Course Description: This full day program has been designed with the purpose of addressing the five issues that are present in the vast majority of school shootings. It addresses how to intervene in a meaningful manner with troubled adolescents. For many adolescents, rebellious acts make perfect sense as a way to express freedom and pull away from the values society attempts to instill in them. To gain freedom in life, some rebel against the authority figures in their lives. Not all adolescents become violent shooters. For some adolescents this normal rebellion is elevated into the criminal behavior. The issue of troubled adolescents is very complicated, involving all arenas of society. This program will identify five components that exist in the majority of all adolescent shootings. The program will suggest how the community and law enforcement can identify and intervene.

The goal of this program is to increase awareness of interventions for troubled adolescents that will assist the law enforcement professional. In order to achieve this goal, focus will be specifically placed upon:

Discussion of five components of violent adolescent shooters

- Myths and Facts regarding adolescent development
- Review of the function of the human brain
- Discussion of the adolescent brain and it's limitations
- Long/short term effects of prenatal drug exposure
- Mental health issues for adolescents and parents
- Techniques for addressing mental health issues of adolescents
- Changing morals, mores and norms in society
- Moral disengagement and mass violent behaviors
- Effects of functional and dysfunctional families
- Predicting troubled and violent behavior in adolescents
- Discussion of the relationship between adolescents and law enforcement

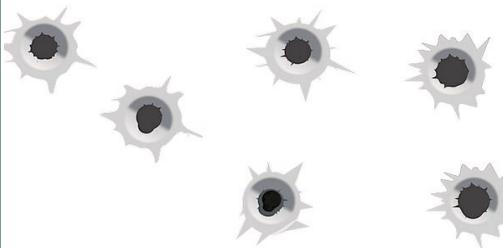

Instructor Biography: Gail P. Sullivan, MA. Ms. Sullivan graduated from Loyola University (BA) and DePaul University (MA) with honors. She has worked in the field of social services and criminal justice for the past twenty-five years in the private and public sector. She has provided therapy to children who have been sexually traumatized by abuse and neglect. She managed an organization with a seven million dollar budget consisting over one hundred employees (Illinois certified) to serve the needs of sexually traumatized and problematic children under the age of twelve years. As an expert, she has sat on the States Attorney Task Force for the Mass Molestation of Children and The Cook County Child Death Review Team. She has developed curriculum that meets State requirements for the certification of juvenile police officers. She provides training for the Cook County Adult Probation Department, Illinois Crisis Intervention Team and Homeland Security, as well as MTUs across the state of Illinois. Currently, Ms. Sullivan is the Program Director of the School of Justice for Westwood College – O'Hare campus.

She manages a premier criminal justice program for over four hundred students and twenty five faculty members. She is the Chairperson of the Safety Management Team working with the Westwood team across the country. Ms. Sullivan lives in Chicago, Illinois with her son, continuing to write and present in the areas of homeland security, violence against children, stress reduction, juvenile law enforcement, cultural diversity, multigenerational communication, sex offenders, ethics, sexual harassment prevention, corrections, crisis intervention programs, and numerous other aspects of criminal justice.
