MARCH MEETING NOTES

Our Thursday range maintenance schedule has been modified. Going forward, we will closures for routine alternate range maintenance instead of closures everv Thursday. One week, the rifle, pistol and shotgun ranges will be closed on Thursday from 10am to 4pm. The following week, those ranges will be open and the action bay area will be closed during the same time frame. This will allow members more use of the ranges on Thursdays. Mike Moran has updated the club calendar with these changes.

We are finding that some members are using slugs and buckshot on the shotgun patterning board, tearing up the board. Only bird shot loads are to be used on the patterning board at a distance of no closer than 15 yards. Slugs and buckshot can be used only on the rifle range and are not allowed on the shotgun range

Bob Wendt reports that the winter smallbore league has wrapped up. Again this year, Alec Patajo is the league winner. The summer smallbore league starts Monday June 2nd.

We will be holding two high power rifle matches this month. On Sunday April 6th, we will hold the Blue Ox 80-shot short course match. On Saturday April 19th, we will hold a CMP practice match. These matches will be shot at 200-300 and 600 yards (flier) and will close all ranges each morning. Please double check the club calendar before coming to the range.

The Colorado Gun Collectors Association (CGCA) will be holding their 59th annual show May 17-18 in Greeley, Colorado. There will be over 800 tables of guns and memorabilia from Medieval to Revolutionary War, Civil War, Wild West, WWI, and WWII. PAUL BUNYAN AND SAFE HUNTING

Almost every hunter has a horror story about hunting gone wrong, including me. When I was 18 years old, I joined a deer hunt with a fellow worker. Over the period of one day, he almost shot me two times. Now, you might think I was a fool for staying after the first near miss, and you'd be right. Especially after shooting at a doe running between me and him. Later we were at camp after hunting opening day. For some unknown reason, he got his Winchester Model 94 30-30 out of his tent and began to work the action.

As many of us know, the firearm has a small tip-out on the inside of the firearm action lever, which activates the trigger every time the action is closed. Thus, firing the gun if loaded. As luck would have it, I was sitting next to the campfire and his muzzle was pointed at the fire. As he closed the action and before I could move, the gun fired right into the campfire, 5 feet away, spraying coals of fire all over me. Needless to say, this fool went home and never hunted with him again. Just because someone has hunted a long time, doesn't mean that they are a safe hunter.

A hunting incident happens when a person is injured when hunting or is injured by another hunter. Washington has over 100,000 people who hunt each year. A small number of hunters are injured due to safety rule violations, hunter judgement errors, lack of control and patience, and even mechanical failure.

Most hunting incidents are caused by a member of your own hunting party. However, I believe that all hunting incidents can be prevented. There is one safety rule that, if practiced 100% of the time, will eliminate most all incidents. The MOST IMPORTANT principle of firearm safety is, when you pick up a gun, the VERY FIRST thing you do, even BEFORE checking to see if it is loaded, is to POINT THE MUZZLE IN A SAFE DIRECTION! Even if the gun fires, the muzzle aimed in a safe direction, will at least initially guarantee the bullet will not hit anyone near you. However, bullets go through things. A 7mm Mag can shoot 4.5 miles.

For what goes up, must come down. A companion safety rule is to keep your finger off the trigger until you are on target and ready to fire. To prevent hunting / firearm incidents, always practice safe handling and only hunt with those who are just as safe as you are.

One of the targets did have a little Irish flair, but that didn't make it any easier for the 18 shooters who came out to try their luck. And the rain didn't help either.

Jim Haeckel ran the shoot this month and selected a range of targets. For long distance targets he had the standing bear at 100 yards and the elk at 75 yards, with five shots taken at each and the shooting being done supported from the bench. Many thanks to Jim Hillberg and Eric Burkhead for jumping in as spotters for those targets. It was a good selection as it gave one very horizontal target and one vertical target to help determine where your bullets were hitting. In my case, the bear taught me my rear sight is off a little, but my elevation is good.

For short distance he had two paper targets, both set at 25 yards and both shot with 5 shots each, offhand. The crow target was scored based on the scoring rings. The final target was a leprechaun and a four-leaf clover, with points added if you hit the clover but subtracted for any hits on the leprechaun. Many of us fell prey to this dastardly scoring conundrum, but it sure kept it interesting.

Helen Sick, who handles our registration for the rendezvous, decided she wanted to shoot this month, and did so with the assistance of her trusty manservant Gunga Bill. We've had a

growing number of new faces showing up at our shoot, and it's great to see. proceeded well for all, except Eric who had some gun issues which is why he was able to man the spotting scope.
