Christmas Reflection

When the angels went away from them to heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go, then, to Bethlehem to see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." Lk. 2:15

This year Christmas falls on a Sunday. This only happens on average every seven years. It won't happen again until 2033. (This is on account of the 2028 Leap Year which bumps Christmas to Monday that year.) The important thing is that Christmas is always December 25 and the entire world knows it. Despite secularism and the general disregard for Christianity, people will continue to celebrate, if not Christmas, then the Christmas holidays. This holiday is universal. We are familiar with the exhortation that appears on signs and in sermons to "KEEP CHRIST IN CHRISTMAS." Of course, we hope and pray that all will know the true meaning of Christmas. Just about everyone you ask can tell you it is the day Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus. That is good. It is a start. But that Jesus is the Messiah, the Beloved Son of God, born to save us and reconcile us to God, few today seem to believe or give thought to. The Christmas holidays may be fun, charming, and heartwarming, but faith in Christ is another story. Christians believe that Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life. In other words, Christians believe that Jesus is the Son of God, conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit in the womb of Mary and born by her. What's more, Christians believe that what Jesus taught is God's truth. "Truth has truly spoken, or there's nothing true." Finally, Christians do their best to live according to the teachings of Jesus. It is up to Christians to keep Christ in Christmas. Let us strive to be more centered on Christ.

The presence of the shepherds in the story of Christmas has great appeal. Why should the heavenly host appear to these shepherds? What was it about them that attracted the attention of the angels and the Lord of angels? Were they especially known for their devotion and faith? There is nothing to show that they were holier and more enlightened than other good people who waited for the consolation of Israel. There is no reason to think that they were better than others. God fearing and simple men, yes, but not exemplar in virtue and religious habits. Why then were they chosen? For their poverty and obscurity. Almighty God looks with a special love and affection on the lowly.

Seeing the Eternal Word, the Son of God, take on the humble condition of a newborn child, let us be humble and lovingly approach this child, putting away our self-reliance and self-interest, becoming little, seeing before us the Divinity weak by taking our "coat of skin."

Let us be grateful for what God has done for us in sending His beloved Son to take on our flesh and live among us. "What the Lord has done for me; I cannot tell it all."
