


SANTA CRUZ ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH DISCALCED CARMELITE FRIARS



The Fourth of July is often used as a venue for politicians. Because there is so much incivility and animosity in politics today, I thought it would be good to reflect on President Abraham Lincoln's proclamation calling for a National Day of Prayer and Fasting. The proclamation was issued in the middle of this nation's Civil War. President Lincoln opposed the spread of slavery in the territories of the United States. The American Civil War began barely a month after he was inaugurated on March 4, 1861. The proclamation (with slight editing) is as follows:

Whereas, the Senate of the United States.... has, by a resolution, requested the President to designate and set apart a day for National prayer and humiliation. And whereas it is the duty of nations as well as of men, to own their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confess their sins and transgressions, in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon.... And, insomuch as we know that, by His divine law, nations like individuals are subjected to punishments and chastisements in this world, may we not justly fear that the awful calamity of civil war, which now desolates the land, may be but a punishment, inflicted upon us, for our presumptuous sins, to the needful end of our national reformation as a whole People? We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of Heaven.... But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us; and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us! It behooves us then, to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness. Now, therefore, I do, by this my proclamation, designate and set apart Thursday, the 30th day of April 1863, as a day of national humiliation, fasting and prayer. And I do hereby request all the People to abstain, on that day, from their ordinary secular pursuits, and to unite, at their several places of public worship and their respective homes, in keeping the day holy to the Lord, and devoted to the humble discharge of the religious duties proper to that solemn occasion. All this being done, in sincerity and truth, let us then rest humbly in the hope authorized by the Divine teachings, that the united cry of the Nation will be heard on high, and answered with blessings, no less than the pardon of our national sins, and the restoration of our now divided and suffering Country, to its former happy condition of unity and peace.

In October of the same year as the Proclamation of a Day of Fasting and Prayer, Lincoln issued a proclamation of a Day of Thanksgiving which is the origin of our annual Thursday in November Thanksgiving Day. He says:

And I recommend to them... with humble penitence for our national perverseness, to fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union.

In November of the same year, President Lincoln gave his Gettysburg Address which concluded with these unforgettable words:

That from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion -- that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain -- that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom -- and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

Finally, on this annual celebration of our Nation, let us reflect on Lincoln's Second Inaugural Address on March 4, 1865, perhaps the greatest speech ever given by an American President. It concludes with these now famous words:

With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds; to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow, and his orphan--to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves, and with all nations.

President Lincoln was assassinated the following month, April 14, 1865.

Let us always give thanks to God, repent of our sins, and pray for justice and liberty for all.
