New to ASI? Consider joining us for 2026. We invite all safe shooters who are looking to advance from static to movement; experienced shooters who are looking for more trigger time or opportunities to try a new gun. Participants just need ear and eye protection, handgun (or PCC) and at least 2 boxes of ammo and 2 magazines. Most matches use around 100 rounds and a reload is typically required between 1st and last shots, hence suggesting 2 magazines. Don't have a holster? All stages are designed to be at low-ready or table starts. Transport your gun between stages in a case or gun rug.

New Shooter Orientation is at 8:45 am day of match in Bay 1 of the Action Shooting Bays. Participation is mandatory if this is your first ASI match. Been a bit since the last match? A refresher isn't a bad idea. Rules of the range or ASI do occur, feel free to pop in. Paul Bunyan members pay only a \$20 range fee.

PAUL BUNYAN AND ELEVATED STANDS (part 1)

Elevated stands can be tree stands placed in or against a tree. They can also be free standing structures. Hunters in stands have many advantages. For example, they are positioned above the game animal, and thus out of sight for a prey animal, which looks mainly at the ground surrounding it. However, there are also many risks associated with the use of stands. For instance, hunters can fall when the stand equipment is not used correctly.

Most elevated stand falls happen when the hunter is climbing up or down a stand. Whenever your feet are off the ground, always use a FALL ARREST SYSTEM (FAS). A FAS is a device used to stop a person in a fall. Before your hunt, be sure to familiarize yourself with the manufacturer's instructions. Make certain that all parts of the FAS meet or exceed industry standards. Reading and following manufacturer's guidelines will give you a better chance of having a fun filled hunt without yelling out to your fellow hunters, "Hey y'all, watch this."

Your FAS should include all essential parts: Full Body Harness (FBH) is a harness that distributes the force of a fall over a large area of the body, making sure the hunter remains suspended in an upright position.

Tether is a strap the attaches to the tree strap / belt, or the tree safety line system and that has a shock absorbing feature.

Suspension Relief Strap is the part that provides a loop to stand in case of a fall. Never use single strap belts and chest harnesses with your FAS. They can be deadly.

Additional FAS Parts that are used to attach yourself to the tree:

Lineman's Style Belt or Climbing Belt is the strap that goes around the tree when you are climbing up or descending down the tree.

Tree Strap or Belts is the strap / belt that goes around the tree when you reach the tree stand. You might call it your life line.

Tree Stand Safety Line System is the alternative to using the lineman's style belt and a tree strap; a system that allows a hunter to remain attached to the tree with the FAS and tether whenever the hunter is off the ground.

Safety Rope / Line with Prusik Knot is a part that goes around the tree and extends to the base of the tree to a point at or above head level when standing on a tree stand platform.

Carabiner is a strong metal ring that clips / connects the tether from the FBH to the prusik knot on the safety rope / line.

2026 WINTER PISTOL LEAGUE

The Paul Bunyan 2026 Winter Pistol League begins January 22 and continues on Thursday evenings through March 26. This is a .22 rimfire pistol league, however an "any gun" class will be provided for those wishing to use a centerfire pistol instead. New shooters are welcome, and there will be an "open" class where firing using a 2-hand grip is allowed. If there is enough interest, revolver, carry gun and/or iron sight categories may be added. This league will not be NRA registered.

There will be 10 weeks to fire 8 record scores and you may shoot ahead or make up by shooting both relays. You may fire up to 10 record scores, and the best 8 will be used for aggregate score, standings and awards. The course of fire will be 20 rounds Slow Fire, 20 rounds Timed Fire and 20 rounds Rapid Fire all fired at 25 yards. The first relay will begin at 5:00 PM and the second relay at 6:15 PM (arrive not less than 15 minutes early to get set up).

At the end of the league there will be cash awards to class winners, and a prize drawing for all participants. Entry fee will be \$25.

scopes allowed). The target frames were then moved up to 25 yards and two new targets hung, each



Each shooter (thrower?) got five throws to cut a card, and the numerical value of the cards became part of his score. In addition, a couple of the cards were marked with "P" or "T" and came with either a pie or turkey in addition to the points.




Mike Holeman lets his tomahawk fly

I was using my very familiar .54 Leman I've had now for over 10 years, and it didn't fail me. Or at least it didn't after I changed the flint part way through the buffalo target. My score with the rifle was pretty competitive, and I was confident as I stepped up with my tomahawk to throw. Here comes the great equalizer. I stuck 4 of my 5 throws, but only cut one card for a score of 4 points. Dennis Daigger did much better, getting 20 points with his hawk, and he'd never thrown one before. You can see by the scores that the competition was pretty tight. Afterwards we all agreed that incorporating the tomahawk into more shoots should be done.

Allen "Two Tails" Tresch took top honors with a score of 156-2X, followed by Mark Merwin with 147 and Mike Holeman bringing up third place with 138-X. Ties were decided by the best bullseye target. The pies for the hawk throw were won by Darrell Behounek and Mark Merwin, and the turkey went unclaimed, so it was added to the other 12 turkeys on the prize table. A fun time was had by all.
