OCTOBER MEETING NOTES

M1-M1A-M1 CARBINE MATCH

On Saturday November 16th, Paul Bunyan will host our "Little Gun / Big Gun" match on the rifle range. M1 Carbines are the Little Guns while M1Garands, M1A's and 1903 Springfields are the Big Guns. The Big Guns will be shot at 200 yards using the electronic scoring targets, and the carbines will be shot at 100 yards. The cost of the match will be \$15 for club members and \$20 for non-members. M80 or 7.62x51 ball ammunition for the Garands/M1As/Springfields will be provided by the club. Shooters need to bring their own Carbine ammo. Course of Fire: Up to 5 sighter shots and 10 record shots from the bench, 10 rounds standing and 10 rounds sling supported (Prone/Sitting or Kneeling) with each gun. 60 shots total + sighters.

For those members who do not have one, we have a few M1 Garands to loan out for the match (arrange with Bob Wendt or Doug Nash prior to the match). If you do not have a carbine you may share with another shooter.

Sign-in starts at 9am with first shots downrange at 10am. Positions 1-15 on the rifle range will remain open for general member use during the match.

FIREARM SAFETY

There are many ways we can get into trouble, but none are as effective as when we violate the <u>basic rules of life</u>. Ask your wife, she'll be glad to explain it to you. Many times, those acts are preceded by the someone hollering something like – "Hey y'all, watch this!" The end result resembles something between a squashed tomato and bloated roadkill. Avoid these unfortunate accidents; understand basic principles of gravity.

With firearms, there are no do overs. When someone has an unintentional discharge, the bullet cannot be recalled. Firearms mishaps are no longer identified as **accidents**. They are called **incidents**. Most incidents don't just happen. They are caused by careless firearm handling and/or ignorance of basic safety rules. In other words, someone pulled the trigger and is responsible for sending the bullet downrange. There's going to be paperwork.

The number one practice we teach in Hunter's Safety Class is if you are going to pick up a gun, from the moment you take possession of the firearm, always point the muzzle in a safe direction, before checking to see if it is loaded. If you are unfamiliar with the gun don't pick it up. There is no wobble room for unsafe behavior while handling a gun. If you point the muzzle at someone, that violates the basic rules of gun safety. That's why Paul Bunyan has a range rule that requires all firearms to be cased and uncased on the firing line. If you carry an uncased firearm from your vehicle to the firing line, the range requires you to carry the firearm muzzle up. The unsafe practice we're trying to avoid is pointing your muzzle at anyone.

FOUR BASIC SAFETY RULES: Reduce the risk of firearm incidents:

LOADED – All guns are loaded. Only <u>you</u> can determine if it is unloaded.

TRIGGER – Never touch the trigger until on target and ready to fire.

MUZZLE – Never point the muzzle at anything you are not willing to kill.

<u>BACKSTOP</u> - Consider your backstop because bullets go through things.

DEFECTIVE ROUNDS AND BRASS IN TRASH

We have been finding a lot of spent brass and dud ammo in the trash recently. All spent brass and defective rounds should be placed in the red metal BRASS boxes on the rifle and pistol ranges. Dud rounds in the trash create a potential hazard for those who empty the cans and to those who haul away our trash. We sort spent brass from the BRASS containers by caliber and sell it, with the proceeds going to the junior club. Aluminum and steel cases should be placed in the 5-gallon buckets on each range. We also recycle spent primers, another thing we find in the trash a lot. If you have spent primers that you want to get rid of, leave them in a ziplock bag or a container on top of the red BRASS containers or by the CONEX door.

JUNIORS

ACTION SHOOTING INTERNATIONAL (ASI) ACTIVITIES

Jackie Russo 2024 Action Shooting International's *The Senior Classic*

We couldn't have asked for better weather for our 3rd annual Senior Classic. Sunny skies greeted all ages of shooters with their .22 to .45 caliber handguns and approx. 100 rounds of ammo. Because this was a specialty match, special recognition is set for those tenured 50 and over. Categories were divided by Senior, Super Senior and Distinguished Senior. We did recognize Veteran, Lady and Law Enforcement in the senior groups.

This match, featuring 7 Senior - themed stages titled: Medicare Scare - a dominate hand only stage where the shooter grasps a walker with the opposite hand and delivers 1 round on all 9 targets; Lost My Keys and My Mind - where the start position is holding a smallish, vinyl 'brain' and car keys, one in each hand; Paul Propman Gives Bad Advice - a multi-target stage finds beloved range prop 'Paul' between 2 threat targets and several arrays of threat and non-threat targets, located in the open or behind cover; Tee'd Off - was a combination of steel and threat targets, however the start position required the putter wielding shooter to 'putt' the golf ball to indicate to the range officer they were ready for range commands. Don't Need Bifocals was a fan favorite. The target array was deceptive. Two steel poppers on either side of a threat target and a non-threat target were positioned under the 'down zero'. 15 yards made this stage challenging.

In the end over 80 shooters of various skillsets and ages attended the match and those in the senior categories were awarded a lovely timepiece, a pocket watch, custom etched by **River's Edge LLC**. And once again, high overall was presented an engraved cane and High Whippersnapper (the category reserved for 'youthfuls' less than 50), received a nostalgic bronze baby shoe mounted on a wood plaque.

ASI matches are scheduled for the 1st Saturday of each month. We welcome all skill levels of safe shooters, from those wanting to advance from static to moving and shooting to those with an advanced skills who are looking for more trigger time or to try out a new handgun. Paul Bunyan members shoot the matches for \$20. Pre-registration is appreciated on <u>www.practiscore.com</u>; search under ASI at Paul Bunyan under Matches tab. As always, walk-ons welcome.

Our next regular match is Saturday, November 2nd. For our upcoming **Toys for Tots Toy Drive**, it will be Sunday, December 1st for our 1st Annual "It's A PCC Christmas!" This match welcomes handguns, of course, but expect more steel targets (ping!) and a few more distance targets for PCC fun. The course of fire consisted of four parts. Part one was five shots at the 100-yard standing bear target, with each hit counting for 10 points, and part two was five shots at



the elk silhouette at 75 yards. Part three was a paper plate with either a maple leaf or a witch on it, again for 5 shots worth 10 points each, with the caveat that it would only count if your bullet was completely in the

picture. Lastly, a target of a spider with scoring rings made up the last five shots. And as is our custom, bonus points were awarded for period dress.

With the sun coming out it was easy to see the paper targets at 25 yards, and the target frames were protected from the rain under the baffles, but the range was closed twice due to the wet paper of the spider target coming off the soaking wet frames.
