# PAUL BUNYAN & HUNTER RESPECT

Ethical hunters can promote a positive image about hunting by showing respect to others. Our challenges to maintain that positive image of hunting are many. However, with common sense, keeping abreast of social trends, and being respectful to all, the task of passing on this sport to our grandchildren is possible.

<u>Respect Natural Recourses</u>: As a hunter I have always tried to leave a camp spot cleaner than I found it. I educate myself about wildlife to understand the animals I hunt, so as to not misidentify my target. I make sure that all usable parts of any animal I harvest are not wasted. I only hunt with other ethical hunters, pick up my brass, obey all hunting laws and regulations, and cooperate with WDFW wildlife offices.

<u>Respect Other Hunters</u>: Hunters must show respect for other hunters. It's a matter of life and death that we constantly demonstrate firearm safety, especially safe muzzle control. If we happen on to another hunter, show respect by going back the way you came or walk a wide path around the area that hunter is watching. Do not interfere with another's hunt. Do not consume alcohol or drugs before or during a hunt. Store securely all firearms at camp.

Respect Landowners: Show respect to property owners by seeking written permission to hunt their land. Go alone long before hunting season, NOT wearing camo, and NOT with a group of people to request permission. If access to their land is granted get written permission. Above all, leave all gates the way you found them, unless told otherwise. If access is denied, be polite because your courtesy may affect the future hunts. Remember. outcome of trespassing is a crime. A hunting license does not replace the landowner's permission.

<u>Respect Non-Hunters</u>: It is important to keep informed about the social winds that blow across our land concerning hunting. There are many who see hunting negatively. We can improve our public image by not posting bloody pictures on social media. Do not describe the details of the kill in the hearing of non-hunters. By not showing respect, we could turn a nonhunter into an anti-hunter. Transport animals with respect. Gone are the days when successful hunters would strap their kill on the hood of the car. Do not wear bloody clothes in public. It's about respect.

had a phenomenal turnout for We Saturday's *Heavy Metal* themed match. celebrating metal guns ... and a few plasticfantasticks, too. Each of the 6 stages alluded to a Metal Band or its rock n' roll culture. Stages titled, "Beer Run" where the shooter has to get the beer cooler from the table to the grocery cart all while engaging targets; "Gimme Some of the Air Guitar" requiring holding an inflatable guitar at the start or fan favorite "Porcelain Princess" begins with the shooter at the toilet and at signal retrieves gun to shoot several target arrays, all while avoiding stepping on Coors Lite empties strewn about the bay.

Nearly 3/4 of the attendees signed up to shoot their all-metal guns, and everyone remarked they had a great time, even the few PCC'ers.



Care to join us at an upcoming match? Our matches are the first Saturday of the month. For our October 5<sup>th</sup> match, we'll have the ASI Senior Classic – everyone is welcome to join us, but we will recognize those shooters 50 + with awards for specialty and age categories. Most ASI matches average @ 100 rounds and don't require a holster; guns can be transported from stage to stage in a range bag or gun case. We allow .22 to .45 caliber guns as well as PCC (except for the Senior Classic, no PCC). All stages are either a table start or held at low-ready.

The Youth Day shoot allows kids to come out for a day and try different guns and archery and get a pizza lunch to boot. It's sponsored in part by the WA Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Washington Arms Collectors. Eric Burkhead, Jim Haeckel, Dwayne Anderson, Bill Sick, and Mike Moran helped load and coach the kids through shooting at some steel gong targets. While they waited for their turn for the two firing positions, each one had a try at throwing tomahawks, with some impressive results. For the event WDFW provided the use of the Hunter Education .50 caliber inline guns and bought all the powder and ammunition, but the guys had their guns on hand to show what the traditional guns can do. It was a lot of fun and the kids all agreed the tomahawks were the best part!

The next day the rain stopped, and the sun came out for the Plainsmen monthly shoot. Fifteen shooters came out to compete for prizes. Since the gongs were already out from Youth Day, we used those, but moved them back a bit to make things a bit more challenging. The standing bear went out at 75 yards and the small buffalo and gopher were at 35 yards. Each shooter would take two shots at each, with 10 points scored for each hit. In preparation for hunting season, we also added a bear and a deer paper target, with five shots at each, and scored as delineated on the scoring rings. After the morning safety briefing, everyone got their targets posted and started shooting.

Except for a few gun issues, the match ran smoothly, and we were done about 10:30. While Jim Haeckel got the steel put away, score cards were tallied. Ties were decided based on the deer target score. The top shooter, Bob DeLisle, led off on selecting from the prize table. In addition to our usual prizes, Frank Haggard donated a nice print of a mountain man and his horses. Afterwards the Plainsmen met for a potluck lunch and planning meeting.
