Miss Houston came to Bement High School in 1928 and has been influential in establishing the high standards and the well-rounded program that make BHS the fine, respected school it is today.

As an English teacher, Miss Houston has shared with many, many students her interest in and aptitude for grammar, literature, composition, and speech. As school librarian and advisor to the student librarians, Miss Houston has efficiently kept the library up-to-date and running smoothly. As the dedicated person she is, Miss Houston has unselfishly and willingly sacrificed much of her own time to sponsor and advise thirty-seven senior classes, to direct thirty-two senior plays, to start the school newspaper and to advise twenty-two volumes, and to supervise the publishing of twenty-seven yearbooks.

Although Miss Houston's retirement markes the close of a rewarding teaching career of forty-two years, the effects of the knowledge and of the principles which she has imparted to her students will be everlasting.

## Improvements from Science to Sports



On July 1, 1964, construction was begun on a new fieldhouse for the Bulldogs. When the football boys moved in at midseason, they found it to have better showers and a better heating system than the old one. The new fieldhouse is about twice as large as the old, having separate facilities for the Varsity and JV teams. The building also has a coaches' office and a training room.

Chemistry students benefited from the renovated chem lab this year. New lab desks, a new ventilating hood, and other equipment were installed in a sweeping modernization. The rab combines the facilities of a modern classroom with those of a laboratory, eliminating the necessity of an extra room.

An art class enriched the curriculum at BHS with study in art appreciation and practice in the creative arts. Although various mediums were employed throughout the course, enamel paint was used for this mural in the lunch room.

English IV classes learned to evaluate the quality of themes by analyzing those written by high school students. The overhead projector was used to focus the theme, grades, and comments on the wall.
