FEBRUARY MEETING NOTES

A proposal was made at the general meeting by Executive Officer Dave Farrow to increase the spending limit for the board. For more years than anyone could remember, the spending limit that the board operated under was \$1000 for any single expenditure other than necessary range maintenance issues. Any expenditure over \$1000 would require a vote by the general membership. Dave's proposal was to increase the limit to \$5000. After quite a bit of discussion, the proposal was passed by a vote of the general membership.

Jim Stewart reported that the Mt. Rainier Shadow league starts March 15th and will run through the summer. This league, held on the action bays, is a good time to get some practice for any of the action shooting sports we hold at our club. Get in touch with Jim for details.

Darrell Behounek reports that the range officers are finding a lot of shotgun hulls in the trash on both the rifle and pistol ranges. Birdshot is not to be used on either range.

We will be holding our annual Cloward-Partee 100-yard standing high power match Sunday March 6th at 9am. The match bulletin can be found on our website by clicking <u>here</u>.

Darrell Behounek reports that he sold \$211 worth of brass last month. This is brass that Darrell gathers up from the red BRASS containers. A lot of the brass is 22LR, which is sorted out and saved for a trip to the recycler. All proceeds from the brass sales and recycling go to help the junior club.

We will be holding a practice 200-yard 22LR fun match, Tuesday March 8th at 9AM. The match is open to anyone who owns one and has some ammo to go with it. See the match details on page 4.

TOYS-FOR-TOTS REPORT

Club member Ed Cole reminded me that I neglected to publish a report on the club donations to the Toys-for-Tots campaign this year. In spite of COVID still looming large and a never-ending ammunition shortage, the club was still able to put on several matches to support the cause in a very big way. USPSA/Vision-X held matches contributing over \$12,500. ASI, IDPA, High-Power and the muzzleloaders also held very successful matches. Our total donations for the year were over \$16,000 plus a truck load of new tovs. making a happy Christmas for a lot of kids. Thanks to all who participated in the matches and those who donated to this worthwhile cause. (Thanks Ed!)

FREE MATERIAL FOR THE CLUB

IDPA match director Birney Oxford made a presentation at the January board meeting showing a lot of used construction materials that were available for free, to be picked up in Seattle where Birney works. The following Saturday, Dave Farrow and Bob Wendt met Birney and loaded their pickups with plywood, an expensive commodity which is always needed at the range, sheets of COREX (target backers), metal stanchions and even a few rolls of roofing, all items that we will put to good use around the range. So far, they have made a total of 6 trips and have plans for another trip soon. As best as they could estimate, we received between \$10K-\$12K worth of materials just for the cost of gas thanks to the efforts of Birney, Dave and Bob.

RANGE GUEST POLICY

It has always been a standing club rule that a member may occasionally have a limited number of guests with him/her at the range and the member is responsible for the supervision of those guests. During the past two board meetings, we have been discussing the number of quests a member is allowed to bring to the range per visit. This issue has come up often through the years and the board felt the time was long overdue to clarify and update our guest policy. Going forward, members are limited to bringing no more than two guests to the range per visit. If a member wants to bring in more than two guests on a one-time only basis, arrangements must be made through the Chief Range Safety Officer or the board of directors.

Guests are the responsibility of the member and must be supervised by the member at all times while at the range. Proper supervision may preclude the member from shooting.

It was also noted that some members are abusing the "occasionally" portion of this standing rule. If you have the same guest more than a few times a year, then he/she should become a member.

The club policy forbidding the commercial training (firearm training by individuals or companies other than Paul Bunyan) at the range stays in effect.

LEGISLATURE REPORT

The "high" capacity magazine ban, Senate Bill 5078, is working its way through the house at this time. This bill bans the manufacture and sale of any magazine with a capacity of more than 10 rounds. Other bills in Olympia include a ban on "ghost' guns and restrictions on where firearms can be carried in some public places. Information on these and the other gun related bills in Olympia can be found on the <u>NRA-ILA</u> <u>website</u>. Director Kevin Olson strongly encouraged every gun owner to contact their representatives and express their opinion. Kevin says every email or phone call makes a difference.

CAST BULLET RIFLE MATCHES

Starting March 12th, our club will host a monthly Cast Bullet Association (CBA) military rifle match (see club calendar for exact dates). These cast bullet matches are open to shooters using any rifle that was issued to the troops by any country. Classifications are: as issued (no modifications), improved sights (upgraded iron sights) and scope class. Registration starts at 8am followed by a course of fire review, then first shots at 9am. We start with a sighter target at 200 yards, followed by 2 strings of 10 shots each for score in 10 minutes, then repeat the course of fire at 100. Yards. The cost of the match is \$10, \$5 for octogenarians or juniors. Membership in the CBA is required for ranking, records and awards, but those who are not CBA members may still shoot the match as long as they use cast bullets, either purchased or cast at home. THE QUAD CLUB SHOOT

Four black powder clubs gathered on Sunday, February 27th for the annual Quad Club shoot, and a chance to win the honor of hosting the trophy for the year. Originally conceived in 1994 as the Tri-Club shoot, it now pits the Paul Bunyan Plainsmen, the Bremerton Brigade, the Lynch Creek Longhunters from Eatonville, and the Black River Troublemakers (formerly the Evergreen Muzzleloaders). The winner receives the trophy and adds a plaque with their club's name and the year.

Each club provides a target, so each shooter gets four targets to shoot at. The Plainsmen had a turkey, the Brigade provided a crow, Black River used a bullseye, and Lynch Creek brought along Sasquatch. The match was shot in two parts, the first using the turkey and crow, each with 5 shots, the second part with the bullseye and Sasquatch, also with 5 shots a piece. Each target needed scoring rings to be able to score, and to keep consistency each club scored their own targets.

For the individual aggregate the total score was calculated by simply adding the four target scores together. The team scores were calculated a bit differently. Since two of the clubs had only 5 members on their rosters, 5 was the team size. Each club score keeper identified the top 5 scores from each club their target. In other words, the Bremerton score keeper looked at all 26 of the crow targets, and found the top 5 Paul Bunyan scores, the top 5 Lynch Creek scores, etc. for the crow target. Once all the targets were scored, the four score keepers added the scores to come up with the team score.

While all the scoring was being done, the rest of the crew enjoyed a pot-luck lunch, with the Plainsmen providing chili, Bremerton serving salad, Lynch Creek brought bread and the Troublemakers bringing cake and ice cream. In the end, it was Paul Bunyan that kept the trophy for another year. And as a bonus, we were visited by three new shooters who will be joining our ranks and will shoot in subsequent matches.
