CTR RESOURCES UPDATES FOR 2023

SEER Program Coding and Staging Manual 2023 released September 14, 2022

The 2023 manual is to be used for cases diagnosed January 1, 2023, and forward.

The 2023 ICD-O-3.2 histology code and behavior update includes comprehensive tables listing all changes made after the 2022 update and is effective for cases diagnosed 1/1/2023 forward. The 2023 update tables include columns for each standard setter which indicates if each code and/or term is required for data collection and submission.

File*Pro Software

Version 3.39 released Sept 20, 2022

File*Pro software is a free software available from the SEER website (<u>https://seer.cancer.gov/tools/filepro/)</u> The software has a number of uses and is used extensively by CTR staff to evaluate and modify NAACCR files. These are some of the features:

File*Pro can be used to view and manage data that are stored in text files. It is primarily designed for managing large cancer data files formatted according to the NAACCR Data Standards (Volume II), but it can be configured to be used with any data stored in a fixed column or CSV file format. The software allows complex filters and recode rules to be applied to the data, which is then displayed in a table or used to re-create the input file.

- File*Pro is easy to use:
 - Anyone can open a file and view data in a table (no programming required)
 - You can select fields by NAACCR item number or field name. You do not need to know the column location.
 - You can use File*Pro to:
 - View records in a table
 - Calculate derived fields and create a new data file
 - Provide other staff with saved searches or saved recode algorithms
 - Fix common problems like line length, end of line char, etc
 - Explore the data using SQL

IT Considerations

- File*Pro is a pure standalone Java application; it is distributed with its own embedded Java Runtime Environment (JRE) and has no other dependencies. The version of the embedded JRE can be checked in the "jre/release" file. The software itself is released with embedded third-party Java Archive (JAR) libraries available online in Maven Central
- The application doesn't connect to the internet unless the "Check for Updates..." menu item is used. It uses two folders on the local machine (other than the folder where it's installed):
 - it creates a ".filepro" folder under the user's home folder (it contains preferences, recent open files, logs, etc.)
 - * it creates a "filepro" folder under the user's document folder (it contains file layouts, recode scripts, etc. that the user saves while using the application)

Hurricane Ian – It's impact on Florida hospitals

By now, we are all aware of the category 4 Hurricane that struck Florida's west coast on Wednesday, September 28th making landfall on Cayo Costa Island. It's effect was devastating to property, businesses, and infrastructure. It's hard enough to deal with a disasters like this when you are healthy, cognisent, and mobile. What happens to those people who are not? The elderly, sick, diasabled? Those confined to nursing home and hospitals? The Florida Health Care Association reports that there were approximately 8,000 patients evacuated from 47 nursing homes and 115 assisted living facilities. The three hospitals in Lee County, where Ian hit, are without water. No electricity. Damage to the hospital structures. Staff either not able to get to work or not able to leave work Elective surgeries were canceled. Emergency rooms closed. Radiation oncology, ambulatory surgery centers, urgent care clinics, all closed. As we know, consistancy in treatment is very important to the efficacy of treatment modalities. Missing a chemo or radiation treatment has an impact on the patient.

Florida Cancer Specialists & Research Institute has 100 locations in Florida with the majority of them on the Gulf Coast. It halted all but 1 medical office. FCS provides oncology care state wide. As of 10/6/22 only seven have re-established care.

What needs to be done? Contacting patients to reschedule appoints. Hard to do when many are still without electricy. Make arrangements for treatment elsewhere. Roads and bridges have been washed away. Trees and pieces of buildings fill the roads. Provide a hot-line for patients to get information and speak to a healthcare professional. Again, no electricty for land lines and many cell towers are down. What about clinicians and staff? Well, they're experiencing the same problems as the patients. Their homes destroyed, no power, no water, and so on. Imagine the amount of stress they're under right now. Incredible.

The only fortunate thing I can think of for this situation is the fact that Hurricane recovery is not a new idea for Florida. They've been through this before and will again. I've listed some web sites (there are many) that are directed for Hurricane Ian help. If you're so inclined and are able to do so, please consider giving. <u>Please beware of fake sites. Make sure the association you choose is legitimate.</u>
