egister now if you want to reserve a space at the 1998 Flea Market. It will be held on Saturday, August 8, at Cherry Hill School (located on Cherry Hill and Ridge roads) between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The cost is \$15 per 10' x 10' space. Participants may rent as many spaces as they wish. They should plan on bringing their own tables and chairs.

No used clothing is to be sold or exhibited. Canton Historical

Society will have a concession stand where hot dogs, potato chips and icecold pop will be available.

The flea market always offers a wide array of items for sale, which, in the past, have include some antiques, collectibles, and new clothing, plus the classic, eclectic assortment of flea market goods.

Basement poured in Bartlett-Travis House

rogress on the interior restoration continues as the basement has been poured in the Bartlett-Travis House. The replica of the facade is Canton Historical Society's newest building in the Sweet Corn Series.

The house was originally located on Canton Center Road, south of

Warren Road. It now sits on Ridge Road in the Cherry Hill Historic District.

The original part of the house, circa 1840, was a one-and-a-half story Greek Revival structure. It was remodeled several times between 1860 and 1919. The house retains some of its earliest elements, plus decorative details own-



ers added during subsequent expansions to keep up with fashions of the day. Among the most prominent features are: (Greek Revival) pilasters and interior Egyptian window surrounds; (Italianate) brackets under the eaves and wrought iron cresting on the front-porch roof; (Queen Anne) the wraparound porch with round columns.

The exterior paint colors chosen—natural and toasted almond with burgundy accents—were popular during the early 1900s. The interior will also reflect architectural and decorating styles popular from 1840-1919. For the visitors' benefit, some of the preserved historic elements will be able to be

viewed through glass-covered cutaway sections.

The replica sells for \$16. Its companion piece—the outhouse—sells for \$8. These along with other issues in the Sweet Corn Series can be purchased at the Canton Historical Society Museum, and at Master Lighting on Ford Road, east of Sheldon.

Historians and Genealogists Find Treasure Trove of Information in Census Records



oving researcher, David
Curtis, has been studying
nineteenth and early
twentieth century U.S. census
records for clues to Canton's past.
He is focusing currently on those
from 1860 in his effort to find out
more about Canton's role in the
Civil War.

"I hope to compile Canton's census records from 1840-1920, which were taken every 10 years.

However, those from 1890 were destroyed by fire and are not available," said Curtis.

So far, he has invested 80 hours in this quest and is logging his results in a data base for other researchers to use. Canton Historical Society is investigating the possibility of publishing the documentation in a book. This would be part of the CHS's ongoing commitment to produce publications that record Canton's heritage.

Among some of the intriguing occupations listed for residents living in Canton in 1860 were:


- 1 sailor
- 11 schoolers (distinct from the 3 schoolteachers listed)

- 1 tollgate keeper
- 1 safe merchant
- 1 carriage maker (distinct from the 2 wagonmakers listed)
- 2 dead!

One wonders what a schooler was; perhaps a tutor or teaching assistant? Canton eventually had nine one-room schools; five of the buildings are still in existence.

One of the fun but timeconsuming things about research is that discoveries often tend to raise questions which send the researcher scurrying in new directions for more documentation. "We had a

tollgate keeper, but I have no idea where there was a tollgate in 1860," said Curtis. The answer will keep him digging for a while.

In addition, bringing the Civil War closer to home and demonstrating how the Civil War divided families, Curtis has learned that one of General Robert E. Lee's

nephews was married to a Canton woman. This has sent Curtis on yet another hunt. Cherry Hill Cemetery has Lees buried there. He wonders if they are connected to the famous Confederate general's family.

This signals a new turn in his genealogical research; that means more time, more fun.






