Years ago, I went on a trip with several family members in Florida and on my vacation some in the place we were staying was watching one of these televangelists shows. Why is that? Well, in Matthew 7:21-23 we find our answer. Many will call Jesus Lord, yet not do the will of God. Many will say that on that day we have done this and that and great things in your name. Yet Jesus will say "I never knew you depart from you who practice lawlessness."

Yet how can this be? Many do not want to hear that we must make changes in our lives. We like the pleasures of the world, and we want to keep these things. Yet with a message of convenience this would appease the world. The belief is as we can with this teaching "once saved always saved".

However, I want to stress that this belief is false, and we can search the scriptures to find the answer to this unlike what Joseph Prince says. In **Acts 8:13-25** we see Simon the sorcerer hears the gospel. He believed and was baptized. I believe that we can all say that he was in a condition of being saved. However, in this same context we see Simon see the apostles' performing signs and miracles through the power being bestowed on them by the Holy Spirit and he thought he could purchase this power.

However, in these events did Peter say do not worry when you are saved you are saved? Did he tell him to go on his way because he could rejoice in being saved already and he could never do wrong again? Did Peter encourage him that he could sin no more again after his baptism? Of course, looking at this, we can see that it is ludicrous to make these statements and the answer is no!
