How to Install Window Boxes for Curb Appeal

They're versatile, affordable and perfect for seasonal plants or herbs. Before installation, choose boxes that match your home's architecture and measure the window width so the boxes look balanced. Ensure they have drainage holes to keep plants healthy.

Installing a window box requires sturdy brackets that can support the combined weight of soil, water and plants. Position the box just below the windowsill, making sure it's level before drilling into the studs or masonry. Secure the brackets, set the box in place and fill it with high-quality potting soil.

Tips for success:

- ▶ Use a level to ensure proper placement
- ▶ Anchor brackets into studs for stability
- ▶ Add a layer of gravel for extra drainage
- ▶ Choose sun- or shade-loving plants based on window exposure

Water your plants frequently since window boxes dry out faster than ground beds. Switch up plantings seasonally for year-round color and variety. With a bit of planning and upkeep, window boxes can boost curb appeal and bring a fresh splash of nature right outside your windows.

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HOW TO REUPHOLSTER FURNITURE LIKE A PRO

- ▶ Remove existing fabric and staples with pliers or a staple remover
- ▶ Cut new fabric pieces using the old fabric as a guide
- ▶ Attach fabric with a staple gun, working from the center out for a smooth finish
- ▶ Add trim or decorative elements to cover seams and staples

Take your time with corners and curves for a polished look. Start with chairs or ottomans if you're unsure about tackling large projects like sofas. Reupholstery transforms outdated furniture into something fresh and personalized, letting you enjoy your favorite pieces for years to come.



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
