2023 WINTER PISTOL LEAGUE

The 2023 Winter Pistol League will begin January 19 and continue on Thursday evenings through March 23. This is a .22 rimfire pistol league, however an "any gun" class will be provided for those wishing to use a centerfire pistol instead. New shooters are welcome, and there will be an "open" class where firing using a 2-hand grip is allowed. If there is enough interest, a revolver and/or iron sight category can be added. This league will <u>not</u> be NRA registered.

There will be 10 weeks to fire 8 record scores and you may shoot ahead or make up by shooting both relays. The course of fire will be 20 rounds Slow Fire, 20 rounds Timed Fire and 20 rounds Rapid Fire all fired at 25 yards. The first relay will begin at 5:00 PM and the second relay at 6:15 PM (arrive not less than 15 minutes early to get set up).

At the end of the league there will be cash awards to class winners, and a prize drawing for all participants. Entry fee will be \$25.

Here Comes the 2023 Legislative Session

The WA state gun-banners are making public their wish list of new gun control laws they would like to see enacted in 2023. Click here for the link. Perhaps emboldened by the expressed will of the people in the recent mid-terms (via the alchemy of mail in voting), the Governor and the Attorney General are supporting the banning of semi-automatic rifles, the repeal of state preemption laws and a new requirement to obtain a state issued permit to purchase a firearm. It almost seems like a recipe, doesn't it? Defund, demoralize and restrict the police, then when the crime goes through the roof, we'll blame it on the guns. Given that the dominant party controls the Executive as well as both the House and the Senate there is little to stand in their way except determined resistance by the electorate. The legislature convenes the 2023 session on January 9th.

MUZZLELOADERS REPORT Mike Moran Snowball Fight!

With a bit of imagination, the six-bullseye paper target looked a bit like a volley of snowballs coming at ya. The fact that there wasn't any snow on the ground made it harder to believe, but however you looked at it, it was going to be fun. And why not? This was the annual Christmas shoot and Toys for Tots fundraiser for the Paul Bunyan Plainsmen.

For several decades, the Paul Bunyan Rifle and Sportsmen's Club has been supporting Toys for Tots. This year we had a new Marine representative that came out to join us. His name is Dakota and it's his first year with the program. Of course, it meant he had to do some shooting as well. Although he was a firearms instructor in the Marine Corps, he was a bit baffled by the flintlock thrust in his hands, but took to it right off, and starting hitting targets. Bob Wendt, the Paul Bunyan treasurer jointed us as well.

The course of fire that Sunday morning consisted of two shots at each of the "snowballs" on the 25-yard paper target for a total of 12 shot, with the score as shown on the scoring rings. Next came two shots at a pie plate with a Christmas tree on it, with 10 points for each hit on the tree, also at 25 yards. For variety there were three gongs hung at 30 yards, a stocking, a candy cane, and another snowball, with one shot at each for 10 points each hit. That gave a possible total of 170 points.

In lieu of a shooter's fee we ask for donations for this shoot, and to help raise even more money, we had some nice raffle prizes. Steve Skillman presented one of his Thurston County powder horns, Lori Caswell brought a beautiful, beaded horn strap, Chip Kormas donated a stool made by Frank Ponceroff, and a colonial era folding knife rounded out the raffle items. All of the normal shooter's prizes were wrapped like Christmas presents, so even though the best shooter drew first, it was still a surprise.

When the shooting was all done and there were no more raffle tickets to be sold, we started on the prizes. The powder horn went to one of our new shooters, Tom Wilkening, and the strap went to Mike Holeman. Jim Haeckel won the knife (and he was also the only one to hit the candy cane), and Mike Moran took the stool home. When it was all tallied, **the muzzleloaders raised \$971.00**. Combined with the donations from the other shooting disciplines, we sent Dakota back to Toys for Tots with a pickup truck full of toys and a check for over \$30,000! That will make a fine Christmas for a lot of folks.

Enjoy the holidays and get those guns ready for the next shoot on January 22nd, when we host the WSMA Silhouette Shoot.
