

Mercy Sunday- April 23

Our Lord is not dead but alive!

The Sunday after Easter Sunday was once known as Dominica in Albis because the newly baptized in Rome would process in their white baptismal robes to the Basilica of Saint Pancras. Another designation for this Sunday was *Quasimodo Sunday*, so named from the Latin entrance antiphon *Quasimodo geniti infantes...*, a verse from 1 Peter. 2:2: Like newborn babes, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation. The newborn babes are those who were reborn in the waters of baptism at the Easter Vigil. The focus during Lent on preparing the catechumens for baptism and accompanying them when they are newly baptized is a striking characteristic of Lent and Easter. In fact, all the faithful renew their baptismal promises at Easter. During the Easter Season the Church celebrates the sacraments of initiation- Baptism, Confirmation and First Holy Communion. Ordinations to the priesthood are also celebrated at this time.

The Church especially rejoices in hope during the Easter Season. Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, 1Peter 1:3. What a beautiful and divinely revealed statement this is. This *living hope* is the merciful gift of God the Father.

Thanks to Pope St. John Paul II, the Sunday after Easter is now designated Mercy Sunday. The decree designating Mercy Sunday stated that Christians today in many parts of the world wish to praise divine mercy in divine worship, particularly in the celebration of the Paschal Mystery, in which God's loving kindness especially shines forth. "The mercies of the Lord I will sing forever," Ps 89. "What good would life have been to us if Christ had not come as our Redeemer?" As Christians we know that we have a future, and the future is incredibly good. Our encounter with the Risen Christ changes our lives because of the living hope He gives us. We know that we have a future, that our life will not end in emptiness. Precisely because we have this assurance that hope gives, it becomes possible to live good and virtuous lives. The one who has hope lives differently; the one who hopes has been granted the gift of new life. Christ did not bring a social revolution or political liberation. An encounter with the Lord of all lords is an encounter with a hope stronger than death that transform life and the world from within. The fact that the future exists changes the present. The present is touched by this reality. It is as if eternal life spills over into the present. As the Vietnamese martyr, St. Paul Le-Bao-Tinh, wrote in a letter, "In the midst of the storm, I cast my anchor towards the throne of God, the anchor that is the lively hope in my heart." Or, as St. Paul the Apostle says, "This hope will not leave us disappointed because the love of God has been poured on our hearts by the Holy Spirit who has been given us." This is God's magnificent work of mercy, the living hope that will not leave us disappointed. This is the audacity of hope- the soul obtains from God all that she hopes for from Him. We hope in His mercy. This is the meaning of the words that accompany the image of Divine Mercy: "Jesus, I trust in you."

We have until Pentecost to rejoice in this season of hope. This is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it. We give witness to this hope every Sunday of the Year. Truly, Sunday is the Lord's Day.

Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks for a reason for your hope, 1Peter 3:15.

Let us journey together in hope.
