BLC: THE BODY OF CHRIST

"The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; ... So it is with Christ."

I Corinthians 12:12

St. Paul makes a point worth repeating in the twelfth chapter of his first letter to the Christians in Corinth. It is eminently worth your while to read that excellent chapter. It's all based on the presumption that we who are Christians together make up the body of Christ.

Around the fifteenth verse Paul makes a vital point. He writes about how very well the individual members of your body relate to one another. You never hear your right arm criticizing your left, or even acting as if it would like to occasionally. And this in spite of the fact that old lefty doesn't really pull its share of the load, and couldn't, weak as it is. Your right arm doesn't get all upset that, when the work is done, the left arm gets as much credit for it as the right. Being stronger it just naturally takes over the bulk of the work, carries some of the burdens which might naturally fall to its counterpart on the other side. And if your left arm ever gets in trouble or is hurt, the right arm asks no questions, doesn't raise itself in obvious impatience and disgust, but instantly pushes right on over and holds the wound and even, if necessary, applies the bandage.

That is such an apt description of the way it ought to work with Christians. St. Paul can't help but use it, calling us all together Christ's body and thinking of us separately as its members. It keeps cropping up, this picture for the holy Christian church, all through the great Apostle's letters. You can see a hundred ramifications in that picture. And you can put them to work in a hundred different ways.

This body was actively working together during Advent and Christmas here at Bethlehem. You could feel it everywhere you looked or listened. From Advent By Candlelight (ABC) to the choir, bells, and praise team; from the trees decorated inside and out; from the Altar Guild, Elders and Church Council; from our Outreach and In-reach ministries; from the staff to our worship; from our members each participating, helping and serving in their own ways . . . this is what the Body of Christ looks like. Personally, I am so grateful to be a part of this body.

As the Apostle Paul began his letter to the church in Corinth, so too I say to you: "I always thank God for you in Christ Jesus. For in him you have been enriched in every way—in all your speaking and in all your knowledge – because our testimony about Christ was confirmed in you" (I Cor. 1: 4-6).

May our "body parts" continue to work together so that our testimony about Christ is confirmed in us and Christ is glorified.

He came. And this He did so that He might bear the sin of His sin-scarred creation and set it right again. He came. He lived. He died. He rose in triumph. He ascended to the Father's right hand. And He is coming back at any moment.

This message is not merely a joy for us to treasure only in our hearts, in such a way that we tell no one. This joy is what sent the shepherds to find and to report what they had come to know. And it is this joy that has caused you to partner with us so that the people of the Czech Republic may hear, rejoice, and await with us ... all of us.

We pray that this Christmas season may fill you with heavenly joy. May those mater-of-fact words fill your hearts with great gratitude and indescribable joy that you may praise the Lord who came and that you, too, may tell those around you the joy of Christ in the flesh, having come for the salvation of all!


Mission House



2020 Bible Study Pro Tips

Greetings, people of God! I hope you have settled comfortably into the year 2020. You've had a month to get acclimated by now. It always takes me a while to get the date right, let alone figure out how to handle my "New Year's Resolution" I made a month ago. Usually the question is, "Shall I modify it, or just pretend I never made it to begin with?"

Now, if your goal was a more fit 2020, or a more ruggedly handsome looking 2020, I'm not your guy. (Duh.) But - if your goal was getting to know the Bible better, I have a few suggestions.

- Keep the bigger story in mind. The Bible tells the story of God's creation: fallen, redeemed in Jesus, and even, its ultimate restoration. If you're reading a biblical narrative or verse, where does it fall in that story? Forget about the confusing minor detail for just a bit and focus on what part of the bigger story is being told just then. Then...
- 2. Look for Jesus. Jesus said that all the Torah and Prophets and Psalms were written about *Him*, so if you're reading the book of Leviticus, the story of Joseph or Sampson, or even [especially?] a Psalm, ask yourself, "Where is Jesus here? Does it remind me of Him? Is He its opposite?" He's in there; somewhere, somehow.
- 3. Read about the Bible, not just the Bible itself. It's a very good practice to use (reputable) resources that aren't the actual Bible in your Bible study. The books that make up the Bible all come out of certain contexts, and anything that can help you learn about those contexts is going to help you understand what the authors of Scripture were getting at and how it applies to your life today. I normally avoid "Study Bibles," as they often turn into "axe-to-grind" Bibles trying to shoehorn all of God's Word into something immediately relevant for a "Women's Bible" or a "Teen Bible." So, with that caveat mentioned, I do heartily recommend the Lutheran Study Bible available from our church body's publishing house, CPH. It is not perfect but it is hands down the most helpful tool for lay readers that I have found.
- Be humble. God's written word is complicated and can be confusing. It confuses pastors, too! Don't let pressure to "know it all" keep you from exploring God's riches.
- 5. Use others! Use your pastor. (He has literally been trained to be a professional Bible reader and understander!) Use your Bible Study group. The Scriptures were written by faithful men of God, in the context of the whole people of God, for the whole people of God. Scripture is a communal thing. There is much to be gained from exploring it together, rather than in isolation.

Hope these help a bit in the year 2020! "Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." Psalm 119:105

Music Heals!

Cancer has no friends – many acquaintances – but NO friends. I, however have been blessed with many dear friends and a small, but wonderful family and a large church/music family whom I love dearly and they love me. This is an enormous cancer-intercept! Cancer does not find this friendly.

About 6 weeks ago fluid was discovered in my left lung and I was ordered a thoracentesis (pretty fancy word, don't you think?) which is a draining of fluid from a lung. One and a quarter liters were drained and some of my old breast cancer cells were found in the fluid, in fact were causing the fluid. The good news is that I have been cancer free for many years (pretty much since arriving here at Bethlehem -12 years) and this lengthy hiatus means that if there is a return it is rather weak. For instance if it had returned in a year, this would have indicated a much stronger cancer. So mine is not only pretty wimpy, but relatively easy to treat. It's not a birthday party, but it is very doable. "A brook would lose its song if God removed the rocks." So I am in the brook and there are some stones, but the music is glorious. It is absolutely amazing for me to observe myself experiencing all this. As I play these three services every Sunday, I can feel the healing taking place in my body. Music heals!

All your support and prayers that that surround me heal. When I had my previous cancer and was given 3 weeks to live, and the doctors did everything they could and I recovered. At the last visit the doctor said, "I did what I know how to do, but I did not heal you— a much higher power." "God's fingerprints all over me!"

This journey that I am now on, I see as an opportunity to 1. Strengthen my faith, 2. Strengthen my relationships with my families (blood and church) and 3.make sure that joy and laughter are in abundance in my life, which they are. I am so blessed!!!

Music, joy, faith, laughter, prayer – they all heal and more importantly **Love heals.**
