ENGAGING CULTURE

Here are the steps we think you ought to take as you think through Engaging Culture during this Halloween season:

A - ACKNOWLEDGE GOD'S SOVEREIGNTY:

As we grapple with the different influences around us, acknowledging God's sovereignty helps us to discern the good, redeem the distorted, and reject what doesn't resonate with God's truth and love, allowing us to be the beacons of light and agents of transformation in a complex world.

Remember that everything, including Halloween and every other day, comes from God (Colossians 1:17). Understanding the broader narrative of the Gospel, from Creation to Restoration (Genesis 1 to Revelation 21), highlights how God's plan triumphs over darkness and celebrates His limitless power.

It's like viewing the Gospel through either two chapters or four. Some see the gospel as solely about two chapters: sin and salvation (Genesis 3 to John 3:16), giving too much credit to evil. But a more complete view of the gospel includes four chapter: Creation, the Fall, Christ's redemption, and the promise of Restoration, showcasing God's ultimate authority.

Realizing this comprehensive perspective helps us navigate not just Halloween, but every aspect of our culture. Whether it's the Santeria in salsa music, the themes of male chauvinism and violence in hip-hop, or the various social agendas in cartoons, our understanding of God's sovereignty guides us to discern the good, transform the negative, and reject what doesn't align with God's love. As we engage, we are called to be bearers of Christ's transformative love, approaching every cultural interaction with wisdom, grace, and a sincere desire to illuminate God's light in the midst of darkness.

R - RECEIVE THE GOOD:

As we discern Halloween, recognize the good aspects of this festivity. Receiving the joy of community engagement, the innocent fun of costumes, and the sweetness of neighborly generosity in the form of candies, we acknowledge the goodness of God in these cultural expressions (1 Corinthians 8).

R - REDEEM THE DISTORTED:

While recognizing the good, we must also critically engage with the distorted. Mark 7:14-25 urges us to discern the heart behind actions. Separating the cultural practices from their negative connotations, we can redeem the festivities. Participating in alternative celebrations or community activities that promote positivity and inclusivity can be ways to redeem the holiday.

R - REJECT THE HARMFUL:

With discernment, we acknowledge that some elements of Halloween promote harmful or unwholesome practices. Rejecting the glorification of fear, evil, or anything contrary to God's character is crucial. This includes refraining from activities that undermine the values of love, compassion, and community, as prescribed in the Gospel (Mark 12:30–31).

We affirm that these activities, in their essence, are not inherently evil. The issue lies in their cultural connotations, not their intrinsic nature.

PRACTICING GOSPEL HOSPITALITY:

Opening our doors and hearts to the community on Halloween reflects our call to hospitality, mirroring Jesus's welcoming nature (Hebrews 13:2). Shutting off lights and ignoring our neighbors contradicts the essence of the Gospel. Our aim is to foster relationships that can ultimately lead to introducing others to the transformative power of Christ (Romans 12:13).

Embracing Missionality: While refraining from explicitly celebrating Halloween, we actively engage with our community, embodying a missional lifestyle. By being present, participating in community events, and initiating meaningful conversations, we create opportunities to share the love of Christ, effectively becoming relatable agents of God's grace (Matthew 5:16).

CALL TO ACTION:

Let's remember that our involvement in Halloween and every cultural event is about sharing the incredible news of the Gospel. It's not just about a single day; it's about showing the world the glory of God and fulfilling the mission Jesus left us with. This means passionately reaching out to those who haven't yet experienced the love of Christ and making sure we're obedient to His call, powered by the Holy Spirit.

We shouldn't let fear guide us. Instead, let's tap into the incredible strength that comes from God. Our goal is to bring hope to those in the dark, to show them the way to Jesus. This journey requires us to be wise, welcoming, and intentional in our approach to everyone, regardless of their background or beliefs. Let's be that shining light, a living example of Christ's love, and a real-life story of how the Gospel can transform lives.

Our words and actions should be a passionate testament to the truth that it's through our love, kindness, and unwavering commitment to sharing the Good News that the world will truly come to know the life-changing power of Jesus Christ.
