

BIG BOY VS THE LAW

On Friday, May 2, 2003, the Big Boy statue in front of the restaurant at 45250 Ford Road was kidnapped! The statue itself was made of fiberglass and had only been there for about two months. The restaurant manager noticed him missing the next morning and called the police. Shortly after the statue was reported missing, one of the police detectives said that a 17-year-old youth admitted to taking the statue with 3 friends to a field in Salem Township as a prank. The statue was recovered but his hamburger was missing and the statue had sustained several injuries. The teens were given a week to replace the statue, costing about \$3,500, in order to avoid criminal charges. Read more about this restaurant's story on page 4.

WHAT WE'VE BEEN UP TO

Over the past few months, CHS Board Member Evan Hall assisted by volunteers Kathy & Bob Martin has worked tirelessly to get the Bartlett-Travis House ready for visitors during the Farmer's Market Sundays at Preservation Park.

After a visit last fall by Susan Campbell Fournet, volunteers learned some exciting new things about the house. Mrs.

Fournet had often visited the house when she was a young girl; her elderly aunt, Ella Travis Rowe, was the last of the Travis family to live in the house.

Based on the memories of Mrs. Fournet & other family members, CHS volunteers began moving furniture & reimagining several of the upstairs rooms to reflect these memories.

Out of storage boxes came quilts which had been donated by local seamstresses. These are now in display in the room Aunt Ella would use with her friends to hold quilting parties.

Another room was made into a bedroom because Mrs. Fournet said that was where Uncle Jewel liked to stay when he visited.

Additional work was done to provide extra display space throughout the house.

We are please that a member of one of Canton's historic families is willing to act as docent during tours. Dave Truesdell is enthusiastic about sharing the story of BT House with others, as well as sharing some of his family's history in and around Canton. Visitors are welcome during the Farmer's Market. NOW OPEN! TOURS OF BARTLETT-TRAVIS HOUSE

Bartlett-Travis House is open for tours again! Guided tours by Dave Truesdell are available on Farmers Market Sunday mornings throughout the summer. Tours begin at 9:30, 10:15, 11:00 & 11:45 AM. Tours are FREE and no advanced registration is needed. Visitors can sign up for an upcoming tour at the Canton Historical Society information booth, staffed by our own Bob Wychulis, near the entrance ramp to the house. Featured new rooms include the kitchen, bedroom and sewing room. We are always adding new items from our collections. So, the next time you are in Cherry Hill Village to purchase the freshest produce, baked goods, and meats in Canton, be sure to stop by and check out what's new in the old house.



ALL ABOUT BARTLETT-TRAVIS HOUSE

In the newly formed township of Canton in 1837, Darius Blackman purchased 40 acres of land at the southwest corner of present-day Warren and Canton Center Roads for \$300. A few years later he sold the property to his sister, Maria, and her husband Thomas Bartlett.

The Bartletts had the house built on the property and it was completed in the 1850s. Its original floor plan consisted of a sitting room, a parlor, a dining and

kitchen area. It also included a second-floor loft. Thomas Bartlett sold the property to his son George after he retired from farming in 1857. George turned the loft into a full second story on the house a decade later.

In 1908, William S. Travis Sr. and his wife Martha Cook purchased the property for \$5,000. They lived there with their seven children and owned a cheese factory nearby. The bedrooms were all upstairs and reserved for guests only. The signature wrap-around porch was built in the 1910s.

William Travis died in 1924 and the property was split among his children. His daughter Ella Travis Rowe inherited the land parcel that included the house. She maintained ownership and lived there until the early 1960s when she sold the house.

By 1962, Thomas Myers had purchased the property and his wife Clytie operated an antique and secondhand shop in the house. Ownership of the property was transferred several times until 1988 when a local realtor, Ken Dividock, bought the property and donated the house to Canton Township for use as a historical site. It was then moved from its original site to what is now Preservation Park on Ridge Road. Restoration of the house began in 1990 and was completed in 2002. The original property on Canton Center Road was sold, and a 7-Eleven party store now occupies a portion of the former property.

The Bartlett-Travis House has undergone many changes over the last 170 years. It has survived significant changes in the landscape of our township and currently provides visitors with a glimpse into days long ago.

BIG BOY VS. THE LAW (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

The property owned by Dave Khoury at 45250 Ford Road just east of Canton Center Road has had quite a journey over the decades. In 1975 Khoury opened a Big Boy, which closed in 1996. The next restaurant in this location was Misty Duck (almost named Mighty Duck Bistro until Khoury was advised against sharing the name with the Anaheim hockey

team), which opened on August 19, 1996 but promptly closed on June 29, 1997. Misty Duck's big fine dining sell was the "wild game" aspect which Khoury believes was what people focused on, leading to its quick downfall. The building was then leased to Mesquite Grill which operated from 1997-98, and then Parthenon Express which closed in 2001. The restaurant was reopened as a Big Boy in 2002 and closed again in 2018. National Coney Island then occupied the building but closed in 2021 after not surviving the Covid-19 pandemic. A new House of Umami Ramen restaurant now occupies this very busy piece of real estate.


