



#### **DuMouchelle this year**


e had a great turnout. Marie Gentz scheduled appointments this year and it worked really well. We had a few walk ins and they were able to be accommodated as well without a long wait.

#### Please Adopt Me.

he National Archives has informed us they have approximately 200 pages of pension records concerning Amzi Moore for an additional cost.

Amzi was born in Canton on December 14, 1841. He was the son of Alfred and Lousia (Rose) Moore. They lived on Warren Rd. west of Ridge Rd. The house they lived in is still standing.

Prior to and for a few years after the Civil War Amzi worked on his father's farm. September 25, 1861 he enlisted in Company D, Third Michigan Cavalry as a Corporal. He mustered out February 12, 1866 at San Antonio, Texas. He returned to Canton after the war and around 1879 he moved to Livingston Co., Michigan and later to Belding in Ionia Co., Michigan where he was a finish carpenter and cabinetmaker. He is buried in Belding.

Your Society hopes someone will adopt Amzi so we can add his pension records to the Museum's Archives. This would be beneficial for our visitors who use our archives to learn more about their relatives. It also helps us meet the Societies objectives to collect and preserve the history of Canton Township.

George was born in Canton in February of 1845, and Martha in July of the same year in Denton. They were married in Nankin in Nov. of 1865 and had five children. Their sons George, Frank and Edd attended the Palmer School at Geddes and Beck Rds. George operated his business out of Detroit on 16th Street.



## John M. Amrhine

ohn M. Amrhine was born July 18, 1825 in Pennsylvania. On December 29, 1847 he married Marietta Watson, the daughter of George W. and Rebecca Watson. Marietta was born June 27, 1830 in East Bloomfield, New York.

On March 19, 1849 John purchased 15 acres of land south of Geddes Rd. and east of Barr Rd. from Charles Carpenter. Then on February 25, 1856 he purchased forty acres on the north side of Saltz Rd., east of Ridge Rd. from John Hutchinson Jr. The 1870 and 1893 plat maps for Canton Township, shows he owned eighty acres north side of Geddes Rd., west of Barr Rd. John can be found in the 1850 and 1860 census as living in Canton Township. He is found in the 1870 census in Van Buren Township with his wife Marietta and children Sarah, Emma, Claudine and Ernest.

October 6, 1861 John answered President Lincoln's call for more men. He enlisted at Canton in Company C, First Michigan Infantry as a Corporal. John was 35 years of age, 5 feet 5 1/2 inches tall, he was of medium complexion, blue eyes and brown hair. His occupation was shown as a carpenter.

In an affidavit of George Comer a resident of Canton who served with John stated; "On or about July 2, 1862 at Harrison's Landing, VA John while in the line of duty was taken sick and was under surgeons care." John stated that on the 30th day of August 1862 at the second Battle of Bull Run he was wounded in the right

ankle and middle finger of the right hand. He laid wounded on the battle field for ten days. John was discharged for disability March 27, 1863 at Camp Banks, Alexandria, VA.

A surgeons report in 1882 states that John has a slight deformity of the lower portion of the right leg, the result of a fracture of the fibula as a result of a shell wound that leaves him slightly lame. The report continues that he complains of rheumatism pains in damp weather.

As a result of the exposure during the Civil War and the wound he received, John collected a pension of \$2.00 per month. After the war he suffered greatly from asthma and bronchial infection.

Marietta died February 23, 1890. John died August 24, 1892.

The above information on John Amrhine was obtained thanks to the "Adopt a Civil War Soldier" program. From his pension records we were lead to other resources such as land and census records.

### - Additional information -

Pat Morbach gave our society a binder with additional information about the Amrhines and Watsons. John and Marietta had 10 children, Harriet "Hattie", Mary Elizabeth, Sarah "Sadie", Estelle, Emma Jane, Grant, Claudia M., Minnie Mae, Ernest Stanley and Charlotte Virginia. All, except Minnie Mae are buried at Denton Cemetery.
