Driveway and Sidewalk Crack Repair

Driveway and sidewalk cracks detract from your home's curb appeal and pose safety hazards. Fortunately, homeowners can tackle these repairs with the right approach and materials, ensuring effectiveness and safety. Here's how to address these common issues confidently.

1 ASSESS THE DAMAGE: Begin by evaluating the extent of the cracks. Small hairline cracks can often be easily filled, while larger cracks may require more extensive repairs. Understanding the severity of the damage will help you choose the appropriate repair method.

2 CLEAN THE AREA: Before any repair, thoroughly clean the crack and surrounding area. Remove debris, dirt and weeds to ensure the repair materials adhere properly. A wire brush, followed by a leaf blower or a good sweep, can help.

3 CHOOSE THE APPROPRIATE MATERIAL: A simple concrete caulk or liquid filler can be sufficient for small cracks. Larger cracks may require a concrete patch mix. Products are available that are specifically designed for outdoor surfaces, offering durability and flexibility to accommodate expansions and contractions caused by fluctuating temperatures.

4 APPLY THE REPAIR MATERIAL: Read the label and follow the product instructions carefully before starting the repair. A caulking gun may be necessary for caulks and

fillers to ensure the material penetrates the entire depth of the crack. When using a patch mix, pressing the material firmly into the crack and smoothing it with a trowel will ensure a level surface.

5 ALLOW IT TO DRY: Allow the repair material to dry and cure as recommended before using the driveway or sidewalk. This can vary from a few hours to several days, so patience is important.

6 TAKE PROPER PRECAUTION: Wear appropriate safety gear, including gloves and eye protection, to avoid injury. Keep children and pets away from the repair area until fully cured.
