Civil War Pension Records Provide Clues to Canton's Past



ne of the best sources for information about early Canton families can be found in the National Archives Civil War pension files. They contain valuable genealogical information.

These files do not all contain the same amount of information, but you can expect to find the name of the veteran, the military or naval unit in which he served, the date and place of his enlistment, his birth date and place. There will also be general affidavits of individuals attesting to the soldier's physical disabilities from service-related injuries, and copies of the examining physicians' findings of the time of the injury and during subsequent periodic physicals.

In most files, you will also likely find—although not always—the date and place of his marriage, names and birth dates of his children, maiden name of his wife, information about subsequent marriages, date and place of his discharge, and his residences since his discharge.

Another document in the pension file is the termination of the pension.

If the cause is death—the most common reason—the death date is usually listed. This can then lead you to an obituary, which may also have helpful information.

Sometimes a soldier died during, or shortly after the Civil War. He never applied for a pension. However, his widow, children, or parents may have applied for a pension. This also provides interesting information.

Ordering the Pension Records

To obtain pension or military service records, you need to write to the National Archives and Records Administration. (See box at right.)

Ask for form NATF Form 80 "National Archives Order for Copies of Veterans Records."

I would request two or three blank forms. Usually they will not send more than three at a time. Two to three weeks later you will receive the blank forms requested. You then need to fill out, at a minimum, the top portion of the form and send it to the same above address.

David Curtis obtained this Widow's Claim for Pension, which was part of John Tait's file. This part of the record shows that Ann Tait, of Canton, had been married to John, who was a sergeant in the 24th Michigan—the famous Iron Brigade—and he died fighting at Fredricksburg in 1863.

I recommend writing on the top of the form that you would like to receive a copy of the entire file.

Once the Archives has located the file they will return a copy of the form you sent in and tell you if they found the file requested. The cost to receive approximately 20 selected pages from the file is \$10.

These selected pages are chosen at random by a clerk at the archives.

If you have requested the

entire file, they will return a copy of your form and notify you of the specific cost. Copying an entire file can cost as much as \$60. My experience has been around \$20 to \$35 dollars for an entire file.

Keep in mind that if you only pay \$10 you will get only selected pages. Key information you may be looking for might not get copied. I know of one individual who paid

the \$10 but several years later sent for the entire file, and then, along with other important information, also received a copy of the family Bible records.

Be patient. It takes between five to six months to receive the requested file.





Quilt Pattern Has Many Names



uilt patterns are often known by several names, according to their origins. Note also, as the blocks at the right demonstrate, the appearance can change according to the way patterns and solids are placed in relation to one another. The arrows are prominent in A and B but not as evident in C.


When we published the mystery pattern in the last issue, we received two calls CHS member Heloise Dunstan said it is called "Arrow—Aunt Martha." Virginia Presson, from Wayne Historical

Society, provided us with additional information. She cited a resource, *Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilt Patterns* by Barbara Brockman. The book lists the following names and sources for quilts that are similarly pieced together as the quilt at left:

At the Square - Nancy Page Arrow - Aunt Martha Colorado's Arrowhead - Work basket 1935
