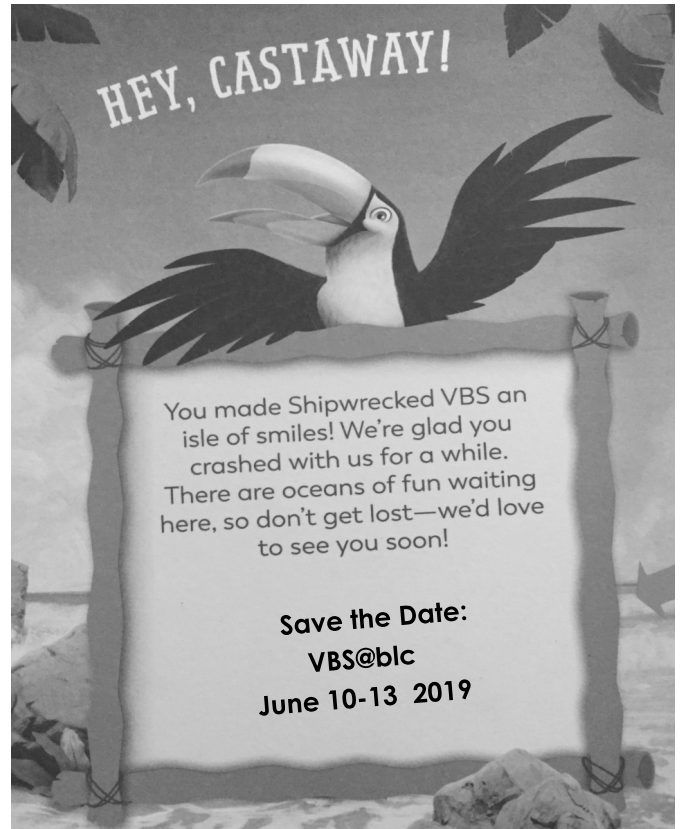
Don't forget to use passwords at lock screens on all mobile devices and computers! This means laptops, phones, tablets, or anywhere you have the option to use a password.
