Dear Friends in Christ,

It's an understatement to say we are living in an unusual season. Who would have believed our reality could shift so dramatically in such a short period of time.

In the midst of all of this, I am as hopeful about the future of the Church as I have ever been; maybe even more so. These words from the author of Hebrews come to mind: "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and steadfast" (Heb. 6:19). Each of us is reminded that our hope rests on God and everything else is unsteady. People are desperate for firm footing, which means this is the perfect opportunity for the Church to step up and share the hope of the Gospel.

Though we are in a season of turmoil and uncertainty, we will get to the other side of it, and when we do we can anticipate that there will be many, many hurting people. I predict people will flock to the Church in larger numbers than we have been seeing, and so we ought to be preparing now for that; we cannot let up, even as we are in a challenging season. One positive sign of this happening is that, even when we were not gathering for public worship, between fifty and seventy people came into the sanctuary privately on Sunday mornings between 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. for prayer, a brief devotion and the Lord's Supper. This was a powerful testimony to the work of Jesus in our Bethlehem family . . . and our need for His presence in or lives.

To that end we are making adjustments to keep our Church-support strong so that we are prepared for the other side of this season:

- Our weekly on-line (Live Stream and YouTube) worship gatherings will continue without interruption. What a blessing to live in a time of unprecedented virtual connection. Our aim is to leverage technology to protect our most vulnerable communities from the spread of disease while staying fully engaged in community.
- Beginning May 31st (Pentecost Sunday) we will resume our public worship gatherings at our regularly scheduled times. Please read the guidelines included with this Newsletter. These guidelines were adopted by the Pastors and the Board of Elders to ensure the spiritual and safety benefits for all worshipers as we reignite on Pentecost Sunday.
- As important as it is to gather in person (Hebrews 10:25), the Church is the people, not the building. Therefore, we continue to support our missions abroad and locally.
- Our small groups and discipleship will continue but will be modified to accommodate healthy social distancing as recommended by the CDC and our governmental authorities. Your small group leader will be in touch to let you know the adjusted plans for your group for now. Now that restrictions are being lifted, some may choose to meet in person while others may decide to continue with Zoom meetings.
- We have to stay financially strong. The ongoing ministry of our church is dependent on the tithes and offerings of our people. Electronic giving is the best way to do this. Many of you are already on our giving platform. If you are not giving electronically, this would be a good time to do that. You can sign up here: blcjaxbeach.org and click on the Members Tab and then click on "Electronic Giving". If you prefer to make your gifts by check, you can drop them off at the church or mail it to Bethlehem Lutheran Church; 1423 8th Av. N; Jacksonville Beach, FL 32250.

I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you for your generosity. For the most part our giving has remained steady. This kind of giving has allowed us to keep everyone employed and working close to near normal hours. This kind of giving has also allowed us to purchase some necessary equipment to improve our Live-stream ministry, which, by the way, has reached nearly 5000 (five thousand) people during the past month! This kind of giving has allowed us to continue supporting our local shelter even though we could not serve in person. There are many more blessings. In fact, the blessings abound. Thank you and God bless you for your prayer and financial support!

Staying strong in worship, small groups, serving, and finances is important as we work to love and serve God and His people during this tumultuous time.

We are here for you. Let us know how we might serve you as we navigate these challenging times together.

I wake up every day honored to be your pastor, and especially so in these days.

Love – It Covers a Multitude of Sins

I don't know about you, but one of the things I've been learning through this crazy Covid thing is the importance of love. It seems to me like we need love more than ever. Particularly as I write this. Discussion has now begun over when the best time to resume public, corporate worship services at the church might be. And it's not just at church. Everywhere, conversations have been taking place regarding how and when to get back to work, open businesses, resume plans (or not?), you name it. It's a lot to process and people are all over the spectrum in their approach and conclusions. And you know what? That's ok.

As the church, our job is not to twist people's arm or shout them down until they agree with us. Sure, logical argumentation and healthy, constructive debate can have a place within the life of the Christian, but overall, the church is called to *love*. Even when someone makes a decision we don't agree with. We still love them. Even when things don't happen the way we want them too and we end up suffering. Still, even through suffering or offense, we Christians *love*.

For weeks, I just haven't been able to get this Scripture verse out of head: 1 Peter 4:8. "Above all, keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins." Did you hear that? Above all! Yes, be self-controlled and soberminded, and many other things, but above all, love. Because love covers a multitude of sins. Now, our love can't remove sins. But Christ's can. And we bear witness to His love through the way that we live our lives. Through the way that we love.

Really, I think St. Peter is getting at much the same thing that Luther did in his Small Catechism explanation to the commandment, "Do not give false testimony against your neighbor." Luther explained this by saying that when it comes to those around us, we should "explain everything in the kindest possible way." (It's terrific counsel from a fiery reformer who didn't always follow that commandment perfectly!) It's true. Our love for everyone around us - the love that Peter says to practice above all – that love prompts us to put the best construction on everything. It's important. Now more than ever. It's a matter of Christian witness. It's a matter of being who God baptized you to be.

And I have good news for you, dear saints of Bethlehem Lutheran Church. There's another (non-Covid) reason this verse has been on my mind the past few weeks. I've been here as your Pastor just shy of a year now! And you have shown me love. I'm sure somewhere along the line a misplaced word or deed gave you reason for offense. Somewhere, with something, intentionally or unintentionally, through omission or commission, it's likely I sinned against you. But love covers a multitude of sins. One of the blessings of serving here for my very first year in the Office of the Public Ministry is that through it all I have sensed your love. You have supported me. You have supported my family. And it has blessed my life greatly. Thank you. Thank you for showing me the love of Christ, even when I'm less than perfect. Thank you for being the people of God! May you continue to show Christ's love to everyone you meet, emphasizing it above all!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To accommodate and faithfully serve God's people at BLC while complying with the health and safety guidelines of our government during these days, **our services will resume at the regular times on May 31**st, **Pentecost Sunday.** I prefer to call this a "re-igniting" rather than a re-opening. Why? Because the church never closed (the universal church – small c) and neither did Bethlehem (upper case C). Besides, it is Pentecost so why not use a reference to fire and flame like re-*ignite*.

I have listed some guidelines for us to follow until further notice:

- 1. The services will last 45 minutes in order to allow for disinfecting between services.
- 2. Fifty people, spaced six feet apart and seated every other row, will be allowed into the sanctuary. Of course, couples and family groups may sit together if they wish. Rope or tape will be used to insure every-other pew for seating.
- 3. In case of overflow (more than 50 people), Pastor Nate will be in the Disciples Hall prepared to lead an identical service (without musicians) on Pentecost Sunday. Going forward, however, whoever is not preaching in the sanctuary will be prepared for a sermon to be delivered in Disciples Hall. Normally, pastors will alternate Sundays.
- 4. Those who feel more comfortable using masks and/or gloves should be encouraged to do so.
- 5. The pastor will announce that the order of service is printed in the bulletin and projected on the screens. Hymnals and pew Bibles should not be used.
- 6. There will be no children's message until further notice.
- 7. There will be no Sunday School for children or adults until further notice
- 8. Please bring your offerings. However, offering plates will not be passed. On the way in or out of the sanctuary, you may place your offering into the offering plate provided on a table in the rear of the sanctuary. At this critical time I am asking you to be generous and sacrificial, if you are able, so that our ministry can continue with the proclamation of the Gospel and the care of souls. If you are unable to come to public worship at this time, contributions can either be mailed to the church or can be made online via the blcjaxbeach.org website under the Members Tab and then click on "Electronic Giving."
- 9. Holy Communion will be given by the pastors only, unless one pastor is in Disciples Hall and an elder is required to assist. The servers (pastors and elders) will sanitize their hands prior to serving.
- 10. There will be only one communion line and those communing should remain six feet apart (unless they are a couple or family).
- 11. The wafer will be placed in the communicant's hand.
- 12. The individual cups will be placed on the chancel rail as we have been doing for private communion services during the past two months. The Common Cup (chalice) will not be used until further notice.
- 13. Please practice social distancing as best you are able. Do not offer/give handshakes or hugs. This goes against my nature. However, even though we may feel safe we don't want to offend or humiliate others who may feel differently or who may have underlying conditions about which we know nothing. This is not a time to test others. Besides, there are those who could be carriers of Covid-19 and be completely unaware. So could you. So let's err on the side of caution for just a little while longer.
- 14. These services are designed intentionally to be shorter. Consequently, some ordinary/common elements of the liturgy will not be used. These are extreme situations, and we will do the best that we are able to do, being supportive and encouraging of one another along the way. We all realize that this is only temporary and that we are continuing to try to make the best of this challenging situation. We are all praying to the Lord that He would bring an end to this dilemma as soon as possible while granting us strength to carry on faithfully and at peace in His shepherding care.
- 15. If you have underlying health conditions or are the primary care-giver of someone with underlying health conditions that would make it unwise for you to attend, please stay home and watch the live-stream service on the BLC Facebook page at 11 a.m. (also recorded for later viewing) or on YouTube beginning the next day accessed through the blcjaxbeach.org website.
- 16. Please continue praying to the Lord for an end to this disease while asking His strength and blessing for all those first responders and health care workers who are attending to folks in this trying situation. Pray for all the millions of people who through no fault of their own have lost their jobs and are struggling to care for their families. Pray also for our country and her leaders, that they may make wise and careful decisions that will keep us all safe, strong, and well.

Please know that this document has been reviewed and affirmed by Pastor Nate and the Board of Elders.



Greetings in Christ from what is swiftly turning into "Mosquito Land". At no point have we run out of toilet paper.

Nor have we run out of encouragement from those with whom we work. I'll cite just one example. A pastor in Iowa City marveled that they had more attendees at their virtual bible study than they have ever had live. Over 100 people were tuning in for the live-streamed event. That's live, not just views of a recorded video. "We have to keep doing this!", he said. When people can safely come back together he plans to keep live-streaming their bible studies and hopes to eventually make provision for the screen watchers to actively participate as well. Not bad for a new normal. Lemonade from lemons - who knew.

Other flavors of lemonade are not so immediately forthcoming, however. Many have lost their jobs because of this virus and can see no silver lining at the moment, or anywhere low on the horizon. Those jobs are most likely not going to magically reappear the moment we go back outside (inside?) again. Few things are quite so unsettling as suddenly losing a job you had come to count on. Knowing you were a valued employee and its loss is not due to your poor performance but to circumstances beyond control is sparse comfort. It's still just as gone and the bills are not.

God's people have, by and large, reacted well to the challenge of virtual church services and bible studies. It remains to be seen how she will respond to this challenge. We're going to need more than "we're going to heaven when we die" because, behold: we're still alive. But we have three years worth of Jesus' teaching on what to do when one finds themselves to be alive. We have the powerful story of the first church and how they responded to the good news of a crucified King while being alive in a very broken world. There must be something there we can use. Maybe we should read it again.
