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
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




# The School Doors Opened and Before We Knew 9t



Registration day gave students who desired last minute schedule changes a chance to make them. It also gave these students the opportunity to make final preparations for the '59-'60 school year.





A successful football season was crowned by a well attended football banquet sponsored by the Lions Club. Here guest speaker Ray Elliot gestures as he emphasizes a point.



The Frosh-Sophomore team journeyed to Lakeview where they defeated host Lakeview, Sullivan, Shelby, and Mt. Zion. Not only did these boys score points in the Frosh-Soph category, but also contributed greatly to the varsity's success.
