

Spinner's Corner

Editor's Note: In the March 2013 newsletter, the late Nancy Belian wrote about her herd of spinning wheels. You may like to read about it, here it is. Hermi.

The Multiplying Spinning Wheels

It was about 1968 when Mr. Paul Mercer, the founder of our Guild, informed me that I needed to learn to spin. I told him that working full time with a houseful of children I barely had time to weave. His response was, "You can't start in the middle of the book, you have to start at the beginning."

I found an ad for an antique spinning wheel in the Nifty Nickel. I went and looked at it and bought it for \$75. I had no idea what I was buying and I was very lucky, all the parts were there and in working order. Paul took the wheel with him to clean and oil it, "Besides those babies don't need to mess with it."

The wood was cleaned and soaked with linseed oil and all the moving parts oiled and then finally returned to me. Paul then informed me to practice because we were going to demonstrate at the Fair (I think it was at Cashman Field.)

All that thick climbing rope and very over twisted fiber that we all spin in the beginning would not go through the small orifice of what I now know is an antique Canadian Production Wheel.

Then I bought a Norwegian Wheel upright—easier to take to demonstrations. It and I never really got along too well and I ended up selling it to the Guild.

Since then my son Donovan has found numerous wheels in antique stores with all their working parts.

I now have eleven wheels: the original Canadian and another Canadian Production Wheel, on that has a candle holder on it, Majacraft Rose, Ashford Traditional, Ashford Elizabeth, Roberta Electric, a few more antiques, and my latest addition a Hansen E Spinner.

Don't ask about the collection of looms!!! The only things I don't have are fiber producing animals.

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Library Thing— How to access the Library Information:

- 1. Search the Guild website (www.lvfiberartsguild.org): go to "LIBRARY", then click www.librarything.com
- 2. In the top brown bar, right side search box, type 'Vegas fiber arts' and enter.
- 3. Do not panic that it says 'no results' in the center section! In the left hand column, under *Social* you should find 'members' and a red '1', click on either the word 'member' or the '1'. Now in the center section, find 'Vegas_Fiber_Arts" and click on it.
- On the left, you will see some logistics about our collection. The important line is the first one: "Collections Your Library" Click on 'Your library'

A list of all our books, DVD's etc comes up, usually with a snapshot of the cover in the left column.
