HUNTER SAFETY & GAME REGULATIONS

During the 1800s, some game animals were hunted nearly into extinction in North America. There were very few enforceable wildlife laws or regulations. Today we hear people who hunt complain about our state's hunting regulations. Regardless of what you think about the way our state manages fish & wildlife, the regulations, as we know them, are a necessary fact of life. Without them there would be far less game than we have now. Poaching has always been a problem, even with the regulations. However, because some people would harvest fish and wildlife until there were none left for the next generation, we need wildlife management if our privilege to hunt is to survive.

So why do we need hunting laws? It was because of regulated hunting, management planning, and wildlife biology that the populations of game and non-game animal have thrived over the past 100 years. In fact, we have more deer, bear, elk, and turkey today than we had in the early 1900s.

It is largely due to the practices of wildlife conservation and preservation that we have sustainable populations today. Many species of wildlife were slaughtered for their commercial values by hunters in the 1800s, having no thought for future generations of hunters. How did we recover from such a disaster?

- Through Conservation, which is the wise use of wildlife. Wildlife biologists were hired to study ways to increase game populations by regulated hunting practices. Different methods were imposed to study fish & wildlife populations, and the cow and doe tags we apply for each spring are taken from the SURPLUS game estimated to live in each Game Management Unit (GMU) habitat.
- Through Preservation, which is the non-use of wildlife. To protect game populations that had been decimated by over hunting, laws were passed to place some animals on a restricted list that

protected them from legally being hunted at all. In the early 1900s the United States & Canada agreed upon seven necessary principles to restore wildlife populations by establishing The North America Model of Wildlife Conservation.

In 1937, the U.S. Congress passed **The Wildlife Restoration Act** (Pittman-Robertson Act). The act provided funding for wildlife management and restoration, paving the way for wildlife restoration conservation and hunter safety training, making it possible for our generation and future generations to enjoy the great sport of safe hunting.

Hunting regulations ensure that we have sustained populations of wildlife. The **wildlife managers** determine hunting seasons and bag limits for modern firearm, muzzleloader, and archery hunters, to give everyone the opportunity to hunt and harvest game by a lawful means.

Lawful and regulated hunting has never caused an animal species to be hunted to extinction. As hunters, we are to be SELF GOVERNING in our harvesting practices and as conservationists we are to follow FAIR CHASE PRINCIPLES, allowing the game a chance to escape.
