

Workshops are longer events, frequently 2 or 3 days, held outside the scheduled meeting times. Both are educational opportunities for our members.)

(SAM, System for Award Management, is the registration needed to apply for grants from the Nevada Arts Council. We have not applied for a grant for at least 8 years.)

Historian: Elaine, our Historian, has nothing to announce.

Web and Social Media: Diane noted that member submissions/links/articles and other items are appreciated and passed along for inclusion in the newsletter.

2nd FIBER ARTS GUILD SKEIN EXCHANGE

Spin a 2-ply skein weighing a minimum of 4 ounces (about 114 g.) to be randomly exchanged with other participants.

- 1. Use any natural fiber of any color. Fiber may be dyed. No synthetics.
- 2. Spin and ply using your preferred method. Any weight of yarn is acceptable.
- 3. Be sure to wet finish your yarn. For more on wet finishing your spinning, see "Yarnitecture" by Jillian Moreno.
- 4. Submit your skein(s) with each skein tagged with your information: your name, fiber content and source (if known), drop spindle or spinning wheel used and speed whorl (if applicable), total weight, any other information you feel is relevant.
- 5. Bring to the September 2025 meeting.

Skeins will be placed in brown paper bags and distributed via random number drawing. If you select your own yarn, you can select another. And if you don't like the color, you can (over)dye it at Deppe Dye Day in October.



GETTING TO ALL SAINTS' EPISCOPAL CHURCH on 4201 West Washington Avenue, LV:

FROM SOUTH & EAST VALLEY: (Take I-15 North to) US 95 North, exit Valley View Blvd. and turn right. Turn left onto Washington Avenue when Valley View ends (about one quarter mile). All Saints' is about half a mile west on the left. FROM WEST & NORTH VALLEY: (Take Summerlin Parkway west to) US 95 South, exit Decatur Blvd. North (exit after Decatur South, watch the signs!). Go north about half a mile and turn right onto Washington Ave. All Saints' is about half a mile east on the right.

Whichever direction you come from, PAY ATTENTION ONCE YOU TURN ONTO WASHINGTON. The church is on the southeast corner of Washington and Glen Abby Court, but it's difficult to see until you're right next to it. PARKING is available on Glen Abbey Court street and in the parking lot including in back of the church. If you have a long vehicle, consider parking on the street as the lot is not very deep. Parking in the back is closest to the meeting rooms (Parish Hall). Enter the campus in front through the red gate and follow the signs to the Parish Hall (across the courtyard toward the right). The Guild logo will be also posted to show you where to go. If you park in the back, enter through the door with the Guild logo. **Doors open 8:45 am.** https://allsaintslv.com/

MEMBER PROFILE

This is a new feature where we try to introduce new members: Danielle Hanson, our new vice president

Hello! My name is Dani, (short for Danielle). I became interested in spinning after purchasing three pregnant Navajo-Churro sheep in January of 2024. At the time, I had ZERO previous experience with any of the fiber arts, not even knitting or crocheting! I started watching YouTube tutorials by Jillian Evie and purchased a used Ashford Traditional wheel as well as a student spindle and some inexpensive generic wool roving. Despite my best efforts, I could not manage to make anything that resembled yarn. I was able to take a lesson at the Sin City Knit Shop and I learned a bit about drafting and pre-drafting. I also learned that my wheel was "useable" but would be very frustrating to learn on. Since I was already quite frustrated, I purchased a new Ashford Kiwi 3 since I wanted something that would be easier to transport. My new wheel was quite lovely, nevertheless, it was not a magic wheel. My efforts still did not resemble yarn! After a while, I just put the wheel and fiber to the side and focused on other things. It wasn't until the sheep all gave birth and we were able to have them sheared in late June, that I began to think about spinning again. Luckily, I found the Las Vegas Fiber Arts Guild website this time! I started joining the spinning circle at the Sahara Library on Wednesdays and I became a member of the guild. Everyone was so welcoming and knowledgeable. I brought my wheel and spindle with me. Hermi showed me how to use the wheel, but I couldn't draft and treadle at the same time so I just focused on learning to draft on the spindle. I probably spent 2 months just using the spindle before I gave the wheel another go. This time, I had a much better result. My renewed enthusiasm evolved into learning about fiber prep. I had only saved one of the fleeces that we sheared in June because they were in pretty bad shape as fleeces go. Since it was already in such a poor state, I really couldn't make it much worse. I started washing it in different ways and learned how to comb from another guild member. I was able to



salvage quite a bit of usable fiber. I was also gifted a Leicester Longwool fleece, as well as an alpaca fleece for Christmas. As a result, I also decided to buy carders. Prepping my own fiber also improved my spinning skills because I was able to see which prep worked best for me. Attending the Wednesday spinning circle each week is what has helped me improve the most. Any time I want to try something I haven't done before, I bring it to the circle because there is always someone there who can help me out or give me some tips about best practices. It is a great place for support and guidance. I really enjoy being a part of the guild, so much so that I agreed to be the vice president next year. I would love to help support others on their fiber journey

We will visit weavers and dyers on a total of eight different islands. Days will be spent visiting weaving communities, enjoying exclusive demonstrations of their spinning, binding, dyeing and weaving techniques including the marine dyes used on Ternate and the fascinating supplementary and complementary warp techniques used on Sumba, as well answering the question 'when is a warp not a warp?'. We will discover the role played by textiles in their societies, visit local markets, schools, and museums, and of course have time to snorkel, kayak or paddleboard over coral reefs. This trip is great not only for textile lovers, but also for anyone with an interest in learning about other cultures. The trip starts at Ende on the island of Flores on 4th May 2026 and ends on Sumba on 19th May. Both of these islands are reached from Bali by short domestic flights. A meeting of the Board of the Southern Nevada Handweavers and Spinners Guild, Inc. was held on July 27, 2025 at Desert Wind Coffee Roasters. In addition to the Board, there were others invited because they were committee members or were considering positions.

Attending in-person were: Rich Deppe, President; Danielle Wednesdays at the Sahara West Library: (10-noon) our Hanson, Vice President; Cinda Towne, Treasurer; Jami Johnson, Secretary; Hermi Hiatt, Newsletter; Ginny Deppe, Dye Day Host; Diana Smith, Zoom Master; Maria Ipharr, Programs; Meg Harrington, potential committee member; Erin Washington, potential committee member; Sue Wainscott, Web Master; Janet Mayer, Library and Equipment.

President Rich Deppe called the meeting to order and welcomed all. He reminded us that this Summer meeting is for both planning and brainstorming: what's good, what's not working, and what's next.

1. Meeting Format:

Rich asked if our agenda format is acceptable as is. Everyone agreed that it is fine, it's short and sweet, and Rich keeps the meeting moving along. But it also allows for changes as needed due to expected or even unforeseen situations.

2. Workshops:

Definition: a workshop is a longer form teaching/learning opportunity for our members. Usually these are 2-3 days long, not on regular meeting weekends, and frequently involve bringing in a teacher, or as an option, using Zoom. We need a chair: Meg and Janet agreed to be co-chairs! We need a committee: Erin volunteered to be on the committee!

Possible workshop topics:

look at list created last year,

see what's available - topics and teachers,

Hermi reminded us we have a goodly supply of pine needles appropriate for baskets.

Ask for more suggestions.

3. Programs:

Definition: meeting-based presentations, can be live and in-person, usually by a member; on Zoom by a 'known' teacher; or a recording from HGA's Textiles and Tea. **Brainstorming:**

"Make and Take' with some stations and people could choose what to do..

A massive raffle.

4. Demonstrations:

Definition: these are done in public with several benefits: it's outreach, fulfilling our goals of educating the public about various aspects of Fiber Art; also social and skill building for our members. Sometimes we are invited to set up a demonstration as part of an event.

spinners are there almost every Wednesday (only absent if the library has a big lobby-based event or sometimes Thanksgiving or Christmas week). We spin or do other handwork, and answer questions and sometimes teach passers-by! We've taught a home-schooled young man to spin and now to knit, and several have joined the Guild as a result of our friendliness!

We also have been regular demonstrator's at the Pioneer Days at Spring Valley State Park and at Nevada Days Celebration at the Mormon Fort.

Vicki Johnson has been the unofficial organizer for the non -Spinning group.

5. Greeting and encouraging new people

Basically we brainstormed about ways to encourage and involve new people and encourage members to be more active and involved.

Should we create a welcome packet?

Are there ways to communicate better who in the Guild might be able to answer specific questions about looms or wheels, weaving structures, etc. One thought was creating a searchable database.

6. Study Groups, miscellaneous:

Study groups:

Spinning was discussed above.

Rigid Heddle group: it has dwindled in RH and has expanded to include band weaving as members bring with them.

Newsletter: Hermi has requests for articles needed for the September newsletter. She will send a reminder to those people involved. She is leaving for vacation second part of August and needs to send out the newsletter before she leaves.

Website: We need to pay \$23.17 for the Domain (i.e. our name and web address) and will need to pay GoDaddy for their hosting in May 2026. Last time, this cost was \$500 for 5 years, Janet expects this go up.

The meeting was adjourned at 4pm as the coffee shop was closing.
