Thanksgiving: Our Response to God's Provision for His Church

In the midst of the coronavirus pandemic, people are in a serious battle right now with worry and fear. I would be less than transparent if I didn't share that I have had my own worries and fears about COVID-19. This issue of worrying about external factors is an old one. It's in the Bible in many places, such as the story of King David worrying about the victory over the enemies of Israel.

In I Chronicles 21:1, Satan rose up against Israel and incited David to take a census of Israel. There was nothing wrong with counting the men of Israel, but in David's case, his error was not trusting God in his heart. He wanted to count the fighting men to make sure he had enough for a victory. God had already given him the promise of the victory, but he was still going to count the fighting men and God counted that as sin against him.

I Chronicles 21:8 – Then David said to God, "I have sinned greatly by doing this. Now I beg you, take away the guilt of your servant. I have done a very foolish thing."

In the midst of uncertain times, will we trust God's power and provision for His Church, or will we insist on doing what King David did and rely on the number of fighting men? You know the answer to that question. We must trust God and the power and provision He has for His Church.

Above all, remember that this is God's Church. He is in control and the ultimate results are up to Him. Don't be like King David counting the fighting men, trusting in the number of fighting men in Israel. Trust God's power and provision for His church.

I am amazed at how our gracious Lord has guided and protected Bethlehem during these past eight months. I am grateful for the BLC community of believers that, by God's grace, have navigated the issues surrounding Covid-19 so we would continue to be a healthy congregation. I am thankful for unity in the Spirit so we could move forward in ministry without conflict. I am thankful for the giving culture at BLC. Your generosity, combined with good stewardship of resources by staff, have allowed us to remain "in the black" during this season of pandemic – even though offerings are down. The reality is that just as Covid-19 has had an effect on attendance, so too has it impacted our giving.

The month of November and our national day of Thanksgiving is a great opportunity to offer a "thank offering" in thankfulness to our Lord's gracious provision. Please know there is no expectation for you to give a "thank offering." This is, rather, an opportunity for you (and me) to return thanks to the Lord for His constant generosity shown to us. At the very foundation of this "thank offering" is the gift of God's love, forgiveness and salvation through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

If you have suffered economic hardship during Covid-19 please do not feel compelled to give. Instead, let the church know how we can help you. On the other hand, if you are able to express your gratitude, please prayerfully consider giving a special "thank offering." This is simply our response to our Lord's promised eternal victory and our trust in God's power and provision for Bethlehem.

An Imagination is a Terrible Thing to Waste

"Finally, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." (Philippians 4:8)

I love this verse. It captures the complex reality of being a human. I'm a fan of logic and critical thinking. I believe in absolute truth. I like facts and the pursuit of the objective. Sure. All that's great. But that's only the first clause of this Phi-

lippians verse. What about those things that inspire honor, purity, beauty, excellence? What about those things that take your breath away or that cause your mouth to drop open? Sterile truths might do that sometimes. But I'm thinking of things like sunsets. Things like a Beethoven symphony or a Bach cantata, or a masterful concept album from a talented rapper or rock band. Or a gourmet meal. These things are different. Truth is true, and truth is good, but there's more that the Christian mind and imagination should be marinating in than simple, cold hard facts. At least according to the Apostle Paul.

In my younger years, prior to seminary formation, I earned my undergraduate degree doing Theatre at a state university. I can tell you firsthand, this world is hungering for beauty. People – including people who don't know the love of Jesus - are drawn to beauty. Of course, Christianity is true! But it is also beautiful. And I fear that if in our conversation with unbelievers, with our children, etc., if we only focus on the logical, factual, didactic elements of our faith heritage, we are only seeing one facet of an incredibly bright diamond.

I was reminded of this recently while watching the television show *The Chosen*. If you haven't seen it yet, you simply must. I will not brook excuses. It had my family laughing, crying, and binge watching. It is superb art. A fine example of Christians pursuing beauty and excellence. Parents and grandparents, *this* is what our imaginations are meant to marinate in. Not *Will and Grace*. Not *Friends*. (Sorry. Not sorry.)

We have 2,000 years of Christian influenced art to draw upon. Music, poetry, fictional literature, paintings, sculpture. We have an inexhaustible treasure trove of beauty. Does the world know it? Do we know it? Do our kids or grandkids know it?

So, take this as encouragement to pursue those things that are worth letting your imagination soak in for a bit. Watch *The Chosen*. Dive into some of C.S. Lewis' poetry, or go sci-fi with his *Space Trilogy*. Check out the more modern musical stylings of Andrew Peterson, especially his Christmas and Easter concept albums. These are just a few of my favorites. I have many more if you are looking for recommendations! Don't be afraid to pursue beauty. Beauty is our turf, not the world's. We know the one who created it.

Ground yourself in the truth. Then pursue excellent things. Even with your imagination!

Break A Leg!

Have you ever heard the phrase that someone is using a crutch? It means that you are learning how to do something new, but you're using a tool in order to avoid the hard work. So if you're learning a new language, constantly looking up words on Google translate instead of doing memory work is considered a crutch. The concern is that if you never learn how get by without the crutch, you will forever be dependent upon it.

But as much as we look down upon crutches, they can be also be necessary. For example, I was serving as a youth leader some years back playing dodgeball with a group of kids before we kicked off the Scripture lesson for the day. Turns out I'm not as young as I used to be, and I took a fall, landing on my foot a little funny. I told the kids: "I need a minute." After a minute, I realized I might need a bit more than a minute. For the next few days, I hobbled around on a sprained ankle. Finally, my wife persuaded me to have my ankle looked at by a medical professional. Even though they told me it wasn't broken and I could hobble around, I was told to use crutches or I risked injuring myself further by walking on it. The more I used crutches, the faster things would go back to normal.

Crutches can be necessary for growth and healing. God has given us a great gift in His Word, but too often we try to hobble around in this life without it. But when we walk without God's Word, we risk damage to our souls. Rather, we should always depend upon God's gifts to us. His grace and forgiveness help us to get by in this world. One day we will be completely free from sin and we won't need these crutches. We will be restored in God's world. But until then, let God's Word support you through this life.

There is no shame in leaning in on the gifts Jesus gives to us. His church, His Sacraments, His forgiveness are designed to restore us to God and strengthen us for our walk here on this earth. Allow me to share the words of Jesus found in Matthew 11:28: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." For those in need of grace, come to Jesus and live. He gives us strength for today and a bright hope for tomorrow.

Advent by Candlelight is rapidly approaching, and this year's theme, "Fear Not," is filled with comforting assurances that God is in control.

The message, which was so important 2000 years ago that God sent his Angel Gabriel to convey it personally to Mary, Joseph, Zechariah, and the Shepherds, is equally meaningful today during Covid-19. All of us have had moments of fear, anxiety, and uncertainty as we have watched our lives dominated and disrupted by this serious pandemic.

Come to Advent by Candlelight December 5 and recall the comforting words of the angel. The worship service will include readings devoted to each of the four angelic appearances. Following the readings, hymns will be sung by the congregation or by soloists.

The service begins at 2 p.m. in the church sanctuary. Social distancing will be in place, so seating will be limited to approximately 100 women. However, the service will be live streamed into Disciples' Hall, where approximately 40 more seats will be available. The live streaming will also be available through Bethlehem Lutheran Church's Facebook page and will be recorded for later online posting.

Due to the pandemic, the formal tea following the service has been cancelled. However, members who do not wish to attend the service in person are encouraged to hold private teas with family and friends in their homes on December 5 during the afternoon and tune in to the live-stream program.

CHANGING PATHS

Recently, Korea celebrated Hangul Day. Hangul is the phonetic system invented over 500 years ago that forms the basis of the written Korean language. This provoked some contemplation on words. Depending on one's physical condition and situation, words may be processed differently - by sight, through sound, via touch. Words can teach, encourage, harm, anger, soothe. In one's own home culture, they can be taken for granted - understood without much effort. In a foreign land, words can be easily confused - causing frustration and setbacks. Perhaps this last year, one with diminished face-to-face interaction, the value of words has increased in some ways.

In terms of our relationship with God, words have always been paramount. The Word of God comes to us in written form (the Scriptures), spoken form (a sermon, a word of forgiveness,...), and in the person of Jesus. As Christians, we are called to take this Word into the world. How we do this depends on our location and vocation. Maybe you are a teacher, accountant, farmer, seamstress, medical professional,... You may also be a spouse, parent, sibling, grandparent... All are valued and can be used by God to share His love through deed and through words. Just as hangul is the key that unlocks one of the world's most difficult languages, so does the Word of God open to the world a true understanding of the source of our salvation - Jesus.

He also has been asked to assume new responsibilities on a team of LCMS missionaries whose role in Asia revolves around education.
