LEGISLATURE REPORT

Four weeks after the cowardly Uvalde school massacre, the U.S. Senate has reached a bi-partisan agreement to pass legislation that is being hailed as "the biggest breakthrough on the issue of gun violence in 30 years". Among other provisions, the 80-page bill will supposedly use federal funds to bankroll states efforts to pass "red flag" laws, wherein a person deemed unfit to possess a gun can lose his right to do so. Of course, the question is, who is authorized to deem a person unfit and with what evidence? Is testimony from your unfriendly neighbor sufficient? How about from your jilted lover? Perhaps an anonymous phone call to your local police chief? I shudder to think of the ways our WA Attorney General Bob Ferguson and his legislative allies will craft a law that will create the authority to take away your firearms without you ever being convicted of a crime.

On June 23, the Supreme Court released its landmark decision on New York State Rifle and Pistol Association's challenge to NY's requirement to show *just cause* to obtain a NY state concealed carry license. The decision is expected to send shock waves through the gun control industry across the country by re-asserting the Second Amendment's guarantee of an individual's God given right to keep *and* bear arms. NY's just cause requirement was routinely used to reject almost all applicants, excepting some celebrities, politicians and other elites. Contrast NY's requirement to prove yourself worthy with WA states *shall issue* clause that puts the burden to show cause to deny an applicant on the state. PAUL BUNYAN RENDEZVOUS 2022

"It's always great when you can put away dry canvas." No truer words were spoken, but it always comes after preceding 5 days of rain. So, it was this year at the Paul Bunyan 46th Memorial Day Rendezvous in Puyallup, WA, but that didn't keep folks from coming out and participating in the festivities. In fact, we had more shooters than last year, and quite a few new faces!

The Plainsmen had put in months of hard work getting the trails and facilities ready. Rich Pogue and Darrell Behounek revitalized the knife and hawk trail, adding a few surprises for this year. At the monthly work parties Boosway Jack Knight and Segundo Jim Haeckel oversaw the crew building new council fire benches, preparing targets and signs, and of course, cutting lots of firewood. Everyone put in countless hours making sure "it truly shines".

Registration kicked off Friday as the campers rolled in and started setting up camp. Chip Kormas and Helen Sick got everyone signed in and into groups for the main aggregate. This dynamic duo run a vital activity even though they get stuck inside most of the day, which this year might not have been so bad. It was great to see the camp take shape and the glow of the campfires as the evening wore on.

Jack Knight kicked off the opening ceremony with a flag salute and firelock volley, then gave us a rundown of the schedule and rules. The main event got started right after, with the first of the guided groups heading to the rifle range. The groups go out every 30 minutes and are led by a Trail Guide to keep score and oversee the group. This year we had a local BSA Venturing Crew participating, and they sure seemed to be having fun. I bet we'll see them down the trail.

The Main Aggregate event consists of the Rifle Trail, the Pistol Trail, and the Knife and Tomahawk Trail. The Rifle Trail has 15 stations, with a steel target set at various ranges from 25 yds to 200 yds with a point scored for each the targets have either an easy target for 1 point or a harder target for 2 making the total possible score of 20. The Pistol Trail is with closer targets, also giving a possible score of 20 if all options are taken. The Knife and Hawk trail has a variety of a few surprises, which give a total of 20 possible points. bonus points are awarded for period dress, 3 points for 3 clothing, 5 points if you are dressed "head to toe". This gives aggregate score of 65 points.

Following that, fifteen shooters gathered for the Split the Ball contest, where an axe head is planted in the face of a log and clay pigeons are hung on either side. Bill Sick started everyone at 15 yards from the target, and each shooter took a shot in turn. In order to advance, the ball split on the edge of the axe and break both clay pigeons. After the first round only Raymond Edwards and Bobbie Fischer had split the ball, so those two moved back to 20 yards to try again. Neither was able to split the ball, so they decided to win by a toss of the coin. Raymond won, and both took home nice Ted Cash metal boxes.

At noon each day Will "Bugler" Ulry fired up his Candy Cannon for the kids, as they scrambled to gather as much candy as they could. Jack Knight, Susan Romero, Jamie Haeckel, and Sidney Knight all directed the Little Buckskinners in crafts and games throughout the weekend.

Sunday saw more groups heading out to the ranges for the aggregate events, and at 4:00 pm the crowd gathered for the Chicken Shoot. This is an elimination event where two person teams compete against another with the winning team

advancing to the next round. Each team needs to hit two large and one very tiny chicken silhouette perched on the 50 yard berm. To ensure the teams have enough motivation, the crowd provides helpful advice and criticism. At the end of each round, the targets are reset by the "Chicken Boys", a group of 4 kids who run their butts off but take home a few well-earned dollars collected from the crowd

In the background of all these events is the Archery/Knife & Hawk trail, which is self-guided. Six archery stations use a combination of small animal burlap targets and large animal 3-D targets (thank you Hunter's Ed!), plus there are five targets on a separate knife and Tony Woore took 1st place, Anthony 2nd, with Mike Moran taking 3rd in a Squatting Hawk.



- Match 5: 22 Timed Fire 20 rounds at 25 yards
- Match 6: 22 Rapid Fire 20 rounds at 25 yards
